












#### **Christmas Card to the Queen**

The idea of failure might seem a strange topic for a Church letter and yet it is such an important part of life as the quotes above suggest. It is often through failure that we learn the most. If we only do what we can already do, we never push ourselves to achieve more, learn to do something new, fulfil our true capabilities and reach our full potential.

Of course God knows our true capabilities and full potential. He has a plan for each and every one of us. He knows what we can really do if we put our minds to it and take that extra step. In Education Sunday this year we looked at the story of Jonah. The man who was asked by God to do something he really didn't want to; something that was hard and difficult and unpleasant. Rather than facing up to his task, Jonah runs away and jumps aboard a boat sailing in the opposite direction. God is angered and sends a storm and Jonah, realising he is to blame for the plight of his

fellow sailors, is thrown overboard whereupon he is eaten by a sea creature. His time inside the belly of the sea creature gives him an opportunity to think and pray and talk to God and finally he agrees to take on the task God had set him. (For a fuller account read the Book of Jonah in the Old Testament).

It is unlikely the story is true but, like the parables in the New Testament, it is written to make a point; it is only when Jonah completely trusted in God and followed him faithfully that he was saved from his plight. Because Jonah failed, he was forced to think carefully about his situation and face up to the task he was challenged with. God does not call the equipped but he equips those whom he calls. We need to trust in God and he will help us to achieve what we are meant to achieve.

I wonder how many of us are being called by God. How many of us are ignoring God's plan for us? How many of us are even listening? I often hear people say, Oh I would come to Church but we are busy on a Sunday or I would love to sing in the choir - maybe I'Il come along in the New Year/after Easter/in the autumn... Others simply dismiss the church, seeing it as having nothing to do with their lives. But are they being a bit too like Jonah? How can they say the Church has no relevance when they have never been?

Others who attend church regularly are just as guilty of being like Jonah. When did any of us really listen to God's call, really seek out God's plan for us? With the annual Church meetings coming up (12<sup>th</sup> March St Giles' and 19<sup>th</sup> March St Mary's) there are always new posts that need to be filled. Why not prayerfully consider whether you are reaching the full potential that God can see in you? Could you be the next Churchwarden? Or serve on the PCC? Or help with teas and coffees?

My challenge for everyone this Lent is to come along to one of the Church services throughout the week and listen for what God's plan might be for you. Maybe you will hear God's call. Maybe you won't, but what have you got to lose? Or are you too afraid of failure?
