
A personal message to the parish from Rev. Carolyn Tibbott

I am writing to introduce myself and to explain how I am hoping to offer Christian Ministry across the villages of Great Waltham and Ford End. My name is Rev. Carolyn Tibbott and I have been the Vicar of Broomfield for 10 years now. Many of those who attend either of the Anglican churches in the Parish will know me anyway, as I have been part of the team who have provided support for Rev. Caroline Brown over the years and, since she moved, have provided some of the cover required during the parish vacancy. I am married to Jim, have four adult children and five grandchildren. I enjoy reading, swimming and baking. On my rest days I like walking by the sea. I can't wait until we can get out and about again.

The Parish of Great Waltham and Ford End are part of a larger, collaborative group of Churches known as the North Chelmsford Ministry & Mission Partnership (NCMMP). Over the last five years the churches in this group have supported one another in mission activities, providing cover when needed, encouraged our congregations to visit the other churches for worship or activities. We have also set up, with the help of the Diocese of Chelmsford, the Pioneer Ministry on the large Beaulieu and Channels Estates. There are many changes happening in the Diocese and churches are being required to find new and different ways to meet the spiritual needs of the people of God. In this same manner, as the parish of Great



Waltham & Ford End have been in vacancy for a while now, the Church Wardens of the churches and the NCMMP Council



have been working together to ensure that there is proper provision for all those who live in the villages. In response to these discussions I have offered to have pastoral oversight of the Parish of Great Waltham & Ford End until such time as a priest is licensed to the parish.

Of course, I will work closely with Rev. Sandra Sykes who is licensed to the parish as a self-supporting Minister, Preb. Neil Richardson a retired priest who has been offering ministry during the vacancy and I hope to build a team to ensure a variety of ministry continues in the months to come. I hope that Local Lay Ministers who provide some non-sacramental worship in the churches will be encouraged and supported as we work together to build up lay ministry across the parishes. We will also have the opportunity to work with Rev. Dan who is the Pioneer Minister and Rev. Jacqui who is a Pioneer Curate on the Beaulieu Estate. I believe that God calls us to work together, using our individual God given skills and vocations to ensure that both pastoral needs and worship provision is varied and satisfying for all and gives glory to God.

Although my base will remain in Broomfield, I will try to spend a day a week in the villages. I would like to be able to support the schools, the businesses and the groups that meet across the parish. I hope to meet some of you, as soon as the Covid 19 restrictions are lifted, and we can worship together again. In the meantime, I have set up a new email account greatwalthamfordendrevcat@gmail.com if you would like to get in touch please do email me and we can arrange a time to chat. Alternatively, you can call the ministry phone 07464 321616 if you need to speak to me urgently.

The restrictions of the last year have put a strain on us all, yet this has also been a time of new opportunities and finding different ways of worshipping together and offering pastoral support. I am looking forward to getting to know you all and hope

that we can enjoy worshipping God together. Do look out for me, as we come out of lockdown, and give me a wave. I am always happy to chat or pray with people and am looking forward to ministering amongst you. Carolyn

News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School


The children returned from Easter ready for the summer term after the rather truncated spring term. Schools across England actually lost 8 teaching weeks. Due to the restrictions, we are not yet able to allow the children to assemble in the hall or at church, so we held our Easter Service via a video link instead. Each class made a contribution and we listened to hymns, the Easter story and prayers

written by Y6 children.



The school PTA (FOGWS) organised a fun Egg Decoration competition with winners for each class getting a prize. FOGWS are planning some more events

for the summer term, with a focus on fundraising for a new running track at school to replace the rather old paved track.





Now we are back at school, 'Hot Chocolate Friday' has resumed - a weekly award for each class where the teacher nominates someone worthy of praise for the week at school - often a tricky task. So each week 6 children get a warming cup of hot chocolate (or squash / water if they prefer!).

Emotional Health and Well-being at Ford End Primary School

Emotional well-being is an essential part of a child's mental make-up and never more so than in our current challenging times.

Things that appear very minor to an adult with years of experience of life, may be a major issue to a young child, preoccupying the child's mind and affecting their learning. It is vital that we sort out their mental health if they are to achieve. However, we also have to ensure that regardless of their emotional state, that

they are working hard and continuing to develop academically.

It is often partly the solution that if children work hard and focus on their studies that they become happier and feel more fulfilled. They achieve success which builds their self-esteem and confidence and they become more robust in dealing with the issues that are playing on their

At Ford End, I truly believe that the school should be a sanctuary in which children feel safe and secure. School should be a place where they can talk freely about their problems and know that there is always someone that they can go to if they

wish to chat. Just knowing this gives the children an option and a safety net; somewhere to turn when they are unable to solve a problem for themselves.

We do, however, try to ensure that our children are developing some resilience to the metaphorical knocks that life invariably dishes out to everyone. It is always distressing to see children who are unable to cope with a problem and also unable to go and find help, fearing that they will lose face if they do.

At Ford End, we offer our children alternatives to the playground at lunch times.

They can access extra-curricular clubs, which are starting this term. We have a variety of sports clubs, run by specialist coaches for all children to attend if they wish. Not only is this good for them to do sport, this activity has been proven to help the emotional intelligence of both children and adults and they often return to classes refreshed and recharged for the afternoon session. Of course, staff are always available for the children whenever they need to talk. My office is a place where children often come if they wish to talk or just 'chill out' during playtimes when it can get overwhelming at times. They can bring in a friend and play a game or just chat.

The impact of participation in music and the Arts on social and personal development is regularly documented, and has been proven to have positive effects on attainment, self-esteem, social skills and enhanced relationships with adults. Proven benefits of classroom music lessons are an increase in social cohesion within the class, greater self-reliance, better social adjustment and more positive attitudes. These effects are particularly marked in children of low ability and who are disaffected. At Ford End, we are continuing to strive for this self-reliance, self-discipline and self-control. If the children are able to motivate themselves to become first class human beings, then I believe that we are on to a winner with their learning.

Alongside our three beliefs – courageous optimism, boundless creativity and heartfelt compassion – should be the three selves – self-motivation, self-discipline and self-control. If our children can accomplish these, then they will become exemplary citizens in the 21st century, of whom we should all be proud. We hope all our school community can start to feel more positive as restrictions are slowly lifted and life starts to return to some semblance of normality. Maria Rumsey - Headteacher

GWPC has become used to having on-line meetings and this year's Annual Meeting will also be held on-line. In conclusion, I would like to express my thanks to all those volunteers, friends and neighbours who made a magnificent effort to help out those who had to shield.

Report from Recreation Chairman, Alan Martin

In the last twelve months the Recreation Committee has made considerable progress in a number of projects. The Great

Waltham (GW) changing rooms were in a very poor condition and we decided to change the building into a multi-use pavilion. The leaking asbestos roof has been replaced and work has started on the inside with a plan to remove the internal walls to create a single open plan room and reconfigure the space to create an inclusive toilet and a kitchenette area. We are grateful to ClIr John Aldridge who awarded £1,000 from the ECC Localities Fund to purchase the new kitchenette units. The GW Rec Ground has also seen the installation of an all-weather Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) which was being used from the moment the installation team finished work. A



Communities Initiative Fund (CIF) grant provided 50% of the cost. We are pleased to report a big uptake in the allotments at




Bury Lane and Brookmead, due in part to the lockdown but also because GWPC have improved the facilities and upkeep. We have also made significant progress at Ford End (FE) Recreation Ground. Following a village consultation, we have an improvement plan. The first stage of the project saw the planting of around 500 young trees (whips) at the top end of the field (provided free by Chelmsford City Council who will continue to monitor and manage them). Thanks to another grant from the ECC Localities Fund, we were also able to purchase and install a picnic bench near the new trees. The protective fence will be removed once the trees have become established. The full plan


can be viewed on the GWPC website. A replacement programme for some of the ageing wooden play equipment has also been agreed and work has already commenced with a new multi-play unit at FE in April. Improvements for Howe Street included a see-saw, donated by Broomfield Parish Council, installed in April 2021.

Report from Planning Chairman, Alex McDevitt

Our rural parish consists of the villages of GW, FE and seven hamlets. Only GW village and FE have defined settlement areas. Planning objectives are to manage building development according to Government policies, community needs and the wishes of residents. We also wish to maintain the beauty of the countryside, protect wildlife and limit global warming drivers. All Planning Applications must comply with the new City Council Local Plan, covering 2013 to 2036, which does not include any major developments in our Parish but there are major developments proposed nearby, e.g., Broomfield, Great Leighs, North East Chelmsford . Our concerns mainly cover the need for infrastructure



improvements such as Chelmsford North East Bypass, and the impact on traffic congestion. Whilst the Planning Applications are determined by Chelmsford City Council, GWPC is a Statutory Consultee, and our duty is to advise on any local issues, which includes aspects of the Village Design Statements, which are formal guidance material for planning decisions. All Parish




Council meetings are open for members of the public to attend and we encourage members of the public to make their views known. During 2020/21, our Parish Council reviewed about 40 applications, which ranged from new buildings, extension, conversion and changes to existing buildings. More than half of the applications resulted in an increase in accommodation amounting to 14 new dwellings because they were either new buildings or conversions of existing buildings. Overall, GWPC supported a quarter of the applications as appropriate and beneficial to the parish. Also, about a quarter of the applications were for dwellings located in the conservation area in GW Village or

involved a listed building. More stringent planning regulations apply to these applications.

Report from Finance Chairman, Gary Dunn

GWPC derives income from several sources, with the main one being the precept (allowance from Council Tax). The precept for the financial year 20/21 was £49,898. In addition to this, GWPC were successful in receiving grants of £5,098 plus £2,000 of ECC locality fund (received 21/22) plus income from allotment holders. For the previous financial year (19/20), we reported a spend less than income which meant being able to carry forward a large amount for reserves and future capital projects. Consequently, we were able to spend £65,447 in the year 20/21, with even more focus on making repairs and improvements to our three main recreation areas and much more. We finished 20/21 with a General Reserve of around £16,000 (equivalent to 4 months of operating costs which is a recommended amount). Other reserves, set aside for capital projects, have



decreased from £34,371 at the start of 20/21 to £16,384, as a result of completing various projects. The spend on parks/open spaces and projects from reserve equates to over 50% of the total spend and includes £10,003 for a MUGA in GW (of which 50% was a grant), £8,467 refurbishing the GW Changing Rooms and £790 on the bench at FE (of which £2,000 will be recovered from grants) and £1,565 for repairing the FE vandalised fence. GWPC decided upon a 6% increase in the precept for 21/22, which equates to an increase to Band D council tax of £3.60 pa. Howe Street will be the target for some of the additional spend with a multi-play unit and a new bench. We are estimating that these will cost a total of £15,800, but grants will also be sought. We retain a £10,000

commitment to the Average Speed Camera project at FE (to supplement the £75,000 allocated by the Local Highways Panel).



Vaccination update - 15 April 2021 From Cllr John Aldridge

Details on the vaccination programme.

1. Total numbers:

- i. <u>First dose</u>: As of 15 April, around 762,111 people across Essex county have received at least one dose a small increase from 755,600 last week. The rate of increase of new first doses has slowed this week due to temporary national supply issues and also an increased focus on second doses.
- ii. <u>Second dose</u>: Around 173,000 people in Essex have now received both doses an increase from 112,000 last week. District level and parliamentary constituency level data is listed at the end of this briefing or via: <u>Statistics » COVID-19 Vaccinations (england.nhs.uk)</u>
- 2. **Vaccination supplies:** these have been lower due to national supply issues. However, supply increases are expected to take effect from w/c 26 April. All vaccination centres are now taking bookings again following the recent supply issues.
- 3. **By age:** Everybody over the age of 50 has now been offered/had the opportunity to receive a first vaccination. Adults aged 45-49 are now formally being invited to receive a vaccination. It is expected that people aged 40-44 will be invited from early May.
- Social care: the current position is:
 - 79% of care home workers vaccinated (or 81% among older people care homes)
 - · 74% of homecare workers vaccinated

The Government has this week published a consultation (ending 21 May) on whether to make it mandatory for a care worker who works in an older people's care home to have a vaccination (defined as any home where at least one resident is over 65 years old). This would include some exemptions for those who cannot be vaccinated on medical grounds. The Government is also asking whether the requirement should extend to other care givers who visit the homes (for example, other professionals and also professions such as hairdressers). Care providers and local authorities are asked to respond by 21 May.

5. **Second dose bookings:** The advice for people in instances where they have not been contacted, or where they are concerned the date is being missed, is that the individual who is due a second dose needs to contact the provider who gave them the first vaccine or alternatively to call the helpline number 03442573961.

Once again, a reminder on the advice for the process for second bookings that the vast majority of people should experience:

- a) If a person has had their first dose at a primary care network centre/GP practice, they should be contacted by their GP/primary care network with a date for their second dose. This may happen in the week before the due date. Many people will have been given the second appointment date when they attended for their first appointment.
- b) If a person has attended a large vaccination centre for their first dose, they can book their second dose via the National Booking System or by calling 119.
- 6. National Booking System (NBS) update on recent changes for healthcare workers and unpaid carers:
 - a. For health and care workers: This is due to re-open in the near future. The exact date is still to be confirmed. They are currently able to make appointments via a local booking system (shiftpartner).
 - b. For unpaid carers: bookings via the NBS will <u>not</u> be reinstated. The advice and continued message to them remains for them to access the vaccine via their GP. This will involve them needing to register themselves as unpaid carers with their GPs first if they haven't already done so.
