Ford End held another very successful Scarecrow Festival and Open Gardens, with about 50 locations in the village either displaying the most wonderful scarecrows, and/or opening some very lovely gardens!



We had an amazing variety of scarecrows, from Snow White to the Blues Brothers, pirates to Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, and also the biggest scarecrow I have ever seen. Worzel Gummidge was running amok, looking for Aunt Sally, and our judges of the scarecrow competition, Enid and Alan, had a really tough time making decisions on the winners whilst being chauffeured around the village in a vintage car. The children were given a scarecrow trail to follow, with sweets being handed out if they got the right answer to a riddle.

We had some super feedback, with lots of people commenting on the feel good factor and friendly atmosphere, which I thought was lovely. With an estimated 500 visitors on the day, we raised a very healthy profit of £2,100, which is being split equally between the church and the village hall.

I always think the amount of help and community spirit on show from the people of Ford End is fantastic, but this time, and together with extra help from other people from around the parish, I feel we did an absolutely awesome job! So I would like to say a HUGE THANK YOU to all you wonderful people, whether you were brave enough to open your garden, or help with the organisation, spend time making scarecrows or helping out in some way, your time and efforts were hugely appreciated! I stumbled across a Wordle app which created a picture with words I use frequently on Facebook, such as hear, love, waiting, lost, praying and peace.

It reminded me that words are incredibly powerful. They can be agents for love, laughter, wisdom, empathy, building up and healing. Alternatively, they can be weapons which wound, tear down, belittle or spread falsehoods and gossip.

News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School

The school year has drawn to a close; so much to celebrate. The end of year assessment results are very pleasing and reflect the hard work of the children, the staff and the support they receive at home. In EYFS. 82% of the children attained a 'Good Level of Development' an age expected standard. This is likely to be more than the national average. 81% of our children have passed



the Y1 phonics test. In KS1, our children have acquired key skills in English and Maths, with 74% of the children having the expected standard in reading, writing and maths combined. In KS2 all our scores are higher than the national averages for 2016 in three out of four areas. We scored 86% reading (NA 66%), Writing 73% (NA 74%), Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling 82% (NA 72%) and Maths 77% (NA 70%). The combined score for Y6 was a very healthy 73%, last year's NA was 53%. Well done all the children and adults for working so hard.

Our EYFS children can be very proud of their first year – the academic success was clear and the incredible enthusiasm that ensures they learn so well will continue to be nurtured at school and at home. They will return as Y1s very much ready for the next stage of their education.

Y6 children have said goodbye. They have been a credit to their families and our school. They have certainly enjoyed a great last half-term with the KS2 Production, Activity Day, a brilliant party organised by their parents and of course their Leavers' Church Service. They certainly enjoyed their Activity Day at Skreens Park; this included climbing, archery, sensory trail, kayaking and raft building, although for some it was more a case of watching others! A great time was had by all and it was good to see children overcome some 'fears' when climbing, being blindfolded and being in the water. They were very supportive of one another when taking turns, something especially important on the climbing wall. The summer performance of Pirates of the Curry Bean was led brilliantly by our Y5/6 children and all three performances were superb – well done to all the cast and the adults who prepared them so well .

Good luck to all our Leavers' and thanks to all whom helped them in their time at Great Waltham C of E Primary School. Thank you for being such good buddies to YR this year too.

We have three staff members retiring: Mrs Robertshaw has worked at GWPS for 15 years, as PPA teacher, computer technician and sports coach. Her commitment to all three will be missed and in cross country and athletics we have some big shoes to fill.

Mrs Teal has been part of the team as an LSA and office staff member for 23 years. The engine room of the school is in good hands but may seem different for a long while to come.

Mrs Tinsley has been a class teacher for 38 years at GWPS, a truly remarkable feat. A skilled and experienced teacher she always had a calming influence on children and taught them real pride and determination. The school wishes all three of them the very best in retirement, we hope to see some of them again soon as helpers at the school, where they will be very welcome.

The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel) of the Parish Council meeting of 19th June 2017. The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and the Parish website <u>www.greatwaltham.org.uk</u>.

The PC considered a letter of complaint from a resident at Dannatts, about the level of noise from the British Legion (BL). Representatives of the BL were in attendance and stated that they had had discussions with the resident before and that they had made attempts to control the music levels at the Summer Festival by bringing the last band indoors. The BL were meeting the terms and times of their licence. The resident will be informed that the PC has talked to the BL.

The PC considered the request from a newly formed Great Waltham United football team for use of the Rec Ground. The PC to confirm if it is just for one season.

There was a long discussion about how to interpret the summary tables from SID, and a conclusion to arrange the data to be presented to show statistics of 30, 34, and 40 and above (or 40, 46, 50 for the 40mph setting).

It was noted that the TP ICAP L'Etape London (an event for serious amateur cyclists emulating a day of the Tour de France) will be coming through Great Waltham on the 24th Sept. The Clerk to check if this involves road closures.

It was reported that the Clerk and RFO had achieved "Satisfactory" performance at their annual appraisals.

Cllr Steel informed the meeting that he and Joanna Steel had turned the GW phone box into a Tourist Information site, including a leaflet stack. Cllrs Johnson and Huggins confirmed that they would paint the box in the next 4 weeks.

The PC decided to look at options to clean the war memorial.

It was noted that an enforcement order was issued on the owner of the land next to the Green Man to clear the filled in ditch. The order concludes on the 11th July 2017 and if the work has not been done, CCC have stated that they will undertake the work and bill the owner. It was also noted that the Landowner has not kept the area clear of weeds as promised, and he would be reminded.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held at the PC Office, **Monday 21st August** commencing at 7.45pm; the Public and Press are welcome to attend. The agenda will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.
