ECC Budget News

What does Essex County Council spend your rates on? An update on next year's ECC budget from your County Cllr, Mike Steel:

I have been the Essex County Cllr for the Broomfield and Writtle division for almost a year. Judging by the contents of my in-box, you would think that the only service ECC delivers is related to Highways! Therefore, I thought I would reflect on *all* the services delivered by ECC, in the context of next year's budget.



ECC spends a total of £2.014Bn gross, which is partially funded by income (such as planning

fees, road permits, etc) and by specific Government grants. This results in a net spend on services of £1.037Bn which has to be funded by the Council tax we all pay, non-domestic rates (business rates), and other Government grants. The rates have to be set so that a balanced budget is created – i.e., income and expenditure have to be equal. So, what is this £1,037Bn spent on?

By far, the largest amount goes on Adult Social Care, followed by children's services. Quite right too – it is important that vulnerable residents receive the care they need, even though they form a minority of the population. Very likely that you know someone, or have relatives, who are the beneficiaries of this service. Or one day, you may need it.

Of course, Highway issues affect everyone which is why my in-box is full of them! But with £114M (11% of the budget) to cover potholes, bridges, car parks, Public Rights of Way, Road Safety, Footpaths, Gritting, Passenger Transport and Home to School transport, it is not surprising that everything doesn't get done as quickly as we like. The priority is to ensure that the roads are safe, so Highways employs a risk assessment process that puts safety maintenance first. Do keep reporting them at https://www.essexhighways.org/. I have lobbied for more funding, and I am pleased to say that £2M has been added to the existing budget for the coming year.

COUNTDOWN TO EASTER

Pancake Day, Lent and Holy Week are all part of the journey to Easter Christian the biggest Day, celebration of the year. It is a time when many people make time to think carefully about their life.

For Christians, this means trying to live God's way and remembering all that Jesus did.

Why we have Pancake Day

Pancake Dav is also called Shrove Tuesday and is one last chance for a big party before Lent begins with Ash Wednesday the next day. Long ago, Christians traditionally used up all the eggs and fat they had in store by making pancakes and feasting on them. This was because when Lent came, they would eat less food, or even fast (to go without food sometimes) to help them focus on God and not the things they wanted. This tradition has been passed down the generations. Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter, a date which changes every year. This year we will be eating our pancakes on Tuesday 1st March before Lent begins on Wednesday 2nd March. So, hopefully, in many homes in our Parish, children will be helping to mix the eggs, flour, milk and butter and, with Mum and Dads help, cook their pancakes.

Why is Lent important

Lent is a time for getting ready for Easter. When Jesus was just getting started with his work, he went into the desert for 40 days to be alone with God. He even went without food and prayed, and was tempted away from what God wanted him to do in all kinds of ways, but he resisted those temptations.

You can read this story in the Bible Matthew 4: 1 – 11. During Lent, Christians often do

something different too, like praying or reading the Bible every day.

This reminds us of Jesus' time in the desert to focus just on God and feel closer to him. The good news is that Sundays are still celebration days so we can take a break from fasting! The last week of Lent is called Holy Week and during this time the church remembers Jesus' death on the cross. We can all take part in Lent. It may do us all good to give something up, perhaps something we really like every day for 40 days. What a test of our determination this will be.

News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School

A busy start to 2022. Thankfully, Covid 19 cases have reduced considerably and our attendance has started to increase. We are re-starting the 3PR safe parking initiative. 3PR stands for 3 Parking Rules (Care / Caution / Consideration). Year 6 children and members of staff will run a patrol once per week after half term.

Children will be given a token by the patrol volunteers if they are seen walking to school. Children who arrive by car (the majority) will also receive a token if they are seen walking the last part of their journey.



The last week before half we celebrated 'well-being week' culminating in a carousel of activities - each teacher planned a lesson based on well-being and delivered it to all 6 classes in a rotation - music / tree planting / growing together wall / art / support balloons / yoga – the children loved the variety of the day.

Children KS1 in participated in the Great Fire of London on Dav the 1st February. Children had to dress up in costume as if they had travelled back to 1666. In the morning,

the children carried out practical activities such as making bread, newspapers and bookmarks as well as role playing putting out the fire, collecting rats and becoming soldiers. In the afternoon, children carried out an archaeological investigation of remains which had been left by the fire, discussing who the remains might have been left by and what job this person may have had. The children were all excellent and thoroughly enjoyed participating. Overall, a



fantastic day! Huge thanks to the parent volunteers who gave up their time to help support the activities.

In March, the school is running a Science Fair Project – children will be able to research and build / display science information to showcase in school.

Schools Gotta Dance –12 children in Y5 have signed up and are ready to start rehearsals in April. Children will learn and rehearse a dance and perform to a live audience at the Civic Theatre in Chelmsford in May. We have netball, rugby and football fixtures planned for after half-term.

Collective Worship themes this half term have covered fresh starts, perseverance, families, special family celebrations and our community. We have our Easter Service to look forward to on 31st March and we will welcome Rev. Carolyn to school to lead Collective Worship in March too.

Ford End Garden Club

At our February meeting Mark Mason, a nurseryman of many years, gave a very informative and interesting talk on the biennial plant Foxgloves. Mark also supports the Sudbury in Bloom scheme and grows plants for them.

Foxgloves, a member of the plantain family, have been in existence since the end of the ice age about 12,000 years ago. This plant is a biennial which means it is sown in the Spring/Summer and will flower the following year. The seeds can be sprinkled over a tray of compost but not covered with any more compost. Seedlings should then be pricked out and planted into individual modules until they are large enough to plant directly outside in the garden or grouped in a large display pot. Foxgloves are very hardy and will survive frosts and, importantly, slugs will ignore them.

At our next meeting on 16 March, Chris Whiting will be giving a talk on his life in farming and dahlias.

The garden club's annual coffee morning and plant sale will be on Saturday 30th April. On Wednesday 18th May at 2.30 the club has arranged a visit to the garden of Peacocks in Margaretting. Further details of these events will be announced in later editions of the Parish News.

Ford End Senior Tea





Cont'd from page one The Council tax rise for the coming year is 4.49%. Over 60% of this will go directly to Adult and Children's Social Care which has seen significant increase in demands over the last year. The rest will be dedicated to Climate Change measures, more school places and Home to School increased transport demands. We have a stark choice either we propose an increase, or we face unacceptable decisions about reducing services. Ultimately, we



are not willing to compromise the level of service residents receive. We are committed to making sure that vulnerable residents receive the care they need. that the roads we travel on remain safe, that we invest in communities, and that our environment becomes greener, cleaner and healthier.

The following is a summary extract by Peter Jackson (chair) of the Parish Council meeting of January 17th. The full and approved minutes are published on the Parish Council notice boards and at the parish website.

A vote of thanks was passed unanimously for the hard work and dedication, which Councillor Steel had maintained throughout his period as chair, which he relinquished after nearly 9 years.

County Councillor Steel reported on the county budget, emphasising the need to maintain services (i) to vulnerable residents, (ii) to road safety, (iii) to ensure that the environment becomes greener, cleaner and healthier. Almost 50% of the county budget is spent on social care.

City Councillor Steel reported on the revised plans for the Bloor Homes development, including the reduction of dwelling numbers from 550 to 512 and the link road through Pudding Wood.

New formats for PC policy documents have been devised and wording will be reviewed over the coming months.

A request from North End residents for power to be reinstated to their telephone box was received. BT to be asked to do this. (UK Power Networks estimate $\pounds1000$ for work on the island and not for connecting to the mains which would be a separate charge and supplier).

There has been a 36% response to the Cherry Garden Road parking survey with a variety of ideas emerging. A working party of interested parties is to be set up.

Work on the pavilion continues with flooring, windows and doors to be installed in the next two months.

Warning signs for cyclists at Bury Lane ford have been erected, vandalised and re-erected several times over the last six months.

Play in the Park: two full day sessions booked for August 5th and 26th.

Annual Parish Assembly is scheduled for Tuesday May 17th, 2022 at 8pm at Ford End Village Hall. Come along and have your say.
