From the Vicarage, Hope in the darkness

I stood in my kitchen in the early morning half light while the kettle boiled for my first cup of tea feeling fed up and tired. I have this cold that keeps going and going – this is at least its third week and I still feel dire. I know I'm not going to die, but it just drags on and on. Yesterday I had a minor argument with a parked car, and have written my car off – mind you when your car is as old as mine it doesn't take much – and I know people coping with a lot worse than that, so who am I to moan?

Things I had wanted to do - clearing up, getting things sorted haven't happened so I'm still sat in my messy office rather than the clean clear space I had envisaged in my mind. The New Year is only a few days old and it feels like the same old same old scrunginess.

When I talk to other people, things seem hard at the moment - it does seem to be getting dark so early, people are a bit depressed, struggling with getting going again into the New Year. And the thought that had popped into my head as I stood by the kettle was of the importance of hope in the darkness, hope when things look dire, or just a bit dingy and unrelenting. Hope is a candle that only really shines when it is dark. Hope that things will be ok, maybe not up to my expectations, but all will be well, even when it doesn't look like it. This too will pass. Hope for the future is so important in these dark days, hoping for spring, hoping for new life, hoping for what we cannot see at the moment.

I hear the reading love is patient, love is kind a lot — it is a favourite people choose but I heard something new in this reading the other day. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. It is love that bears these things. It is love that hopes. Love gives us what we need. I don't always feel very loving, but I don't think that's the same. So love hopes all things. Love for ourselves and other people.

I pray that you have hope at this dark time of year wherever you are, whatever you are going through. Sometimes the best we can do is to endure and to hope. It might not be very exciting but it keeps us going.

Hope in the darkness will be the theme of our healing service, a time of quiet, reflection, beautiful songs, lighting a candle, prayers for healing. Do come and join us on Sunday 22 January at 5pm at Great Waltham.





A wreath making workshop with Deb Hart was also held in December and attracted nearly 20 green-fingered participants. At the end of the evening, Deb presented a wreath to long-




standing Society stalwart Gerald Smith (pictured) to brighten up his front door in time for Christm as. Lastly. the

19th December 2016 meeting: Chair of the Parish Council, Mike Steel, presided over the meeting. Representatives of the Parish News stated that there was a possibility that the delivered paper version may cease from April 2017 if further volunteers were not forthcoming. The Parish News will appeal for more volunteers in the Jan/Feb edition to address the 10 to 20 hours per month needed. The PC decided to await the outcome of the appeal.

CCC Cllr Knight stated that the black bin collection will change to fortnightly to save £450,000 pa.

The meeting accepted the proposal of the FG&P committee to set a PC precept of £44,000. Whilst this is an increase, it was noted that the PC had reduced it for 11/12 and 13/14 and held it constant from then, in spite of the reducing Government grant (to zero for 17/18).

It was agreed to seek permission from the allotment landowner for a compost pile for use by the Handyman.

Following the last meeting, it was agreed that Cllr Jackson would open a discussion with the landowner to improve the Brookmead cobbled area.

It was noted that the £100 goodwill offer to the owner of one of the garages adjacent to the GW recreation ground had been rejected. The January meeting of the Parish Council will be held at Ford End Village Hall **Monday 16**th **January 2016** commencing at 7.45pm. The Public and Press are welcome to attend. The agenda will be published on the Parish website and boards before the meeting.
