GALLANT GALLEYWOOD SOLDIER.

Leonard Brazier. 6th Buffs (East Kent Regiment) son of Mr and Mrs Ephrim Brazier Well Lane Galleywood, has been awarded a Certificate and the Military Medal for Gallantry in the field and devotion to duty. He is only 19 years of age, and previously to joining the army was employed at the Tanyard Chelmsford. Before he was of military age, he tried to join the forces but was sent home on account of his youth. The young medallist is a well known distance runner. In connection to Galleywood flower show, he won the boys' Marathon race, and without any rest turned out for the mens marathon which he also won. He has also shown spirit and determination in his battalion sports. Mr and Mrs Brazier have had one son wounded severely, and he is now discharged. Leonard Brazier was a member of the Galleywood Football Team, of whom four have been killed and six wounded, while three men still serving and one has been discharged through wounds.



THE FIRST official British legion Poppy Day was held in Britain on 11 November 1921. Inspired by the poem 'In Flanders Fields' written by John McCrae. More than 38 million red poppies will be produced this year at a small factory in Richmond, South West London. Here they also turn out 100,000 wreaths, 750,000 crosses and 650,000 special larger button-hole poppies.



Some of the bloodiest fighting of World War One took place in the Flanders and Picardy regions of Belgium and Northern France. The poppy was the only thing which grew in the aftermath of the complete devastation. McCrae, a doctor serving there with the Canadian Armed Forces, deeply inspired and moved by what he saw, wrote the famous poem.

On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918, the First World War ended. Civilians wanted to remember the people who had given their lives for peace and freedom. An American War Secretary, Moina Michael, inspired by John McCrae's poem, began selling poppies to friends to raise money for the ex-Service community. And so the tradition began.
