# The Wicked Vicar of Waltham



This is a true story about the Reverend George Somers Clarke who died in Chelmsford Gaol, following a life of distress caused to his family, Great Waltham residents, and clients of the Six Bells Inn. The play put on by Great Waltham Parish Productions (GWPP) on 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> November at GWVH, told about his early life at Trinity College, his ambition to rewrite the Bible (but first in its original Hebrew), his attempt to separate GW Church and Tavern with a ditch, his prosecution by the Church of England, and subsequent incarceration in Chelmsford Gaol. The evening was a great opportunity for the residents of the GW Parish to learn about some of the darker aspects of the village.

# **Comfort and Joy**

The Christmas Carol 'God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen' dates back as far as the 1650's, although the full current version wasn't published

until 1855. Around this time, a journalist complained that in London no other Christmas song can be heard except, "...some croaking ballad-singer bawling out God rest ye merry gentlemen." It's the archetypal Dickensian festive melody even name-checked in his 1843 novella A Christmas Carol. In contrast to many of the sombre hymns of this time, it was a popular singalong.

In more recent years, merry is misrepresented as an adjective modifying gentlemen but its original form attached it more to the verb - rest. In fact, the carol's title is taken from a common salutation dating back as far as the 1530's "God rest ye merry". The word 'rest' was understood to mean sustain or continue, so this greeting simply wished the receiver to be kept in good spirits. The carol translates as a beautiful prayer for the hearer, wishing them hope against despair. The lyrics tell something of the Jesus story and how love can conquer hatred.

In an era seemingly fraught with endless bad tidings, might we join the centuries' old seasonal singalong declaring comfort and joy. More than that, may we seek to be the manifestation of these things to those we come across. May we look to be bearers of comfort and joy, to be those who enable friend and stranger to stay in good spirits this Christmas.





It was decided to exclude Mill Road this time because of the very high volume of traffic along this almost single track road due to the closure of the road linking Felsted to Dunmow, which has been in place for two months! The usual assortment of detritus was collected. Sadly, this included another large cache of nitrous oxide cylinders - but at least we now know where to take them for safe disposal!

#### FORD END GARDENING CLUB

It is with great sadness that we have to announce the passing of our very dear friend and founder, Alan Adcock. Alan ran the club for many years, booked wonderful speakers and organised the plants for our annual plant and coffee morning. We will all miss his banter and knowledge on gardening and the countryside.

At our November meeting, Stephanie Callister-Jarrold talked about the work of Hedgehog Haven Essex, which has rescue centres for hedgehogs in Witham and Frinton. The numbers of hedgehogs in the wild has fallen from 40 million in the 1950's to less than one million. There are 17 different types of hedgehog, they have 6,000 spines and will survive three years in the wild. They are able to climb trellis and ivy and hibernate only when the weather is cold. The eyesight of the hedgehog is poor, their hearing good and their sense of smell excellent. Hedgehogs make more than one nest and breed from April to June, and also September to November, We need to encourage hedgehogs into our gardens, so please no slug pellets or insecticide. They cannot tolerate milk, so just leave a shallow bowl of water for them and dry cat or dog food; but special feed for hedgehogs is readily available. Also, mealworms are not good for hedgehogs or birds as they will affect the bones of both species. Small log piles can be arranged for the hedgehogs and homes can be built or purchased.

We are having a social evening on Wednesday 18 December, during which we will be planning forthcoming meetings and talking about speakers we would like to have and also outings to gardens. Please bring along refreshments, drinks and, if you have anything for the raffle, that would be welcomed.

Our January meeting is on Wednesday 15th and we will be judging the indoor hyacinths that we have planted. Meetings start at 7.30pm and are held in Ford End village hall.

# Little Waltham and Great Notley Surgeries Patient Participation Group

As a PPG we have become increasingly concerned about the rate of housing development in the area supported by appropriate levels of healthcare. We have been fortunate enough to have presentations from the ICB and senior planners from which it appears that there are two major problems facing us all. Firstly. Health is not a statutory consultee for planning purposes unlike Highways and Education so has no input into the planning aspects of new developments. Secondly, pressure is being placed on existing surgeries by the requirement to complete a development before any new provision can be put in place. Bearing in mind the current government's determination to proceed with new housing developments, we are engaging with the National Association of Patient Participation Groups to see if collectively we can put pressure on ministers to bring about change in the procedure.

On another note, the surgery's new website is now up and running which we hope everyone is finding more accessible.

This is a summary of some of the items discussed at the October monthly meeting of the Parish Council. For more details, see the full and approved minutes of all Council meetings, available on the Parish Website (e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish).

We received a proposal, from the Community Network and others, to advance the previously agreed request to finance and help facilitate the installation of new Christmas lights on the tree at Banbury Square. We agreed to purchase the lights and noted the intention to have a switching-on event on 8th December.

Mike Steel, our City and County Councillor, updated us on the motion that he sponsored at the ECC meeting on 15/10/2024 which included a call for central government to fully fund infrastructure requirements as part of the planning framework. The issue is one we, too, have highlighted in the past when commenting on large scale strategic housing developments in the Chelmsford area.

In relation to the National Grid (NG) pylons project, we agreed to join other member councils of the NW & SW of Chelmsford Parishes Group in contributing to the cost of commissioning a detailed landscape assessment report which will look to provide further analyses of the effects that pylons will have on our parishes if NG maintains its plans to introduce them as part of the project.

We agreed to install a new donated seat at Great Waltham recreation ground and to install additional goalpost sockets at Ford End and Howe Street recreation grounds to help manage wear of the goalmouth areas.

We also updated our Media Relations Policy so that we can speed up the process for making any public statements. This will apply especially to social media, where we can now offer more immediate context and insight, without having to wait to secure a formal meeting resolution before doing so.

#### Village Green, Church Lane, Ford End

You will be aware, from the minutes of recent Parish Council meetings, that the Parish Council is objecting to an adverse possession claim which has been made to HM Land Registry for ownership of VG150, the village green, located at the southern end of Church Lane, Ford End, adjacent to the location of the old Spread Eagle pub (see Google aerial shot showing the land involved). The Council is the current owner of the land.

To assist in its objection, the Council is looking to obtain further statements from local residents concerning their past and present use of the land for recreational purposes; for example, as part of a route taken when exercising or dog walking, or any recollections of use of the area for leisure

activities. This will help the Council to broaden its evidence base to show that for many years the green has been (and remains) an area utilised by local residents.
