selling bird boxes and feeders.



The villagers of Howe Street gathered at the park in mid August for the 10th running of the Big Picnic and in keeping with recent sporting events the theme was the Olympics.


On a lovely sunny afternoon there was yet another good turnout for the annual event despite it being holiday



The Hundred Parish Society (Parish News September)


refers to the Guide Sir Nikolaus Pevsner wrote after the visit he made to Essex.

In that guide Pevsner wrote about, Great Waltham. He especially mentioned our Church of St Lawrence & St Mary; some of the oldest houses, including Wiseman's, Badhyngams; Langleys House & it's gatehouses. Also the Rectory, the Village Hall by Chelmsford Architect Chancellor (?)

At the time of his visit in the 1960s building had started in Hatchfields & The Hundred Parish Society (Parish News September) refers to the Guide Sir Nikolaus Pevsner made to Essex.

In his report Pevsner highly recommended the design of the houses, and the proposed development. I have lived here for 51 years & my friend Sue Rule was the first 'young married' to live here, She did move 30 years ago or so: but to across the Road Diane Hughes.

The Community Network is a group that aims to enhance village life by organising or helping other groups to organise social or fundraising activities. You may have been to some of our great events...






The draft LNRS outlines biodiversity priorities for nature recovery in the county as well as a series of proposed actions, known as potential measures, to achieve these.





Universal Stone Ltd. of Wickford carried out the works. The memorial was cleaned and, as necessary, individual characters re-etched, and then all the inscriptions were highlighted with enamel paint. Great Waltham Children's Play Area

Many children and parents with fond memories of the train in the Great Waltham recreation ground play area will have been sad to see it was recently removed. The wooden train was a favourite fixture for around 30 years but more recently rot set in and it became harder to maintain in a safe condition for children to play on.

Having considered and discounted refurbishing the train the Parish Council was left with no other option than to remove it. Unfortunately its condition is also indicative of the deteriorating state of many of the other wooden play items. Following much research over the last 18 months the Council has decided a complete refresh will be the best option for the future of the play area at Great Waltham.



Work is underway with equipment providers for design and equipment ideas and fund raising and grant options are being explored. The Council will soon be consulting with children and parents on what they would like to see in the play area in the future, which in addition to many other new and exciting pieces of play equipment could see a new train, fire engine or even a tractor!

This is a summary of some items discussed at the August monthly meeting of the Parish Council. For more details, see the full and approved minutes of all Council meetings, available on the parish website (e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish).

The first item was to agree the recommendation that Mr. Lee Taylor should be co-opted onto the Council to fill the vacancy which occurred earlier in the year. Members welcomed Lee to his place.

n his report, our city and county councillor, Mike Steel, updated us on the revocation of free parking for staff at Broomfield Hospital and the introduction of a new shuttle bus service between the hospital and the Chelmer park and ride site. He also confirmed that the first part of an Essex Transport Consultation has been initiated, although the consultation will have closed by the time you read this, but the second phase, when detailed plans are set to be published and consulted on, is due to commence early next year. Mike also mentioned that the proposed integrated retirements homes scheme at Little Waltham has gone to appeal following the rejection of the original application.

We noted a report on the completion of the work to renovate the war memorial at Banbury Square and the significant improvement this has made. We made decisions in relation to the installation and repositioning of seats at Great Waltham Recreation Ground and also on proposed works in the children's play area at the Ground. In respect of the latter, we took the decision to decommission the wooden train which has sadly deteriorated beyond sustainable repair. looking forwards, we also agreed to commission the services of a grant fundraising expert to help us secure the finances needed to execute plans for a major revamp of equipment in the play area - this will be a very significant project for us, but its scope and success will depend on the money we can obtain elsewhere. I will keep you updated with developments.

Tony also helped to run garden clubs and also the Essex Hardy Plant Society which holds its meetings in the village hall at Wickham Bishops. Having bought four acres of land from Barleylands to add to his garden, Tony decided to plant an arboretum with many unusual trees and he described some of these. The Hardy Plant Society have a meeting on Sunday 13

October and the speaker will be Fergus Garrett talking about designing with plants. Tony very kindly brought along a crate of Bramley apples straight off his tree for us to share.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 16th October and the speaker will be Stephanie Callister-Jarrold who runs a bird sanctuary and will be talking about birds of prey.

Stephanie will also be our speaker at our November meeting on the 20th and this time she will be talking about her hedgehog rescue but will not be bringing any hedgehogs or birds along to either meetings.

Our meetings are held in Ford End Village hall and start at 7.30pm and everyone is more than welcome to come along and join us.
