Wind and Fire

By the time you read this I am praying that many of the fun things we have been denied over recent months are back in our lives. As I write, the Eurovision Song Contest has just been on television, having missed a year because of covid-19. It's always a fun occasion for many who make a real family event of it, eating lots of unhealthy snacks, keeping scoresheets, and having lots of laughs.

The music is always a broad mix of styles, both musical and visual, ranging from the amazing to the truly dreadful. It's quite predictable in some ways but at the same time capable of springing genuine surprises. It's both political and also gloriously mouldbreaking as the performers stand, at least for a while, for all that's good about the rich variety in people and cultures around the world.

The only mistake is to take it too seriously, because that means missing out on the fun!

The Church's celebration of Pentecost has also just happened, and this year I've been struck by the parallels.

At Pentecost, the Church was launched in a blaze of pyrotechnics and a blast of sound. Wind and fire fell on the disciples and gave them the power to go and tell the world all about Jesus. It was witnessed by a multiethnic, multi-lingual crowd, some of whom are disapproving and even thinking the disciples must be drunk. But most were captivated – both by the spectacle and by the message of peace and reconciliation which transcends any of their differences.

As the Church has grown and spread around the world over the passing centuries, it has become even more diverse in language, culture, and expression of faith, including doing some things badly. Underlying it all, though, the person of Jesus has not changed: he is the point of unity which links together all that rich and wonderful diversity.

News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School

In late May, class teachers attended pupil progress meetings to check how the children's core skills were developing during what has been a very challenging 15 months. In September, we were already playing 'catch-up' due to the massive disruption caused by the March - July school closure. The teaching staff were very pleased with the way core skills were returning in the autumn term 2020 but the closure in 2021 has set schools back a little. The aim to ensure that the core skills in English and maths get to ageappropriate standards is very much underway but for some children this will take longer than others.

In RSE (Relationships & Sex Education) children have learned about positive, healthy relationships. They were very knowledgeable and mature in their approach to these lessons. They used words like, sharing, love, fun, fair, laughter

and balance to describe what a positive relationship would look like.





Some staffing news - Mr Brady will be leaving us at the end of the school year to take up a new teaching position. Mr Brady has very much-loved working here but since he has moved out of the area he endures a difficult commute. We wish him all the best. Mr Radford, the site manager is also leaving for new work – we thank him for his vital role in running the school.

In art, all the children in the school completed an art sketch of Captain Sir Moore. This linked with the track fundraising but gave the teachers a wonderful opportunity to see how well skills develop from EYFS to Y6. There were some fantastic examples.

In Y1 children have completed some African lion and sunset artwork, in Y2 children have created a Kenyan Safari Park, made models of elephants, made PowerPoints about their topic and rewritten 'Handa's Surprise.

Well done to the litter pickers who gave up an hour of their time in May to help around the village.

Rev. Carolyn visited the school in May to meet staff and pupils – we look forward to working with her and we hope to attend church for the first time since December 2019 for the Y6 Leavers' Service in July

In Collective Worship, we have covered Respect, Responsibility and Empathy with Bible stories - The Good Samaritan and Feeding the 5000 to help explore themes along with the story of Florence Nightingale. Take care all.

Congratulations to Waltham United Football Club, which ended the season as champions in the Pope and Smith Sunday League Division 2A.


The club, formed at Great Waltham British Legion Club three years ago, plays at Melbourne Park and was only promoted to the division in the 2020/21 season.

Local family launch new craft beef venture

Exciting news from the Squier family at Humphreys Farm, Great Waltham, with the launch of exciting new craft beef venture Wild and Rooted Farming.

It marks the culmination of a long-term plan to return the land to sustainable farming and their herd of exclusively grass-fed Aberdeen Angus cattle now graze on a mixed pasture of legumes, grasses and herbs, all of which play a role in providing for wildlife as well as the cattle.

The 40-strong herd has been born and grown to maturity by the family and, starting this month (July), they will be offering craft beef for collection or home delivery.

Kate says: "We are both passionate about giving back to the land and embracing the nature around us and the launch of Wild and Rooted Farming has been an ambition for a long time.

"Everyone knows us for our Christmas Kelly Bronze turkeys but launching a specialist craft beef range has been a dream of ours ever since Sam turned up at the farm with just six cows back in 2007. We can't wait for local families to come and try what we believe is the best beef they will ever taste."

With school holidays approaching and more people spending time near home, I would like to remind you of the walk routes that are on the Society's website and free to download and print. We now offer more than 75 routes covering some 400 miles in total with little repetition.

There is a good range of distances, from 1 mile upwards. Station walks start and finish at railway stations and all others start and finish at a suitable place to park. Many walks pass or finish near a pub or tea room, thankfully open again.

The routes are planned so as to use good paths and quiet lanes, and to achieve an interesting mix of scenery. While we can plan the route to pass through attractive countryside and villages, we can't predict what pleasures nature may have in store: perhaps majestic cloud formations, the sights and sounds of birds, the variety of butterflies and insects, the scale of badger diggings, deer prints, even a glimpse of a hare or fox or herd of deer. We encourage you to carry a camera.

The following is a summary extract (by Mike Steel – Chair) of the Parish Annual Assembly of 5th May 2021 and the Parish Council AGM of 17th May 2021. The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council Notice boards and at the Parish Website <u>https://e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish/</u>

The Annual Assembly was held on-line 5th May, with 22 residents joining. The meeting was Chaired by GWPC Chair, Mike Steel, who referred to the Annual Report which had been delivered to every household in the Parish. Cllrs Martin and McDevitt also gave a summary of the previous year and plans for the following year on Recreation and Planning respectively. Local organisation reports were given by GW Community Network, Twinning Association, FE Village Hall, GW and FE Parish Churches and Walthambury WI.

The AGM of GWPC was held 17th May, as a face-to-face meeting in the GWVH main hall and was conducted in line with Covid regulations and a risk assessment.

Cllr Steel was elected as Chair for the following year with Cllr Jackson as Vice Chair. The attending public raised 3 issues – Dunmow Lane damage to surface and tress, Butchers Arms potential business change, and state of Church Lane in FE. The meeting welcomed the newly elected ECC Cllr Steel who reported that Cllr Bentley was the new leader of ECC which means that the FE road traffic issues will need to be followed up with the new Highways Cabinet Member, Cllr Scott. As usual for the AGM, Cllrs were elected o the various committees. These will be shown on the GWPC website.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held **7.30pm Tuesday 20th July 2021**, details on the agenda, which will be published on the Parish website and notice boards before the meeting.



The choir is back
