I have a friend who has 3 children. She has recently returned to the UK with her children and husband after teaching abroad Upon their return, her children persuaded her for two years. It was totally against her better judgement and, to get a dog. when I saw her in November, it was just as she feared; she is now the sole carer of the *family* pet. Other friends have had similar experiences with smaller animals: hamsters, guinea-pigs and rabbits soon lose their appeal when smelly cages have to be cleaned every week or fed even when it is raining outside and there is something good on the telly.

And it is not just animals that are discarded. How many of us are looking around the living room at gadgets, toys and games that were played with on Christmas Day and are now lying forgotten on the floor or under the sofa.

January can bring us back to earth with a bump. The overindulgence during the Christmas break sees us joining all sorts of diet plans and schemes or signing up for a *dry* January. The credit card bills need paying and all the jobs that we were putting off until next year must now be taken care of.

However there are some winners from this generous spirit. Charitable giving rises at Christmas with many people now giving money to charity in lieu of sending Christmas cards. Charity concerts and fundraising Christmas fairs are organised. The latest fad in Christmas jumper wearing raises money for charities on *Christmas Jumper Day*; Christmas certainly is a time for giving.




Before the service commenced, Brown Owl (Heather Hays) was presented with her 40 years' Service Award to recognise her work with the Guiding Movement.
