CHAIRMAN'S NOTES:

Below, there is an article in this magazine which gives a brief explanation of the role of the Parish Council in local government.

You may or may not be aware but next May we will be having Parish Council elections to elect our nine Parish Councillors for the next four years. Please do consider becoming a parish councillor - itis very interesting and can be very rewarding. Why not come along to the next Parish Council meeting to see what goes on. This month's Parish Council meeting is on Monday, 12th December at7.15pm in the pavilion. From January 2023 onwards, they will be held on the third Monday of each month.

I am pleased to report that the building works going on at the pavilion in respect of the extension to create a new home for the community shop are on target. Hopefully there will not be too many delays due to the current inclement weather and we look forward to completion in March/April.

Your Parish Council are currently looking for funding in relation to improvements to the car park which hopefully may be carried out once the building works are complete. At the last Parish Council meeting, it was agreed to support the '20s Plenty Group' which is campaigning for a 20 mph speed limit in towns and villages in Essex. We will keep you updated on this.

On the subject of pavements and hedges, a big thank you to all those residents who have addressed this issue. Also, both developers in the village are doing their part in clearing the pavements in front of their developments.

Christmas is nearly upon us again and on behalf of myself and the Parish Council. I would like to wish you all an enjoyable Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year. Tricia Edwards

What is a Parish Council and why Become a Parish Councillor?

A Parish Council is a local authority which makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish. It is the level of government closest to the community. As it is the authority closest to the people, parish councils are invariably the first place people will go to with concerns or ideas. For this reason they are a vital part of any community.

What decisions do Parish Councils make?

Parish Councils make all kinds of decisions on issues that affect the local community. Probably the most common topics that parish councils get involved with are planning matters (they are statutory consultees), crime prevention, managing open spaces and campaigning for and delivering better services and facilities.

How much time does it take up?

Councils usually meet once a month for the council meeting to which members of the public are also invited. Meetings may last two or three hours depending on the agenda set for the meeting to discuss. Some councils have committees to deal with specific subjects. In addition to regular meetings, councillors are required to attend other meetings representing the council. For example, acting as a representative on an outside body, community activities or helping develop a new project for the community.

If you do become a parish councillor, you will have to sign up to the Code of Conduct and disclose your interests.

GOSFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Dates for 2023 Spring Show 1st April, Summer Show 15th July, Autumn Show 16th September.

Schedules for the 2023 season will be available from the village shop in the early part of the new year at just \pounds 1.

It has been a strange and difficult year in the garden. With no late frosts, the potatoes were looking good, indeed, the first earlies did quite well. Then the heat and drought hit, and come August, I was digging up small, soft potatoes that were already sprouting. Carrots died, and, with the lack of insect pollinators, the bean crop was very poor. On the other hand, onions were good and have stored well, and both cooking and eating apples fruited reasonably well. Most surprising of all, my late fruiting raspberries, which seeme-d to die in the heat of July and August, recovered to produce fruit until the end of November. Summer flowers fared little better, and even with six water butts in the garden, getting enough water on to everything is an impossible task.

All this had an effect on our horticultural shows, with entry numbers and quality suffering. However, the shows were well supported, friendly affairs, and we even made a tiny profit this year Thank you to everyone who entered, and who visited the shows.

Autumn is the time of year to tidy up the garden for the winter, but don't be too tidy; wildlife needs somewhere to hibernate; if you still prefer to burn your garden waste, then make sure no hedgehogs, frogs, toads, newts or ladybirds are hiding in the heap, and save a bit in the corner of the garden for just that purpose.

FROM THE VICAR - ST. CATHERINE'S CHURCH

Dear all,

I've just got an Advent Calendar for this year - not chocolate, which has often been my choice, but one with different herbal tea bags in it. Maybe not so indulgent! But they are different from my usual herbal teabags and as I'm trying to be a bit healthier, I'll enjoy the treat nonetheless. And, of course, with Advent comes the countdown to Christmas.

Advent is about looking ahead to an arrival; it is a time of waiting. Waiting is something we tend not to be too keen on these days. Do you remember one of the original credit card adverts, many years ago? "Takes the waiting out of wanting", the strapline went. We want to be able to buy things now and not have to save up; we want to be able to get to places almost instantly and not sit in traffic; we want to speak to someone straight away and not queue on the phone. The exception to all this was of course The Queue, earlier this year, when thousands of people waited with patience and good humour to see HM The Queen lying in state. That's a good example of waiting well - waiting with purpose, waiting with others, waiting patiently but with anticipation.

Life isn't always about instant gratification, and things definitely can be worth waiting for. At Christmas, we remember that in biblical times people had long waited for a Saviour, a Messiah, to be sent from God - and he came in the form of the tiny infant Jesus, born in obscurity to an ordinary family, but with an amazing future ahead of him. 

continues but the pull to return and see their family outweighs the uncertainty they will face in Ukraine and so they are returning to their homeland to see if they can stay or whether it is too dangerous. They have been delightful guests, and I'm sure many of you have seen them around the village.

What a wonderful place Gosfield has been. When we had just a few days notice that they would be arriving, back in May, generous hearted villagers rallied around, dropping off everything we could possibly need. If we realised the family would need something, we asked on The Grapevine website and the need was met almost immediately. Thank you so much.

One of the first generous gifts was from The Apple Tree and we were able to take the family there for a welcome Sunday roast, to introduce the family to our wonderful British tradition, Oh my, how they loved the Yorkshire puddings! Thank you so much.

Sparrows Campsite offered a weekend glamping and the family had so much fun there and returned many times due to Charlie's generosity, friendship and kindness.

The community shop raised money from plants sold that were donated by BDC, which enabled us to take bikes that been kindly donated to Lobbs to be serviced plus a child seat to be bought for the back of the bike, all enabling the family to have independence as neither girl can drive. Georgie Roy also raised money which they used to buy bike helmets, school shoes etc. Thank you.

When we went away on a previously booked holiday, not long after the family arrived, lovely ladies in the village, along with family, stepped in to act as transport for shopping and other necessary visits along with any other support needed. Thank you.

On Fête day, back in early July, the girls were invited to judge the floats and open the fête. You have no idea how much that meant to them, they felt a sense of belonging and although having to use the microphone to declare the fête open gave them the jitters, they came home buzzing with excitement. Thank you for that opportunity We had many giggles helping them learn to say the words 'We declare that the Gosfield fête is officially open' as they couldn't say 'village' and it always came out as 'willage' ! We had many other times when things got lost in translation and we all ended up in fits of laughter. What a great sense of fun they had !

It's something we won't forget and we're sure the family will take Gosfield back to Ukraine in their hearts and remember that when they had to flee their country, Gosfield cared for them so admirably.

Will they return ? We don't know the answer, we hope not, we hope they can stay in Odessa, in safety, with their united family but if not, they are welcome to return.

Maurice Rowson Hall

The Maurice Rowson Hall (also known as Gosfield Village Hall) is located at the junction of Church Road and Nuns Meadow in the centre of the village and is available for hire for village residents, village organisations and for people and organisations from outside the village.

The Maurice Rowson Hall consists of a main hall and two smaller rooms known as the Bernard Brooks Room and the Bill Pasfield Room. The rooms can either be hired together or individually. There is also a fully equipped kitchen with a large catering oven. The hall is fully accessible for wheelchair users and has a unisex disabled toilet. There is a large carpark at the hall with parking for approximately 20-25 cars.

Maximum occupancy figures for the various rooms are:

high above the area where the font is today. Girls sat in the Gallery via a door up the tower steps and boys sat on benches underneath their behaviour controlled by a man who sat on a stool holding a long cane to rap their knuckles if they misbehaved. Jane Elliot (the vicars daughter) playing the Organ also kept a sharp eye towards the Gallery. One boy as an elderly gent once recalled her descending upon him like an avenging Angel taking him by the collar and placing him on the Organ stool beside her. As a girl I sat willingly beside the elderly Jane in her home while she taught me tapestry work .I've written before of the Carol singing that took place in the lead up to Christmas .. so I will not repeat those memories but Hot chocolate and Mince Pies at Gosfield Eaves the furthest we walked along the main road (traffic. what traffic ?) was a particular bonus ... and only a short walk from the old prison camp now the 3 counties Crematorium. The latter I visited for the funeral of Richard Hall Richardson a few weeks ago. I have known him since I was a young girl when he played the cornet at memorial services and sand solo in the Choir ' Once in Royal David's City' during Christmas service. He played football for Gosfield Utd he scored his first goal for them age 15.... in a Cup Match. He played Cricket, Badminton, Tennis and Snooker, he loved fishing too... Before life in Gosfield he was just baby Richard Hall in a London Hospital nursery in 1939 when WW2 began. The Nursery was given a government directive to leave next day with all its babies and staff to Glyndebourne Opera House in Sussex. Many Nurseries arrived on site to avoid possible bombing. By 1942 some were relocated to family or to foster care as it was hard to locate surviving families during war time. Richard was in foster care in Monmouthshire but nearing school age he was relocated to Knebworth in Hertfordshire and he wasn't sent away to Australia or Canada as so many were. Instead he was temporarily placed in Essex. He was taken to Church and schooled locally until 8 yrs old and taught how to 'tend a garden' having his own vegetable patch. A skill he retained all his life. Halstead Police Sqt.Len Richardson and his wife Hilda (nee Humphries) came to meet him and later brought him to their home near Gosfield Corner, next door to Hilda's brother Claude wife Cora and family. Peter, Roger and Margaret Humphries. He was officially adopted by 1950. Later he joined the RAF(national service) he signed up for extra time so he could be sent abroad and he enjoyed those years in Ceylon.. He resided in Gosfield for the rest of his life. he became a part of my family in April 1966 when we married and later had 3 sons Paul, Mark and Lee and then 6 grandchildren the eldest grandson 27 is soon to be a Father himself... Life goes on.. Richard loved fishing from when he first came to Gosfield so you might see a shadowy figure one day at the side of a pond or lake who knows. I must tell you the village ghost stories sometime. A big stage coach used to rumble through the village in December an old villager once recalled the majestic sight of it laden with brown paper parcels and Turkeys draped on the exterior. That was true though and not a ghost story.

Christmas Eve a joint from my Grandad's pig would be left on a needy villagers doorstep with a bottle of Parsnip wine as a goodwill gesture. Dad whilst saving lives with the Ambulance gave 22 years to Gosfield, elected onto Parish and District Council he's now another village memory but I'm sure he's peeping through a corner of a cloud at the progress 'nearby' his old home and just like after the war people DO need homes. So from me and mine to you and yours Seasons Greetings to One and All'

MEMORIES by Linda Marlow (Richardson, Kemp)..... cont'd. A distant Gosfield memory November 1915....brought with it an Outbreak of Scarlet Fever. It was Polio 35 years later when I was young but during the winter Whooping cough time, in the memory from one villager (born in the mid 1800's) clearly recalled that a treatment of whooping cough was a child being sent to school with a bag tied around her neck with a SPIDER inside it. The belief was that once the Spider had found its way out then the Whooping cough would leave the child. During the Crimean War children collected spiders webs, these were carefully packed by committees of ladies and sent to the hospitals where they were used to arrest the bleeding of the soldiers wounds.

// In 1740 a COLD REMEDY was a powder created by Dr Boerhaue. " 4 drams of Nitre and a quarter ounce of Camphire , 18 grains of Saffron and 4 grains of Cochineal. These ingredients must be powdered together, put into a bottle and keep it close (sic) Using 10 to twenty four grains will take off any feverish heat that attends a cold, if the fever continues repeat it every three to four hours, it is particularly good in the beginning of a sore throat and in all colds." \\ THIS was an extract from Lord Nugent's papers and household accounts (Lord Nugent of Gosfield Hall).

My November memory was Guy Fawkes time jumping jacks and bonfire potatoes dripping with butter, mugs of hot chocolate and of course Remembrance Sunday with Sgt. Fred Lock , voice saying 'We will Remember Them' at the service by the memorial outside the old Sunday school room and young Richard (Hall) Richardson playing the Last Post on his silver Cornet ... Sgt. Lock no doubt remembering 1944 and the men who died after an incident during a Local Home Guard Training exercise involving a hand grenade when Six men were killed and Three injured including Sgt Lock with an eye injury. I believe Ron Clampin a boy of 7 in nearby Maplestead along with 2 others were taken to the Halstead cottage Hospital with injuries after picking up an unusual object which turned out to be a hand grenade and also about this time Lt. David Lowe of Gosfield Hall was killed in action, son of Aubrey Lowe, his Aunt told me of a letter they had received from him when in Cassino (my own father was there also the same year). During that same year in Gosfield a tragedy occurred at the Lake, it was found the water had been contaminated and hundreds of fish were gasping at the Lake side. It took six cart loads to dispose of the fish.

November also meant preparation at school for the annual Christmas sale. I still have our Christmas Tree a fairy made by Mary (Philips) Hull... she made a few 'tree fairies' one year when our children were at school. Mary was my favourite village cake maker too in those days and she still is and Prim Rayners meringues were amazing and Val Clampins superb decorations on cakes also come to mind. ... November into December was the coach trip for Christmas Shopping and a trip to the Pantomime was usually on the events calendar too as well as school Nativity play preparation how many of us were busy sticking cotton wool clumps to old torn up bedsheets for sheep and making their cardboard faces.

Whist Drives and Social evenings and Church activities took place as usual, teaching children Bible stories in the Wentworth Chapel all year during the family services, but more special at Christmas, myself and friend Susan Spinks were teachers, Susan the God daughter of Jane Elliot daughter of The Rev. H L Elliot vicar of St Catherines Church for many years after arriving in 1871. It was very different then when there was a Gallery to the rear of the Church where children were sat silent it was 20


