starting with a guided tour of Cambridge and its colleges, followed by a barbecue in the evening.

The next day started with a trip to Old Leigh, including sampling the oysters, followed by a visit to Adventure Island in Southend for the kids. The French are always keen to get a day in London, and this year was no exception, with two coaches dropping them off near Trafalgar Square, allowing both French and English guests to roam the city at their leisure. Long Melford featured next, including a tour of Melford Hall.

The final day included an excursion to Jump Street for the kids, shopping in Chelmsford for the adults, and a tour of Essex County Council and Chelmsford City Council for the Ceyrat Mayor



along with our own Great Waltham Chairman. The week ended with a lavish farewell meal (pictured above) at Great Waltham Village Hall attended by Mayor of Ceyrat, Laurent Masselot, Mike Steel GWPC Chairman, ECC Chairman John Aldridge and Chelmsford City Mayor Duncan Lumley and Deputy Jon De Vries.

Great Waltham Twinning Association has been in existence since 1979 and annual visits to Ceyrat and Great Waltham have taken place with guests staying with host families in Great Waltham and surrounding areas for over 30 years. It continues to grow in popularity attracting all ages from three to 83. A variety of innovative fund- raising events are held by the Twinning Association during the year to finance the visits for French guests.

Once again Great Waltham came up trumps as its first Midsummer Music Festival proved such a great success!








concert, which will be a blend of popular Christmas songs and 60s folk, rehearsals for which will start in the autumn.

Stansted Airport handled 24.3 million passengers last year and this year will handle just over 25 million. It already has permission to grow to 35 million, granted after a five-month public inquiry held in 2007. Despite this, Manchester Airports Group, Stansted's owners, says that it now "urgently" needs permission to expand to a massive 44.5 million passenger airport over the next 12 years.



The expansion plans would mean almost 20 million more passengers and an extra 104,000 flights annually compared with today. This translates into an aircraft overflying during daytime hours from the current average of every 2¼ minutes, to a plane every 85 seconds, in contrast to the airport's claim that there will be "no significant adverse environmental effects".

Stop Stansted Expansion (SSE) is gearing up to scrutinise the application when it is lodged – expected later this year – in order to make representations on such issues as noise from overflying, impacts on local roads and rail, community wellbeing and quality of life.



The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel - Chairman) of the Parish Council meeting of 17th July 2017, held at Ford End VH. The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and at the Parish Website www.greatwaltham.org.uk

The PC reviewed the three guotes for electrical fixed wire testing of the Rec Ground changing rooms and accepted the cheapest one and will proceed with the tests and review any follow on work.

The PC noted that their response to the Dannatts resident in regard of the noise from the British Legion, had been returned.

A thank you letter has been received from Ford End and Great Waltham Churches for the grant for the hedge cutter.

A letter has been sent to the Green Man to congratulate them on winning the Essex Best Public House in the National Pub&Bar Awards 2017.

The size of the tree on Banbury Square was discussed and it was decided that the only practical action that could be taken was to raise the crown (to make it easier to maintain the grass and avoid any potential H&S issues). Further work to remove the top or reduce the width was thought to be ineffective in stopping growth and may even encourage it.


An offer to relocate the Broads Green notice board to the pub wall was rejected as the notice board is best served by being on publicly owned land.

There was a discussion on concerns around "handyman" maintenance tasks not being addressed, the management of the priorities, and the efficiency (specifically in relation to supply of materials). It was agreed to use the Highways ranger service for minor works. Also to improve the efficiency of the handyman by purchasing a new head and cable for strimmer, and a long arm lopper / chainsaw attachment.

The PC noted an e-mail from the owner of the land adjacent to the Green Man, stating that the vegetation on the land would be cut back. The ditch was due to be cleared w/c 24th July.

The next of the Parish Council will be held at the PC Office, Monday 18th September commencing at 7.45pm; the Public and Press are welcome to attend. The agenda will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.
