STREET NAMES OF GALLEYWOOD.

Just like the Oral History project, I feel that the Society should also be involved in tracing the derivation of the village's street names. Some are obviously named after previous distinguished Galleywood residents like *Keene Way* and *Barnard Road*; but do you know why the street wherein you live is so named? One of our Committee members – Ken Edwards – has already started his research into this very subject and he writes below:-

'My interest was triggered by a posting on the local 'Streetlife' site about a Chelmsford street name. This prompted me to suggest to John Cummin that if he would photograph the road signs in the village, I would try to find the story behind the names, And so some six months later, where have I got to?

My first action was an article in the *Galleywood Grapevine* asking what people knew. The result was things new and expected plus a few being taken to one side and told – "well of course everyone knows that…". I have recorded these as they can be entertaining whether true or not. I also looked through the existing literature and

asked some key people like Chris Whybro and Wendy Cummin what they knew.

I now feel that I can start researching original records. Initial visits to both the Essex Record Office and Chelmsford Central Library gave me hope that I will be able to check many of the suspected 'facts'; interestingly it seems that the more recent street names may prove the more intractable. The E.R.O? - sadly limited recent information. Who built them? - from personal experience I know this is very difficult. So clearly many wild goose chases and cul-de-sacs await me. Two snippets from work in progress.

Watchouse Road: it is well known that there was a substantial fort built against the threat of a Napoleanic invasion in the early 1800s. Several people have told me that the street used to be known as **'Watchers Road'**, although I have nothing yet to support it: so that is one to verify or not.

Grey Ladys, which is off Well Lane: I had an eMail: 'My father, John Coward, built the development and it was named after one of my ponies which used to graze on the field before the building, her name was 'Grey Lady'. She was a really wonderful grey Welsh mountain pony I owned and rode for many years.'
