Crime alert - please report it

As many of you will be aware, in the past month and more, we have had several incidents of theft, both property and vehicles, and anti-social behaviour. What has become evident in trying to deal with these crimes is that there have been very few incidents reported to the police or other authorities.

We do live generally in a very safe and friendly community within the parish, but as and when incidents do occur, they need to be reported. People think that this is a waste of time and that the police or other authorities 'will not do anything' however it does build up a pattern and really helps their case when perpetrators are apprehended.

Be it theft, attempted theft, anti-social noise levels or behaviour, intimidation, bullying, illegal vehicles on roads (electric scooters included), drugs - REPORT IT. (It really is NOT a waste of time even if it does not resolve the actual issue being reported)

Remembrance Sunday Parade – 12th November 2023

Great Waltham Parish Council announce that this year's Remembrance Parade and Service will take place on Sunday 12th November.

The parade will follow its usual route, starting from Duffries Close at 10.30am, led by the parade marshal, piper and standards, with representatives of the armed forces, emergency services and community organisations. It will march along Hatchfields, into Chelmsford Road to the war memorial, arriving there at approximately 10.45am.

The necessary road closures orders have been secured and traffic will be halted to get the parade safely to the war memorial for a short service. Chelmsford Road will be closed between the South Street and Hatchfields junctions for the duration of the service, with traffic diverted via Hatchfields and South Street.

Members of the public may join the parade, but must do so at their own risk. We also welcome members of the public and the parish community to join the service. Wreaths will be laid and the last post will be sounded at 11.00am, followed by two minutes silence.

The parade will then move to the church for a service there and afterwards it will reassemble in the church grounds and march past the war memorial for the salute when Chelmsford Road will be briefly re-closed. The Royal British Legion once again invites the church congregation to the RBL hall for refreshments after the event.



Feeding those in need

In June of this year the church began a new project. We have started

mobile supermarket offering а affordable food to those who are being forced to face the harshest reality in the cost of living crisis.Initially, this project was born out of Chelmsford Food Alliance, a collection of charities across Chelmsford who supply food to those in need. We have taken the lead on the project but it couldn't have happened without the brilliant support of our partners and the council.

We have an X-supermarket delivery van which takes food to pop up where it's needed. We offer customers a bag of food that may be worth approx £25 for just a fiver. Being mobile and accessible is at the heart of what we do. Many people have trouble either Foodbank accessing or cheaper supermarkets due to public transport cost and regularity. Local chains can be super expensive too.

St Francis Pop Up Food store aims to not only support people living with Food Insecurity but give dignity and choice. Our tagline is "A helping hand with your weekly shop". We hope in time that these 'pop-up food stores' will help financially but also create a sense of community as isolation can be a real issue too. We have had comments such as *"it's more than just food", "it's made such a difference to us"* and lots more.

At present we run two pop ups on Tuesdays from 9-11 in Ford End village Hall and <u>2-4 at St</u> Andrews church hall, Melbourne. As we secure more funding we would like to pop up on Beaulieu, Springfield and further afield.

A message on Fireworks, from your City Cllr,

Three years ago I was asked by the RSPCA to proposed a motion to City Council for them to run an annual campaign to ask people to be considerate and visit a public display, or if you must have a firework display at home, to stick to &.30pm to 7.30pm.

This timeframe aims to limit the window when loud bangs and bright flashes will take place for the benefit of people and animals who find fireworks difficult. The Rocket O'Clock link can be found at https://citylife.chelmsford.gov.uk/ w hich lists the public displays in the area and also outlines the distress and difficulties that fireworks can display to pets, people with conditions like PTSD, autism, and anxiety, people who rely on assistance dogs, very young children, shift workers, wildlife, livestock and farmers.

To help protect these groups, you can also buy silent or quiet fireworks. Please also note – public land such as parks do not permit the launch of fireworks or Chinese lanterns.

This is a summary of some of the items discussed at the latest monthly meeting of the Parish Council held on 18th September. For more details, full and approved minutes of all Council meetings are available on our noticeboards and the parish website (e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish).

Mike Steel, our county councillor, confirmed the new member-led pothole scheme is underway. He also drew or attention to the current ECC waste strategy consultation – you can submit an online response to the survey at https://consultations.essex.gov.uk/rci/waste-strategy-for-essex-consultation/ (the deadline day is Wednesday 22 November). Mike identified the opportunity for involvement in ECC's Parish Paths Partnership and we agreed to investigate this in detail through our Highways and Transport Committee.

We agreed to make a grant application for renovation work to the war memorial at Banbury Square in 2024, and to publicise to parishioners how the memorial would look before work commences.

The Council is responsible for a number of trees in the parish (principally at the recreation grounds), and we agreed a budget to conduct a routine survey to ensure we have best advice on how best to continue to manage them.

We noted the installation of the new path and seat at Ford End Recreation Ground and the positive social media comments the work has attracted. We recorded our thanks to Essex Association of Local Councils for its grant for the path and to the ECC Locality Fund (via Mike Steel) for funding the cost of the seat.

In relation to the average speed camera scheme at Ford End, we noted both a generous offer from a parishioner to the Council for an interest free loan to cover a half-share of the projected costs, and the likely need for Dept. of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities approval whatever the source of funding. Notwithstanding any need for consent, we also agree to conduct a consultation of parishioners on the scheme to understand residents' views on the effect a loan would have on future precept requirements (the precept being the part of parish households' Council Tax allocated to the Council). We agreed to consider support for any parish initiatives to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings. Our next monthly meeting is on Monday 20th November 2023 at The Pavilion, Great Waltham Recreation Ground. As

always, all parishioners are welcome to attend our public meetings.


Ford End Gardening Club

On yet another wet and windy club night, members all turned up to welcome Tony Dunn, our speaker for the evening. He gave an illustrated talk on 'Sustainable Living'. We saw photographs of his two acre garden in its original raw state when he first bought the property. Over the years he has transformed it to make it self sufficient growing vegetables, fruit and meat, all organic. He began with making raised beds to grow potatoes, rhubarb, broad and runner beans, cabbages and salads. In fact the list is too long to name everything!

He also built a fruit cage growing all the soft fruits plus an orchard for plums, apples and pears. With a south facing fall he has trained peaches and apricots growing across it. There is a large herb garden, pond to attract wild life and a now mature coppice. Mr. Dunn also keeps chickens for eggs, and turkeys which he rears for Christmas. With the help of solar panels and a wind turbine he had installed generates between 3 to 5 megawatts. This proves to be most successful as it had paid for itself in seven years! He had various ways of saving water which made it a cheap form of irrigation. To finish his talk we saw photographs of the huge variety of birds that are attracted to his garden, quite a paradise.

Member we're all issued with the three hyacinth bulbs ready to plant for the best hyacinth competition in January. Next month 15th November our speaker will be Mike Able who will be talking on 'Vegetable Growing'. New members welcome to join us in Ford End Village Hall at 7.30pm.

Recycling centre vehicle bookings – Public Consultation – ECC Cllr Mike Steel





County Council recycling centres. Following an evaluation of the trial, Essex County Council is proposing to retain a booking process permanently for all vehicles at their 21 recycling centres.

You can have your say on the proposal by completing the consultation survey before 19 November 2023. To read the evaluation, supporting documents and to complete the survey, visit www.essex.gov.uk/recyclingcentrebookings

Great Waltham Parish Council General Project Consultation and Precept Increase Survey – November 2023 Average Speed Camera Scheme in Ford End This consultation relates to a proposal to install an average speed camera (ASC) system on the B1008 in Ford End village to enforce the 30mph speed limit. An ASC would measure the average speed of all vehicles when they travel the full length of the road through Ford End and will result in fines and driving licence penalty points for those exceeding the limit. Unlike fixed speed cameras, ASCs are effective in lowering speeds over an entire length of road. Data available to the Parish Council indicates that over 9,000 vehicles (of which 18% are buses, trucks or HGVs) use this stretch of the B1008 each weekday and over 70% of all vehicles do so exceeding the 30mph speed limit. Previously, before the bypass was built, these vehicles would also have travelled Average through Great Waltham village and Howe Street. Speed An ASC system is the one traffic calming measure which Highways will currently authorise. The Council Check is looking to raise half the costs and seek match funding. This would mean it taking out a loan for c.£50,000 and looking to pay it back over five years by making an annual Council Tax parish precept increase equivalent to an extra 25p per week, or £13 per year, for a Band D property type. (The precept is that part of parish households' Council Tax allocated to the Parish Council - for 2023/24 it represented 4.3% of each total Council Tax bill and currently is £89.64 for a Band D property). Without Parish Council part-funding the scheme is unlikely to progress. It should be noted that match funding would still need to be secured, and the precise precept increase would depend on the exact amount of the loan and the interest rate applied. Also, it is understood that the non-mandatory 20mph signs at the school would need to be removed as Highways are concerned about the possibility of motorists citing confusion to avoid conviction. However, the wig-wags lights can still operate at school times.
