Multi Use Game Area (MUGA)

The Parish Council is looking at replacing the basketball facility in Great Waltham recreation ground with a MUGA.



The lowest cost option is to do this by locating it on the current tarmac base as a "one-ended" combined multi-sport facility.

This means the minifootball pitch won't change, along with

the main pitch, something that quite a few residents have said is important. The MUGA comes with a number of possible options including cricket, basketball and football. It can be used all year round, is suitable for all ages and uses a noise deadening construction. 

Correction to car parking times: The trial parking at the Village Hall is limited to a two hour maximum (no return within one hour) free public car parking between <u>8.30am</u> and <u>5.30pm</u> Monday to Friday. There are nine allocated bays – the 4 bays fronting South Street and 5 (including one accessible bay) adjacent to the exit. The trial began on 1 July 2019 and lasts until midnight on 31 December 2019 and, if successful, the intention is to continue the arrangement.

The main thing occupying me this month was the travellers moving into Ford End

Recreation Ground on Sunday 23rd July. I was able to initiate the eviction process straight away on the same day using the Essex Countywide Traveller Unit (ECTU) which is a partnership of Essex County Council, local councils, Essex Fire and Rescue Service and Essex Police. Notice to Leave was served Monday 24th,summons obtained in court and served Thursday 27th with 24 hours compliance, and bailiffs ready to go in on Friday 28th. The travellers left on the evening of Thursday 27th. I have sent my thanks to ECTU and congratulated them on a smooth and fast process.

The City Council Meeting of 16th July considered a motion to declare a Climate and Ecological Emergency that requires urgent action to make the Council's activities net-zero carbon by 2030. Quite a few District and City Councils are signing up to similar initiatives. The motion, which included aspirations across the Council's range of functions, was supported cross party and passed unanimously.

At the same meeting, the modifications to the Chelmsford Local Plan were approved and a recommendation made for these to go forward to public consultation.

The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel – Chair) of the Parish Council Meeting of Monday 17th June 2019. The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and at the Parish Website <u>https://www.essexinfo.net/great-waltham-parish/</u>

It was reported that ClIrs Steel and Martin met with ECC Highways Cabinet Member ClIr Bentley on May 21st and discussed the suitability of Ford End for an average speed camera system. The proposal was well received by ClIr Bentley who stated he would support the request but made no commitment to make the necessary funds available. He did however, agree to pay the costs of his officers to develop a design plan which would confirm the suitability of the site.

The Parish Council discussed the various proposed capital projects GW MUGA, FE MUGA, GW Changing Rooms refurbishment, and Bury Lane allotments mains water provision and considered the available budget from Section 106 and CIL provisions, supplemented by grant applications. Noting that the GW MUGA may takes some time, it was decided to get a quote to repair the current basketball area. It was agreed that a new MUGA would still be considered in GW, but the public feedback was against anything which removed the mini-football pitch and a MUGA on this site was ruled out. The concept of MUGAs in GW and FE to be put to the schools to see if there was a need. It was agreed that the Changing Rooms refurbishment should proceed and quotes obtained and application for grants progressed.

The Parish Council have been negotiating with the GW Village Hall trustees to move its Parish Office to the VH. In principle, the level of ongoing rent/costs were acceptable but there was still a debate to be had around how the decorations for the office are funded.

The verti-quaking, weed and feed, and sanding and seeding the goalmouths, had been done on the GW football field and a review would be done in a month. A number of improvements to the allotments were discussed – communal compost area, timing of invoices, plot numbering, smaller plots communal decking area and adding mains water to Bury Lane.

It was agreed that GWPC would lead a sub-committee, comprising other parish organisations, to look at the 75th VE celebrations planned for next May.

Following successful interview of 4 prospective candidates for the 4 Cllr vacancies, ait was agreed to co-opt all candidates.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held **19th August 2019**, at the Parish Office. The Public and Press are welcome to attend. The agenda will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.

The Old Fire Station in South Street will become available for lease when the Parish Council moves to the Village Hall. It has two offices, a central meeting room, a kitchen, a toilet and one parking space. To enquire, contact a.weedon@sky.com.
