News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School

We have reached half-term and the children are to be commended for the way they have adapted to the new routines that are in place to keep us all safe. It is so hard to expect children to keep to social distancing rules – especially our younger pupils. They have all been very good at ensuring they keep to the rules



and wash / sanitise their hands at regular intervals. As we near halfterm Essex is now placed into Tier 2 of the government guidance for keeping the infection rate down. We all hope that the measures work and things improve.

In school, the children have settled very well, especially our new EYFS pupils. Sadly, they cannot mix with other children yet due to the 'bubbles' in school but



they are certainly enjoying each other's company. Y6 children are ready to take up their 'buddy' roles to help the children in their first year in school. We hope they can enjoy some contact time later in the year.

In Collective Worship we have explored themes of New Beginnings, Aspirations, Talents, Good to be Me, Harvest, Faith and Reflections. Collective Worship is currently 'virtual' – children participating in their classes through a video link. We have shared Bible Stories, ideas, thoughts and said prayers.

Four of our classes offered some resources they had used for a class based Harvest Assembly to St Marys and St Lawrence church for their Harvest Service on 18th October. Classes recorded their assemblies on video to share with their families via the 'Google Classroom'.

In lessons, KS1 children are enjoying their topic, 'Incredible Me' and KS2 are learning lots about the Ancient Greeks.

The children are making links from previous learning in the core subjects and concepts they may have forgotten are coming back into focus. Getting used to concentrating and working independently again was a challenge for some pupils but the teachers can see big improvements already.



Is your emergency mobile phone still working??

Many people, especially the older generation, have a simple pay-as-you-go mobile phone that they only use occasionally. Like me, you may have had it for years but find that it comes in handy to stick in your pocket when going out alone so you can summon help in an emergency or to give to a family member to 'tide them over' if they lose their smart phone. During the pandemic, you may not have needed to use this phone and, until an emergency arises, you may not be aware that it has been disconnected!!! - and not only is the SIM disconnected but any money that you had on the card is also lost!!!

I was alerted to the problem by a friend who got stuck at the airport, unable to call her booked taxi – and there are no pay phones. I checked my 'spare' mobile only to discover mine was disconnected too!! Subsequent calls to other friends unearthed lots more people in the same situation. Online searches with our various providers produced little helpful information and most found it necessary to speak to a human – easier said than done! - and involved protracted calls to automated systems and necessitated repeatedly ignoring the messages about 'your phone number is not recognised' until the system finally gave up and connected you to a human – probably on the other side of the world!

Although there was some variation between providers, the main message was that if you have not used the pay-as-you-go phone for a period of time, typically 90 days, it will be disconnected by the provider and any money you had on that SIM is lost! In addition, some providers said that 'your' number could not be reconnected, as it has been reallocated! After a formal complaint and protracted phone call, I managed to get my number reconnected.

Although my number was unchanged and my contacts list was still intact, any credit on the SIM had gone, so my first task was to top it up. My provider's website, like most others, encourages you to top up your pay-as-you-go SIM with a 'Bundle' of calls, texts and data at £10, £20 etc. that need to be renewed monthly – which is very different from the system I used previously where I put £10 on the card and topped it up every year or so!

All Is not lost though, for if you ask, or look very hard on the provider's website, you may well find that they offer a 'Lite Tariff' – which provides the same simple voice calls and texts only as in the past; however, it probably requires you to make a call every so many days – the exact number varies with the provider.

Finally, when you top up your credit on your phone, take care to avoid being put onto one of those 'Bundles' requiring monthly renewal by accident. During a recent hospital stay, a friend used her mobile phone more than usual and thought that she had topped up the credit, as usual. However, she now finds that not only has the phone has been disconnected but she has received a letter from the provider demanding payment for two month's renewal on her Bundle before it would be reconnected!!! So, if you have a 'spare' mobile phone, check it now and best of luck with getting it reinstated if you find that it no longer works!!

Footpaths – A message from Great Waltham Parish Council:

We are very fortunate to be surrounded by numerous footpaths. The Essex County Council interactive map (see link below) is a good place to check out all the footpaths in the county and you can zoom in on your location.

Select the Public Rights of Way (PROW) asset and it will show you the footpaths, bridleways, and byways.

Many of these are on private property, such as a farmer's field, but the public have a right of way across them. Please respect the rules associated with each type of PROW:

Footpaths - can be traversed by foot, mobility scooter or wheelchair, but only via the designated track. Use by horses, bicycles or vehicles is not allowed.

Bridleways - same as footpaths except users are also permitted to ride or lead a horse and ride bicycles (not motorcycles which are powered two wheeled vehicles).

Byways (also known as Byways Open to All Traffic -BOAT) – are roads with a soft surface that can, in addition to horses and pedestrians, be used by road-legal vehicles – i.e., the same rules as standard highways apply requiring tax, insurance and MOT. Under-age or banned drivers, non-road-legal scramblers & quad bikes are not allowed on BOATs.

Misuse of any of these by motorised vehicles is an offence under Section 34 of the Road Traffic Act and should be reported to the police. Misuse by other means, such as horses being ridden on a footpath, comes under the trespass laws and lies with the landowner.

The Hundred Parishes Society

Since March, getting out in the countryside has been greatly encouraged.

Successive generations have shaped this fertile land and, profiting from its production, many constructed beautiful buildings that reflected pride in their locality. Today, a significant number of these are listed buildings. Our rich architectural tapestry is brilliantly recorded in *The Hundred Parishes: An Introduction,* available by mail order from the Society's website or from local bookshops and Tourist Information Centres.

Museum collections of assorted artefacts and documents add another dimension to the human history of the area. Saffron Walden Museum opened in 1835 and houses a real treasure trove of historical and other material relating to the local area. Smaller museums hold collections of agricultural implements, local artefacts and archive material. These include the Grade II* building of the Forge Museum in Much Hadham, housing a collection of metal tools and striking medieval wall paintings, while Ashdon Village Museum has exhibits about life in the 20th century. We look forward to the time when our museums can safely reopen.

Meanwhile, we can enjoy our heritage and celebrate the past by continuing to explore outdoors. With regular additions of new walks to the Society's website, we can use these descriptive routes, some as short as 1 mile, to explore the cultural landscapes that make up the Hundred Parishes. Great Waltham Village Hall

The Annual General Meeting of Great Waltham Village Hall. postponed from May because of the meetings restrictions on in COVID-19 consequence of the pandemic, was held on 30 September 2020 with nine in attendance observing social distancing. The Chair of Trustees, David Chapman, outlined significant improvements to the premises and hire spaces since the 2019 AGM and the challenges of the Covid19 Emergency since March 2020. The relocation of the Parish Council office to the Village Hall and the Council's hire of parking spaces for weekday public use had provided a valuable new income stream which. together with Preschool's continued presence through the Emergency Period, the government's £10,000 Covid19 grant and a trustee policy of financial prudence, had safeguarded the viability of the Village Hall as confirmed by the Treasurer's report. The Chair announced that CCTV would shortly be installed to help combat increasing vandalism and unauthorised parking, and a grant application had been made to Essex County Council to part fund the refurbishment of toilets, the creation of an accessible toilet and additional storage facilities.

Retiring as trustee after 8 years, a gift was presented to Jo Palmer with thanks for her dedication and energy; under her chairmanship the Village Hall premises and bookings had greatly improved and the trustees were able to look forward with confidence that the Village Hall would continue in normal times as a valuable community asset.

David Chapman and Geri Roe were re-elected and Heather Hollamby was elected as trustees. Michael Proctor and Laura Mitson were appointed representative trustees. were given to Finally, thanks volunteers and supporters who provide essential help to keep the Village Hall going. The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel – Chair) of the Parish Council Meetings of **22nd September 2020.** The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and at the Parish Website <u>https://e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish/</u>

The council considered how to best and quickly address a number of recreation equipment defects and agreed that the Recreation Committee Chair (in conjunction with the Chair and Clerk) can proceed with repairs or replacement to junior goalposts, fence and gate repairs, Tower Ladder and base repairs, and swing seat replacement. The need to get 3 quotes for each item was suspended, if individually under £500.

After discussion, the Parish Council decided that the litter Pick can proceed in Great Waltham and Howe Street on 17th and 18th October, provided the pickers complied with current Covid-19 regulations. The Parish Council believe that this is possible and recommend that all appropriate PPE and safety conditions are met.

The ECC Cllr confirmed that a grant of \pounds 1,000, from the Locality Fund, had been approved. The funds will be used for picnic seating and benches on the planned woodland walk in Ford End.

GWPC considered the request to clarify the regulations and byelaws of public rights of way. It was agreed to publish an article in the Parish News pointing to the ECC website that shows the various footpaths and bridleways and explaining the difference between them.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held **19:00 Monday 16th November 2020**, with joining details included in the agenda, which will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.
