

# Great Waltham Parish Celebrates The Queen's Platinum Jubilee In Style

From the moment the Jubilee beacon was lit, Great Waltham parish celebrated HM Queen Elizabeth II's 70-year reign with a host of events and activities for all ages.

With fun events including the Right Royal Trivia Quiz and Queenstock, to afternoon teas, picnics and games across the villages, it was a time to have fun and mark a very special occasion.

The events spanned four days and started with the beacon lighting (see story right and photo page 6), when over 300 people came together at the Cricket Club for a drink, curry and a slice of jubilee cake.

The ceremony included the Dui Regnare by Piper Daniel Boreland and Majesty by bugler Kerry Bennion.



The winners of the Right Royal Trivia Quiz, held on Friday, June 3, were the Village Idiots (above). Fifty-three eager contestants battled for the right to be crowned winners and the Village Idiots belied their name to come out triumphant. Royally Rubbish surprised no-one by claiming the booby prize. A princely supper was laid on by the WI and, with the comfort of a cash bar, a thoroughly enjoyable evening was had by all.

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






















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#### News from Great Waltham C of E VC Primary School

They stayed at an activity centre where they experienced working in teams and enjoyed many varied challenges, like climbing, a giant swing, challenge course, map reading, coastal walk and lots of problem solving. They also enjoyed visiting Osborne House, Carisbrooke Castle and Robin Hill Country Park. They departed as many festival goers arrived!

The Parish Council held its AGM on 23<sup>rd</sup> May in the newly refurbished Pavilion at Great Waltham Recreation Ground. This is a summary of our discussions. Full and approved minutes are published on Council noticeboards and on the parish website (e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish). Being our AGM, we elected our officials and committee members for the forthcoming year. We agreed to create a new highways and transport committee.

Mike Steel, our city and county councillor informed us of others' initial responses to National Grid's East Anglia GREEN consultation proposing a line of large pylons to the west of Chelmsford, including across part of our parish. We agreed to respond in the strongest terms detailing our absolute opposition. We encourage all concerned parishioners to raise their objections with National Grid.

Mike confirmed the new DigiGo on-demand electric minibus service pilot commenced on 13<sup>th</sup> April – visit <a href="www.digigo.uk">www.digigo.uk</a> to consider whether this service is one for you. He has also taken up our concerns with Highways regarding the designation of the B1008 through Ford End as the backup for the A120 and he reported on the City Council's actions to date concerning the use of the Cherry Garden Road greensward areas by drivers for access and parking – we await future updates on both items. The RideLondon event was discussed; we noted that feedback to the organiser will be important.

We agreed to investigate further viable traffic calming initiatives at Ringtail Green. Also, on the highways front, our SID (Speed Indicator Device) is monitoring traffic through Ford End, and next will be moved to Broad's Green. We understand your concerns about the speed of traffic along some of our roads – the better our data we more we can push for action.

Following feedback at the Annual Assembly we resolved to contact the landlord to ask that the cobbled area close to Walthambury Stores be tidied. Elsewhere, the Council has been asked to crown lift the lime trees at Broad's Green to improve visibility for road users; however, a decision was deferred so councillors can visit the area to assess things first hand.

Support was offered for a 'Three Villages' initiative, a waymarked circular recreational walk between Broomfield, Little Waltham and Great Waltham. In feedback to the organiser, we will emphasise the need to ensure footpaths on private land are respected and point out that our bovine friends could be grazing along some sections of the proposed route.

Jo Palmer, our transport representative updated us on a local DigiGo roadshow (which will have happened by the time you read this). We also considered the continuing poor bus services – we will be offering robust feedback and requesting details of any improvements we can expect, and when.

The Ford End Recreation Ground consultation document is ready to be printed and issued shortly. We noted that with our landlord's agreement the Great Waltham Recreation Ground lease now permits use of the Pavilion for Council business and its availability for hire. Finally, we noted the events being prepared in the parish for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Our next monthly meetings are 13<sup>th</sup> June and 18<sup>th</sup> July, beginning at 7.30 pm. As always, all parishioners are welcome.
