## Pleas for volunteers & new members

Two village institutions threatened with closure

Great Waltham Horticultural Society is desperately seeking a new show secretary and volunteers to help run this year's Annual Flower & Produce Show on Saturday, September 21.

The Society committee has set **Friday**, **March 22** as deadline day after which, if not enough support is forthcoming, a decision will have to be made to either scale back the show or cancel it completely. If that happens, it will be the end of a village tradition that began way back in 1873.

Held across both the village hall and the primary school, last year's event attracted more than 1,000 entries; showcasing everything from flowers to vegetables, cakes, wines and photographs, plus an array of entries from schoolchildren, including robots from recycled materials, miniature gardens, and handwriting competitions.

Previous show secretary Jane Moore stepped down in January after nearly 10 years in the role, and the committee has paid tribute to her hard work, saying: "Jane did a tremendous job organising the show and she has our sincere gratitude for everything she has done.

"While we very much want the show to continue, we are unable to fill Jane's shoes from within our committee, and that's why we want to appeal to anyone with great organisational skills and some time to spare, to come and join us and keep this great village tradition alive."

Although much of the early planning for the show has already been completed, the show secretary plays a vital role in helping to coordinate the event in the run-up to the big day and ensuring everything runs smoothly over the weekend.

In addition, volunteers will required to help set up the show the night before (Friday, September 20) and on the day itself, with tasks including selling tickets on the door, serving refreshments and both setting up and taking down the displays.

#### From the Vicarage,

The month of March celebrates many things, from the beautiful spring flowers we see dotted about our gardens and countryside to end of the month where the clocks go forward an hour and Daylight Saving Time starts, giving us more daylight in the evening. For many this is a relief as we move away from the winter and the dark nights towards the Spring, budding with new life.

March is also Women's History Month, where heroines of history are remembered for shaping the modern world. Women including Amy Johnson, Rosalind Franklin, Ada, Countess of Lovelace and Eleanor Duchess of Aquitaine. This tide of loss sweeps in and out over the course of the year but it is perhaps made more poignant at Mothering Sunday. As a church we hold the two tensions together and invite you to come as you are where you will find a service to meet your needs because we serve a God that is compassionate towards us, and draws near to us wherever we may find ourselves. Whether we are joyful and celebrate or whether we are sad, lonely and feel like we are covered in darkness, His light and His love break in.

## News from Great Waltham C of E Primary School

We have reached the halfway point of the school year. Our Y6 children are now counting down heir last 1.5 terms at primary school. They have much to look forward to.

The Collective Worship theme in the last week before half-term was 'Our Community'. ## Ford End Gardening Club

John Walker visited the club on 11 February to give a talk on the pronunciation, derivation and meaning of plant names.

Of course we are talking about the Latin names for all our flora. By giving plants a Latin name means that it remains the same throughout the world and prevents confusion. For instance, what is called a buttercup in the Caribbean is nothing like our own and is in fact Allamanda. In Shakespeare's words 'That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet'.

Theophrastus (370-287BC) described and listed plants for illnesses and was the first to carry out any work of this type. So many learned botanists collected and catalogued plants over the centuries including Columbus and our own Essex boy (born in Bocking) John Ray (1627-1705) who attended Cambridge University, became the father of English botany. There is a brilliant section devoted to him in the Braintree Museum.

The speaker for our March meeting on the 11th will be Stephen Westover (from Gosfield Woodland Products) who will be talking about woodland management. This will be held in the Ford End Village Hall starting at 7.30 and, as always, we will be pleased to see new faces.

### LITTLE WALTHAM GARDENING CLUB

The subject of the February meeting was Bumblebees and their importance to horticulture and agriculture.

John Taylor,a member of the Bumblebee Conservation Trust and keen amateur entomologist, gave a power point presentation outlining the various species of bumblebee found in the UK, their life cycles, habitats and optimum living requirements. Of the 18 species in the UK, many are under threat due to habitat loss, lack of flowers, predators, parasites and poisonous sprays.

Due to their long tongues (Proboscis), the bumblebees are more efficient pollina-tors than even honeybees as they can reach into diverse flower shapes and thereby achieve fertilization over a broader variety of plants.

In some areas of the world where bumblebees have become extinct, crops such as tomatoes and apples have to be pollinated by hand.

Hence, it is important that gardeners provide conditions in which bumblebees can thrive by cultivating suitable flowering plants over as long a season as possible. John gave a list of bumblebee friendly plants and stressed that due to warmer, shorter winters, the queen bumblebees come out of hibernation earlier and require early Spring flowers from which to collect the nectar and pollen.

The subject of the monthly Presidents' Trophy competition was 'a stem of any flower in bloom in the garden' and the winner was Doris Brown.

The next meeting will take place on Wednesday 6th March, 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall, Little Waltham. An Annual General Meeting will be held, followed by the Gardening Club's version of 'Pointless'.

## A brief history of Great Waltham Village Hall

The Great Waltham Village Hall is known as the HULTON HALL and is a registered charity.

The original building was constructed by the generosity of Reverend Henry Edward Hulton on former allotment land fronting South Street which he purchased from John Joliffe Tufnell for £53 and then gifted on 9<sup>th</sup> July 1889 to the trustees of the charity in his name for "promoting the religious, moral, social and intellectual welfare and the rational recreation of the inhabitants of the Parish of Great Waltham".

The charity was administered by the vicar and churchwardens of Great Waltham as trustees and the village hall was used as a men's club, a school classroom and community hall until 1967 when the charity was registered with a formal constitution.

Since then the charity has been managed by a Committee of Management for the object of "the provision and maintenance of a village hall for the use of the inhabitants of the Parish of Great Waltham (as constituted on 9 July 1889) without distinction of political, religious or other opinions, including use for meetings, lectures and classes, and for other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupations, with the object of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants".

The trustees have legal duties and obligations towards the charity and its objects and are assisted by volunteer officers who perform great work keeping the Village Hall viable.

Towards the end of the 1960s the village hall was modernised and extended and on 5 February 1971 the extent was considerably enlarged by a gift of land comprising a large part of what is now the northern part of the car park as well as the abutting footpath from South Street towards Wolmers Hey, by Notal Limited.

On 4 September 1973, land at the village hall was leased at a rent of £1 per annum to Chelmsford Rural District Council for a public car-park but in recent years, Chelmsford City Council gave notice to end their lease, terminating public use of the car park and returning it to the trustees along with the burden of maintenance, repair and management.

The Trustees have an ongoing programme of maintenance, repair and improvement which has included the recent modernisation of the kitchen, refurbishment of the committee room, installation of double patio doors and LED lighting in the hall as well as tree management. The hall ceiling will be plastered and the hall redecorated with new curtains fitted in the near future.

The HOP will serve a community of 377,000, including Chelmsford, Braintree, Maldon, South Woodham Ferrers, Witham and the surrounding villages.

Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Essex, Mrs Jennifer Tolhurst attended the launch and said: "I am delighted to be able to join you all for this very special occasion to officially launch the new Farleigh Hospice Outreach Project vehicle, affectionately known as the HOP. The information team of specially trained staff and volunteers will provide much needed information and



support for people who have a life-limiting illness, listening to their concerns and worries and sharing information about Farleigh Hospice and other services available to them.

"This service is also offered to support families, carers and people who are bereaved. The team work closely with other national and local charities and Broomfield Hospital to ensure information is up to date, relevant and easily accessible."







# THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY www.hundredparishes.org.uk

The pond by the village green at Finchingfield is a much photographed and much painted example of the idyllic view of the English countryside where ducks swim and white clouds are reflected in its calm waters. The area of the Hundred Parishes has a variety of similar ponds. Those alongside roads were often formed from ancient extraction pits for clay or gravel; others appeared where earth had been extracted for building work. Some are surviving medieval fish ponds or the remnants of moats around old farm houses. Ponds on farms provided water for livestock, but following the reduction in cattle and sheep-rearing many have been filled in.

Fortunately, a number of private gardens have ponds where aquatic plants provide a haven for a wide variety of creatures that depend on such water bodies for their survival. Dipping a net into a pond will reveal snails, the assorted larvae of

dragonflies, water beetles and midges. Larger ponds may support fish.

Amphibians such as frogs, toads and newts need to lay their eggs within water but will spend much of their adult lives on land, eating a range of garden pests if there is some dense vegetation and a rockery nearby. These creatures have become quite scarce in the wider countryside with the reduction in suitable habitats.

During March, the croaking of male frogs hoping to attract a mate is one of the sounds of spring. Local records of any adult amphibians and locations of spawn provide valuable information about their distribution and behaviour. If you are fortunate to see frogs, toads or newts in your local ponds, then please do pass this information to either the Essex Field Club or the Freshwater Habitats Organisation. The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel – Chair) of the Parish Council Meeting of **Monday 21**<sup>st</sup> **January 2019.** The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and at the Parish Website to <a href="https://www.greatwaltham.org.uk">www.greatwaltham.org.uk</a>

CCC Cllr Knight talked about the 19/20 Council tax rate and pointed out that only 11% goes to the City Council, 78% to County and the rest to PCs and Police. ECC Cllr Aldridge discussed the "Hot Spots" traffic report for Ford End and will chase Highways for a response. Cllr Martin reported back on the meeting he, Cllr Steel and FERTC had with Safer Road Partnership in relation to Average Speed Cameras in Ford End. This was a positive meeting and the Partnership would give their support. However, these would not be funded by ECC and initial investigations has shown costs to be prohibitive with at least £75K installation cost although the Partnership would fund ongoing maintenance (Revenue goes to Central Govt). More accurate costing to be sought

The offer from CHP to GWPC, for 14 car parking spaces on the old garages site in GW, was discussed. Cllr Steel summarised the 26 page T&C/Proposal from CHP which is for public parking (with 4 spaces allocated to Scouts) and would require GWPC to maintain and administer. Prior to the meeting, Cllr Steel had sought answers to some specific concerns; e.g., What would happen if GWPC did not take them on. CHP responded that they had no firm plans. Whilst the PC would need to review and agree terms in detail (possibly by using Legal support), the main decision of the meeting was to agree whether GWPC would be willing, in principle, to take this on. It was agreed that such a decision was dependent upon an acceptable level of ongoing cost and removal of certain conditions. Cllr Steel to respond to CHP.

Regarding the Changing rooms on the Rec Ground, Cllr Steel and Huggins presented the work they had done outlining possible options – refurbish with or without office and total rebuild. The local football team had been consulted on the requirements and very budgetary estimates had been looked at (local builder for refurb, and Sport England for rebuild). Sport England suggested £150K to £200K for a rebuild. Refurb would be £60K to £100K. Given such high costs, there was a long debate about the need, but "do nothing" was not an option as the current building was in a poor state. Sport England costs are based on a green field site and likely it would be lower and a more accurate costs should be sought. Also to consider a smaller facility – e.g., office + toilets + locker room

With regard to broadband in Ford End, Cllr Steel presented an overview of the history – CBB currently provided wireless system as alternative BT FTTC quote was prohibitive and fell on the community. CBB now aiming to bring Ultrafast 'True Fibre' broadband which will deliver fibre to houses. However, CBB needs people to pre-order the service with a 30% of contractual commitment (FE and surrounding proposed area - round 67 users required). Apparently, the target has been met and design work will commence – surveys Spring 2019 and construction Summer 2010.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held **18<sup>th</sup> March 2019**,at the Parish Office. The Public and Press are welcome to attend. The agenda will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.
