

Content

14 marks out of 20 maximum

Judges' Comments: Good read - balance with historic articles needs watching. Good pictures support stories. Parish Council reports on long side. Good humorous content.

HIGHLIGHTS observations: The magazines that they judged coincided with anniversaries relating to WW1. These we treated with respect and included some very interesting and well researched articles but we are taking note of the caution regarding the balance with historic articles. There are no current plans to reduce the reports of the Parish Council. In fact part of the original rationale for the modest launch of Highlights was to provide a vehicle for the Parish Council to reach parishioners and keep them informed of the Council's activities.

Layout

11 marks out of 15 maximum

Judges' Comments: Index and listings handily placed on back page for some but surely index should be on pages two or three. Very readable style. Loads of pictures illustrate well.

HIGHLIGHTS observations: We have taken note of the comments and plan to move the index back to page 2 or 3 where it was previously placed.

Design Production

11 marks out of 15

Judges' Comments: Topical covers. Bright and breezy magazine. Good signposting. HIGHLIGHTS has no observations.

Total marks awarded 36 out of a maximum of 50. The judges make some nice supportive comments and some helpful criticisms for which we are appreciative.

By the way, have you noticed a difference in the quality of *HIGHLIGHTS* printing as there has been for us a big change. Our own printing machines are getting old and troublesome, indicating that we should soon need to buy new ones at a cost of a number of thousand pounds.

Instead of going the expensive route of replacing our nearly clapped out printers, we now, with the help of the Parish Council, have *HIGHLIGHTS* professionally printed by Alan Rowett and his Great Hallingbury Newnorth Press Ltd.



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




On a beautiful summer's day, two English tourists were driving through Wales .

Highlights from the Minutes of Meeting of Great Hallingbury Parish Council

4th July 2016

Present: Cllr A Townsend (Chairman), Cllrs D Barlow, A Noble, A Pinnock, T Streeter, V Wing and Mrs F Townsend (Clerk).

Airport Compensation

The Chairman and Clerk had been interviewed by ITV Anglia regarding compensation from the airport and they also attended the press conference that followed at which SSE presented an outline of the Airport's procrastination over paying compensation. At a hearing in the Royal Courts of Justice in March, Stansted Airport had accepted that they could not use the golden rivet as an excuse for not paying compensation but then said that claims were now time-barred under the Limitation Act which was unacceptable to the judge. Following further pressure from SSE, the Airport issued a statement in which they accepted that claims should be submitted. (Further details will be found on page 15)

Highways

Requests for new projects for 2017 need to be submitted very soon. A sign to warn of flooding by the bridge was suggested as the problem there has not been fixed.

The Clerk continues to pursue progress regarding the blocked gully by the bridge near Captains and maintenance work on Footpath 15 (Restricted Byway - Leapers Lane).

There had been a complaint regarding road flooding outside Old Cottage, Start Hill. Highways has apologised for the works not happening in 2014 and explained that raising the kerb here is part of the remedial work which they hope should be completed by September.

The Clerk was requested to explore when the road will be resurfaced from Bedlars Green

to Start Hill.

Affordable Housing

The developer is currently awaiting a decision on the outline planning application.

Police

The Clerk has unsuccessfully communicated with Braintree Police Station regarding speeding traffic through the village which she will pursue.

Post Box Bedlars Green

The council had enlisted support from Sir Alan Haselhurst, MP, in their pursuit of a replacement post box at Bedlars Green. This is now in position mear the notice board on Bedlars Green. (More details on page 13)



Little Hallingbury School

A Consultation was held on a proposal to federate Little Hallingbury School with St Mary's School, Hatfield Broad Oak. Your council agreed with the proposal and supported comments made by Little Hallingbury Parish Council that the new Governing Body should include a representative from both Little Hallingbury and Hatfield Broad Oak Parish Council. A letter from the school reported that the response to the consultation was overwhelmingly positive with 95% of respondents in support of the proposal. On 31st August, 2016, the two current governing bodies will cease to exist and from 1st September the new federated Board of Governors will take over.

Affinity Water

Parishes have been notified of a Water Saving Programme through the Herts & Essex area. The Programme includes Saving Water with free advice and water saving devices, Metering, which is to be compulsory, and Reducing Leakage, which is Affinity Water's commitment to reduce leakage by 14% by 2020. The Council will invite Affinity Water to attend a future meeting.

Essex Waste Plan

Essex County Council and Southend Borough Council have submitted their replacement Waste Local Plan to the Secretary of State for independent examination. The plan, once adopted, will from part of the Development Plan in Essex and Southend and will replace the Essex Waste Local Plan which was adopted in 2001. UDC Salt Bag Scheme

Great Hallingbury Parish Council will again join the UDC Salt Bag Scheme with the provision of salt which Cllr Streeter has kindly offered to store at Harps Farm.

Construction of building attached to existing garden wall including the removal of 4 panels of the wall // (The original buildings were renovated to a very high standard and are well kept. Proposals have been designed sensitively to complement the existing buildings and those on the adjoining site. The Parish Council is pleased to support this application)

Applications dealt with by the Planning Working Group:

UTT/16/0964/OP // Land adjoining Great Hallingbury Manor, Tilekiln Green // Outline application for 35 dwellings with all matters reserved // (The Parish Council is satisfied with this outline proposal for 35 units of which 8 will be affordable, gifted by the landowner to UDC. The site layout looks most agreeable and it is hoped will meet the established need for housing within the village. The Parish Council is therefore pleased to support this application)

UTT/16/1232/HHF // The New Cottage, Howe Green // Erection of one and half storey side and rear extensions // (No objections raised)

UTT/16/1339/HHF // Little Beldams, Beldhams Lane // Proposed demolition of existing summer house/tool shed and erection of new summer house // (No objections raised)

UTT/15/3785/FUL & UTT/15/3786/LB // Woodside Green Farm // The application had gone to full committee and the Chairman had attended the site visit at which there did not seem to be any objections raised to the proposals.

Telephone Box

Cllr Pinnock has been refurbishing the phone box. (More details on page 7)

Refuse Collection

Cllr Streeter reported that the dustcarts had not been collecting from Harps Farm or Beggars Hall and that litter is often seen coming from the back of the dustcart during the Green bin collection, thus adding to the litter problem in the village. The Clerk will report these problems to UDC

Litter Pick

Cllr Wing is organizing a litter pick for Sunday, 16th October, at 10am. More details will be found on page 25. Updates on the housing project will also be available. Ideas for *do not litter* signs are needed.

The Great British Elm Experiment

Most people under the age of 40 will never have seen the elm landscapes so loved by Constable or Turner. They may have read John Betjeman's



eulogies to the English elm and might even have heard of the ancient elm under which John Wesley reputedly preached in Stony Stratford. But they won't have actually seen any of these wonderful trees that once graced the British countryside for they were wiped out in their many millions from the 1970s by Dutch Elm disease, a virulent strain of a fungal disease.

This included all the elm trees in the village but The Conservation Foundation, is running an experiment to reintroduce elms into the countryside by taking cuttings from trees that appear to be resistant to the disease.

The Parish Council will fund the purchase of 6 elm trees to be planted in the village and is now looking for suitable locations and custodians for these small trees. Elms were a prominent feature of the village and the Council is keen to try to recreate this by planting the new trees in similar locations. It might be tempting fate to plant exactly on the same site but somewhere near should be OK. So, if you live in Elm Cottage or Elmside, would you consider whether you have a suitable location to nurture our trees. The only thing you will have to do is care for the tree and make sure it has enough water until it is established and give the Council a short report each year on how the trees are doing.

The Saga of the Bedlars Green Post Box

And the persistence of our Parish

Council

A post box on a wooden pole had stood in Bedlars Green, half way between the pub and the bend, for decades. Then in March 2012, not for the first time, the post was hit by a car and the box was left awkwardly positioned over a drainage ditch. Great Hallingbury Parish Council asked Royal Mail to replace the pole but their response was to seal the post box as it was dangerous to use.

Then followed a lengthy period during which correspondence was exchanged between the Parish Council and Royal Mail. The Parish Council was prepared to pay for the replacement pole but this proposal was ignored. Then Royal Mail suggested relocating the box to a safer spot with which the Parish Council would have been happy but Royal Mail did not propose any possible sites for relocation, a new box did not materialize, and the old one was removed. It continued to be a very sore point both with local residents and the Parish Council that the crooked post remained in the ground, an eyesore and a reminder that Royal Mail had neglected their duties to parishioners.

The next nearest boxes from the location of the removed box are one situated 1.2 miles away to the north of the village and over a main road and the other 1.0 mile to the south - the total distance between the boxes being 2.2 miles. Using the Royal Mail's own criteria given on their website, namely:

- the distance to and location of the next nearest 3 alternative boxes
- still meeting the needs of customers in the area if the box isn't replaced
- the number of delivery points which may now be further than half a mile from a box

They were failing parishioners in each of these cases.


The Parish Council appealed for help to Ofcom but they were unable to assist. Then, at the beginning of this year, Great Hallingbury Parish Council renewed their assault on Royal Mail and requested that one of the vaunted 2000 new post boxes being installed in mainly rural areas should be in Bedlars Green.

Having enlisted support from our MP, Sir Alan Haselhurst, to whom we are grateful for also pursuing the case on behalf of the village, Royal Mail advised the Parish Clerk that, due to new Health and Safety restrictions, a new post box could not be placed on the original site. However, alternative sites were discussed and we now have a new post box on Bedlars Green, next to the Parish notice board. Collection times are **16.00 hours Monday - Friday and 9 am on Saturday.**

Well done Freda and the Great Hallingbury Parish Council and thank you for getting our post box back.

Stop Stansted Expansion



Compensation Claims

As you will have seen from the notes of the Great Hallingbury Parish Council meeting, the question of compensation claims relating to works done at Stansted Airport from 1999 to 2007 has been under discussion.

Since 2002, Stansted has claimed that it has no legal obligation to pay compensation until it has completed everything listed in its 1999 Phase 2 planning consent. Completion of a small part of these works, the Echo cul-de-sac, has been repeatedly postponed - most recently until the mid-2020s - and has thus been branded the golden rivet loophole. However, lawyers for Stansted Airport finally accepted this was not a valid excuse at a hearing in the Royal Courts of Justice in March but then immediately argued that claims were now time-barred under the Limitation Act. This gave rise to withering criticism from the judge who remarked: So, after years of telling people you can't claim until the works are complete, you're now saying tee-hee - you're too late.

Following the hearing, SSE immediately asked for an urgent meeting with the airport managing director. When it was obvious that Stansted Airport was still stalling, SSE gave them an ultimatum to make a public statement with a commitment to introduce a compensation scheme, failing which SSE would itself make a public statement and do all in its power to safeguard the interests of local residents, including legal action.

At the eleventh hour, Stansted Airport issued a statement confirming that it is willing to consider claims from qualifying residents and will, for the time being, treat them as having been made *in time*.

More details have now been announced.



The map above is extracted from Stansted Airport's *Guide to Residents on Claims relating to Airport Works dating from 1999 to 2007.* The Airport states that if your property lies outside the coloured area on the map they believe it is unlikely that a claim will qualify for compensation. If your property lies within the coloured area, which includes a large part of Great Hallingbury, then you will still need to demonstrate that your claim satisfies all the requirements to qualify for compensation.

The *Guide to Residents* is available on the SSE website (http://stopstanstedexpansion. com/compensation.html) or from Stansted Airport Ltd, Enterprise House, Bassingbourn Road, CM24 1QW, together with an application form.

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) has been inundated with requests asking who residents might turn to for independent professional advice about whether they may have a valid claim and, if so, for how much, and how to prepare and submit a compensation claim.

As a result of these requests, SSE has held discussions with various firms of professional Chartered Surveyors and the following three firms have indicated that they would *continued on page 16* be willing and able to act for local residents in relation to compensation claims. SSE is not in a position to endorse any of the following firms or to recommend one over another. However, they hope this is a helpful starting point although there will doubtless be other firms too.

The (extracted) text below has been written by the firms themselves, not by SSE.

Everyone complains about the speed at which traffic travels through the Village.





The Police Years

Part 14: New Technology and Famous Travellers

Closed Circuit television was incorporated at the onset of the Euston rebuild. Some cameras were static and a few could be *zoomed*. They were somewhat



Nevertheless, a series of receiving screens were installed in our temporary Police Office but one couldn't gaze at them all the time. Focussing a zoom camera on a suspect became an art, especially in a milling crowd. We did, however, catch a suspect parcel thief in the depot upstairs. On bringing him to the Police Office and witnessing his wrongful action, he confessed!

Personal radios were introduced on April 6th, 1967, indeed before many other Forces. Except for some grey reception areas, the Duty Sergeant now had more control of his men. Shortly after their introduction there was a fatal accident approaching Euston at which I attended. With the aid of radio and prompt help, I was able to get trains working again within an hour. Likewise, a gang of thieves were arrested operating between the Parcel area and a café in the street and their capture was a credit to our young probationary Officers using this new device.

One night a patrolling Officer witnessed a wagon raid at St. Pancras Goods Depot and I was able to get other Officers to the scene. While controlling events from our cramped temporary office and trying to bring the raid to a successful conclusion, an itinerant Scotsman began banging on the counter, demanding fare to his motherland and refused to stop. The raid had reached a critical stage so I jumped over the counter, dragged him outside and gave him the full force of my authority. At once other itinerants appeared offering to be witnesses against the brutal Police. Unfortunately by this time our efforts failed at St. Pancras and I made a carefully worded record in the Occurrence Book. This entry has been preserved and is produced from time to time to illustrate a point.

In August 1966 three Metropolitan Police Officers were murdered in a shooting incident at Shepherds Bush. The prime suspect was Harry Roberts and the search for him became nationwide. The week previously a raid had taken place in Glasgow and the loot placed in Euston Left Luggage Office, a temporary building adjoining our Police Office with only plasterboard dividing. Glasgow Officers came down and removed the loot without so much as a courtesy call. Instructions were then issued prohibiting the removal of property from Left Luggage without prior consultation with the Transport Police.

It so happened that on August 16th, 1966, at 2.30 pm, Detective Inspector Jack Slipper of the Metropolitan Police arrived with a woman to recover a gun. He was referred to me and together we searched Left Luggage lockers and found the gun. A Police marksman was installed in case Roberts returned to collect it. The woman had lived with Roberts and after the murders she came with him to Euston to deposit the gun and then accompanied him to Kings Cross where he bought camping equipment and joined a Green Line bus to Epping. At Epping, the forest was thoroughly searched without success and almost every Police force in the country received reports of a Roberts

sighting. After several months, a break in was reported at Lawrence's in Sawbridgeworth and a Police dog tracked scent to a wood in Thorley. It was there that they found a camouflaged tent. A huge posse of Police eventually caught up with Roberts at Sawbridgeworth and he surrendered without a fight. Apparently Roberts visited Bishop's Stortford regularly and,

ironically, he had been living almost on my doorstep!

Personalities passed through Euston almost every day. In March 1966 the entire Coronation Street cast, including Jack and Annie Walker, were en route for an Australian tour. Previously, in February, Mr. Kosygin, the Russian Premier, travelled to Scotland and back amid rigid security precautions. Each time Euston was thoroughly searched beforehand. Mr Jenkins, then a high government official, was also a frequent traveller. Bad tempered, always in a hurry, he once tried to borrow 10p off me to tip the porter!



Two regular travellers were Barbara Castle and Harold Wilson, the Prime Minister, who both returned to their constituencies each week. Returning next day, Barbara took it for granted we would take her by Police car to her Hampstead home. At the time, Barbara was campaigning for compulsory seat belts, in fact she ticked off Harold for not wearing his. Not to be outdone, our seat belts were brought into play. Having been trodden on by Baroness Castle of many dirty feet beforehand they made guite an impression on her pink coat!

Blackburn formerly One Friday I escorted Barbara to her train. Overnight she was promoted to Rt. Hon. Barbara Castle MP Minister of Transport and next day on her return an official car waited.

shook hands as usual amid hordes of photographers. My greeting was duly reported in the press, especially at her constituency in Blackburn!

Harold Wilson always boasted he slept *like a log* on a railway sleeper car. Not so the accompanying Secretary. Wilson did not like being late or put other people to inconvenience. Should he be late on a Friday, he would phone through and the train would be held. On one occasion, together with his detective, we ran across Euston concourse at speed to catch his train. The press missed that one!



December 17th, 1966, started like every other Saturday. Having escorted Harold to his car, he later discovered his case was under the bunk of his sleeper but by this time the train was at Willesden sidings. I received an formerly Rt. Hon. urgent call from Downing Street and went post haste to the sidings, recovered the case and was then instructed to take it to No. 10. As I approached 1964-70 and 1974the famous door, it was opened by his detective just as Harold was leaving

Baron Wilson of Rievaulx, Harold Wilson MP (Prime Minister 76)

to play golf. I was invited into the Cabinet Room and while savouring the surroundings and state of readiness, the official housekeeper came in. Noting my interest, he invited the detective and I to a conducted tour of the building starting with the staircase, adorned with etchings and photographs of previous occupants. Upstairs, one saw the old Cabinet Room with ornate furnishings and the alcove where Lady Churchill slept to be near Winston Churchill while he worked well into the night during the war.

The Housekeeper spoke of the tremendous esteem in which Sir Winston was held, especially on his eightieth birthday. Thousands of presents arrived which were later distributed to hospitals but he treasured a 2/6d (13p) postal order sent by two old age pensioners. This, Sir Winston framed and always showed it to visitors. We were then taken to kitchens which became operational only for functions and banquets. So comprehensive was the tour that the detective was drawn to remark he had previously seen more of the Kremlin than No. 10! As I departed, shaking hands on the doorstep, the crowd outside were busy with cameras. Somewhere, evidence of my visit is now filed in some distant land!

A Defibrillator in Great Hallingbury It might save a life



Great Hallingbury Parish Council, with an Uttlesford grant, has purchased a defibrillator for Great Hallingbury.

A defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart through the chest wall to someone who is in cardiac arrest. This is called defibrillation and it's an essential lifesaving step in the chain of survival.

The Defibrillator has arrived together with the case in which it sits. By the time you read this, its installation on the outside wall of the Village Hall will be underway.

There will be an **Unveiling Ceremony** on Wednesday, 21st September, at 7.30pm after which light refreshments will be served. Then on Monday, 3rd October, at 7.30pm an **Awareness Seminar** and talk will be given by Martin Render, Chairman of The Community Heartbeat Trust. At this seminar **training** will be given on what to do if faced with an emergency situation where a patient is unconscious.

All residents are invited to attend both events which will be held in the Village Hall.

The Defibrillator will be available for emergencies but is only accessible once 999 has been dialled and an ambulance is on the way.

Crime Alerts

Heating Oil

As it comes to the time when you are thinking about topping up



your heating oil tank for winter, with the value of fuel it is worth considering its security. In the more isolated parts of the countryside, it is primarily domestic properties that have been targeted by the heating oil thieves but we have also seen such thefts at farms and other businesses.



There are a number of security devices available that will protect your fuel supplies, details of which can be found via your fuel supplier or

local plumber's merchant. Examples are the GPRS Fuel-Oil Alarm from www. compoundsecurity.co.uk and Tank Commander from www.commandersecurities.co.uk which both have Secured by Design accreditation. These products will detect a dramatic drop in fuel and call you on the telephone. There are other systems which will add on to an existing intruder alarm system whilst others protect the filler cap and there are, of course, the conventional locks.

Other considerations would be defensive planting around the tank to conceal it, restricting access to it by gates or fencing or locating the tank under lighting in view of lived in rooms within the house.

The Illusion of occupancy

As the nights draw in earlier don't forget to use table lamps on timers and there is a product called Fake TV which produces lighting that resembles a television switched on within a room from www.immobilise.com . You can

also record serial numbers of products here free or charge. Consider installing external Dusk till dawn lighting and remember to ensure gates are in *continued in next column*


