LITTER PICKING

Yet again the residents of Great Waltham Parish have surpassed themselves. On Saturday 12th March the Parish Clear Up attracted the support of between 30 and 40 litter pickers. Some were our stalwarts who turn out year after year but it was good to also see some new faces and especially a young litter picker, Jasmine Driscoll. The whole job takes less than 4 hours and was finished by lunchtime

with the volunteers returning home in the satisfied knowledge that the verges and ditches and the surrounds of our villages was litter free.

A very big thank you to all of the willing helpers who got involved this year – here are a few waiting to start. If you were unable to join in on this occasion then you will have another opportunity when the Autumn clear up day takes place on **Satur**-

day 1st October – so make a note in your diary now because with more people we could cover more of the parish.

You are also encouraged to carry out litter picking activities throughout the Summer. Great Waltham has once again entered the Essex Village of the Year and Best Kept Village Competition so households, local shops, pubs and businesses are asked to keep their surroundings as tidy as they can. After the great success in 2010 let's see if we can do it again in 2011.

DOG FOULING – whilst generally the litter was superficial, mostly coming from traffic passing through the Parish there re-



mains one real problem which attention is drawn to. This is with dog owners gathering up their dog droppings in bags and then indiscriminately dumping them. The worst area for this this year was the garage area between Cherry Garden Road and Duffries Close. Please, please whoever this is have some sense of decency – consider the health of the young children who pass this area time and time again on their way to and from school. There are bins at either end of Cherry Garden Road and another on Great Waltham Recreation Ground. There is no excuse for such laziness and filthy habits. Local residents are asked to remain vigilant. If the offender can be named and caught they could be fined up to $\pounds1000$.



TREE PLANTING

Tree planting has been carried out in the Parish with two replacement flowering Cherry Trees Prunus Kanzan being planted to replace damaged trees in Cherry Garden Road. Dear Friends,

Part way through March I had the privilege of greeting our new Bishop of Chelmsford, Bishop Stephen to the Deanery of Chelmsford North. He wanted meet with all the clergy in the 14 parishes that make up our deanery, but also to have the opportunity of meeting as many people in the congregations from each of the churches as possible, as well as seeing some of the other things that happen in this lively deanery.

The Lay Chair and I spent time some while back, working out how best to use the time we had, to show him as much as possible, and let him meet lots of people. It was a busy schedule, beginning with me picking him and his Chaplain up from Bishopscourt at 10.30am, arriving at Holy Trinity Springfield for Prayers at 11am, followed by his inspiring address and then discussion with his clergy and lunch. At 1.15pm we left to go to Bishops' School in North Springfield, where the children sang some really lively songs to welcome him and he had them in hoots of laughter with the story of Mr. Grumpy. We then left for the Anglia Ruskin University, where we went around the William Harvey building and the very new medical research centre. This was an opportunity for the Chaplains from Broomfield Hospital to come and see where the nursing staff are trained and to meet some of the staff, as well as the University Chaplain, because it is so important that the nurses recognise the need for treating the whole person, and not just the physical F needs. We went on to Farleigh Hospice, where he shared some of his experiences of working as 'the tea boy' as he described himself, when he was only 20, but feeling a strong 'calling' to the priesthood, even though he didn't go to church hardly at all at that time!!

At 5.30pm we were due in Writtle for a supper with the retired clergy, who help us so much in the deanery, with covering services and sharing their wisdom, together with their spouses. This was followed by an evening service in Writtle Church, when we were treated to yet more inspirational {as well as extremely humorous} preaching. I eventually took him and his Chaplain back to Margaretting at about 9.30pm

WHAT A DAY!! But it was really good to see that our new leader of this enormous Diocese of Chelmsford has a real passion for meeting and listening to people and for the Gospel in equal shares. It was a delight to get to know him better so soon after his arrival. He will be in the town centre on

Good Friday - well worth hearing.



DIGITAL TV SWITCHOVER IS COMING AND HELP IS AT HAND

For older and disabled viewers who may find making the switch difficult, the Switchover Help Scheme is at hand to provide practical help and assistance to turn one TV set to digital. The Switchover Help Scheme can help you

convert your TV to digital if you:

Are aged 75 or over, or

-Have lived in a care home for six months or more, or

- Get (or could get)
 - o Disability Living Allowance (DLA), or
 - o Attendance or Constant Attendance Allowance, or
 - o Mobility Supplement, or
- Are registered blind or partially sighted

Most people will be asked to pay £40 towards the standard option of help. This includes easy to use equipment to switch one TV, an approved installer, an aerial upgrade if needed and a 12 month aftercare service, including a free helpline. The service is free for people who are eligible and who also receive pension credit, income support, income-based jobseeker's allowance or income-related employment and support allowance.

If you are eligible, the Help Scheme will write to you directly and in plenty of time to ask if you want help. All you need to do is respond to our letter by sending back a completed reply form or to make things even easier you can call the Help Scheme free to respond.

Eligible people in our local area have been identified and should have received a letter to explain the switchover programme, and the people must respond to get help. There will be 2 further reminders. Many of the eligible people will be fortunate to have relatives, friends or neighbours to assist them with their response. However, some are not so fortunate, and the concern is that these people are amongst those least likely to understand the process.

Pastoral Team report to the APCM 4 April 2011

The Team continues to telephone/visit/support those who are bereaved or who need a listening ear and we are always ready to respond to such needs, if and when, they are requested. We have benefitted from 2 training sessions in the past year: the first was a session on "Spirituality and Mental Health" when Revd Simon Garwood helped us to understand the close connections between these for all of us, but particularly when our mental wellbeing is under threat from stress or when diagnosed with a mental health problem. Secondly we met with Jo Metson who is the Village Agent (funded by the Rural Community Council for Essex) for this group of villages and hamlets. She explained how she is often able to advise and support those of us who may be in need of a service or a contact, and where the isolation of village life adds to problems, for some people. We have a training session in the process of being arranged in April.

Our Team members have a varied range of gifts and our involvement in the community reflects this. We continue to visit Dannatts monthly, and run our Thurs morning coffee

shop; some of us make regular visits to some elderly parishioners and also take regular HC. Just before Christmas some of us began a Lunch Club which meets in the Beehive on the first Monday of the month. It began as being advertised "for those who live alone" but all are welcome to come to chat and eat together. Several Team members have again had valuable input into Carla's marriage prep sessions.

Some of us have been joined by others to form a church steward rota last summer – this has enabled the church to be staffed whilst being open to visitors and it is intended to continue this again in the better weather.

We give thanks for those who are always willing to listen and my prayer is that during the coming months, a new Team Leader will be identified to carry the Team forward after I leave at Easter 2012.

Great Waltham Parish Council News

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council (PC), was held at the Old Fire Station Great Waltham on Monday 21st February 2011. Chairman: Mr A Micklem.

Mr Ian Leyde has been co-opted to fill the vacancy at the Ford End Ward.

Clerk's Monthly Report

Work on the surface of the footpath from Broads Green to Partridge Green has now been completed and it is currently a permissive cycle route.

The paths over Great Waltham Recreation Ground to the children's play area have been installed.

Parish Elections will take place on 5th May 2011 and nomination papers are now available. Open evenings have been arranged at Ford End Village Hall on Wednesday 16th March 2011 at 7pm and,

at the Parish Office on Thursday 17th March 2011 at 7pm to speak to potential candidates for election. Nine people have volunteered to carry out snow clearance in the Parish.

Battery recycling points have been provided at the Old Fire Station and at Walthambury Stores.

ECC have informed that a 100% grant in the sum of £8,430 has been awarded from the Community Initiatives Fund for additional play equipment at Great Waltham Recreation Ground. Other Business

County Councillor Aldridge spoke of cuts in hours to public libraries but stated that the Mobile Library service would remain the same. Car Parking Charges were generally set to increase. He was hopeful that the proposed Community Speedwatch charge would be scrapped. The theft of drain covers is currently a problem and vigilance was called for. It was anticipated that there may be a rise in the number of travellers in the area and, once again vigilance was called for.

Borough Councillor Ashford indicated that a suggestion had been made for a public consultation to take place at Ford End Village Hall, regarding the proposed development of the former brewery site at Hartford End.

He also affirmed that a report into the North Chelmsford Area Action Plan

Should be ready by 21st April 2011 and would be made public after the Borough Council elections had taken place on 5th May.

The Parish Clean Up will take place on 12th March 2011 and details will be given in the March issue of the Parish News.

The Chelmsford Borough Council Street Care Service will be asked to cut back the grass which is overgrowing on footways between: Ash Tree corner and Great Waltham, Great Waltham Village and Howe Street, Ringtail Green and Ford End School, Ford End Village and Kings Farm.

Mr Bell suggested that the gutter should also be tidied up in Pleshey Road Ford End to Woods Road Ford End.

The Annual assembly will take place on the 16th May 2011 at Great Waltham Village Hall. The speaker and theme for the evening will be chosen from the following subjects in order of priority: Sir Alan Haselhurst MP to speak on 'The Big Society and Localism', A representative from Broomfield Hospital to speak on the development/services at the hospital, A representative from CBC to speak on 'Emergency Planning'.

In order to deter parking on the Greensward areas in Cherry Garden Road, a request is to be made to ECC to replace the ramped areas with kerbstones.

The Willow tree between the Beehive Public House and the Walthambury Stores is diseased. It was agreed that Greene King should be asked first to apply to CBC for permission to fell the tree and then, (once permission had been given), to arrange for the tree to be felled. Greene King would then be encouraged to finance the planting of a replacement tree in another area of the Parish.

Two separate requests have been made for additional bus stops in the areas of The Green Man Public House Howe Street and, Wall Farm/Kings Farm Ford End. It was agreed that these would be considered and, form part of the Transport Needs Assessment Survey due in late April 2011.

Mr Tony Sidwell the present temporary handyman has found alternative employment and has resigned. An advertisement will be placed in the March edition of the Parish News for a new handyman.
