Mill Road, North End is dry(ish) again!!

Some weeks ago, the River Chelmer flooded back up the valley and the Mill Road, North End was under a few feet of water, again. After some days, the river went down, but not the water in the road – the drains were blocked again! Although a number of residents reported the problem to Highways, nothing happened. Fortunately, we also contacted Mike Steel and, thanks to his efforts, an Inspector visited the site, and the job was put out to contract.

Last Friday, two very nice chaps from Flowline came and jetted out the drain. Hooray! Once again, residents of North End can go to the doctors' surgery or village shop without making a 10-mile detour via Dunmow! Many thanks, Mike. The same day, I understand that another

The same day, I understand that another contractor came to replace the lost tarmac in the sides of the road. Sadly, they had to abandon the work because the deep holes at the sides of the road were full of water! Last year, Highways placed bollards in these water-filled holes to warn motorists of the danger, but they floated away in the recent flood! The road is now passable, and the bollards in the deep holes have not only been replaced but have increased in number. All is fine so long as you can keep to the centre of the road; but don't venture



into the water at sides! the Hopefully, that water will soon dry up sufficiently for the tarmac work to be completed and Mill Road be returned to a safe condition after so long.

Renovation of the Church Organ in Great Waltham

After many decades, Great Waltham Church is in the process of renovating our Victorian organ. It requires substantial repair and cleaning to bring it back to the quality of music we need. The organ was built in 1878 by the organ builders, Bishop & Son of London, and we are indeed fortunate that it is being restored by the Ipswich branch of this company. It is expected to be finished in March. Funding for this work is still open, and donations are gratefully received. 

Enjoying a winter stroll along any of the described walks within the Hundred Parishes provides an opportunity to view the landscape features visible from various vantage points. Many farmers have decided to cut back on growing oil seed rape, and they may choose to plant alternative niche crops such as sunflowers or borage once the weather is warmer. (Stansted Mountfitchit on the right)

These farmed landscapes have traditionally supported assorted wildlife including skylarks, rooks, ladybirds, bumble bees, butterflies, badgers and foxes. In addition, well-maintained soils contain not just beneficial fungi, but a variety of earthworms and beetles which in turn provide food for many other creatures. Sadly, other less-welcome creatures such as slugs and root-eating beetle or fly larvae are also present. Seeing a sizeable flock of birds following a plough demonstrates this plethora of food!

Recent concerns about the loss of insect life, especially pollinators or those that eat aphids, is encouraging farmers to find ways of enhancing habitats for insects by leaving marginal strips round fields for wildflowers, planting new hedges or creating beetle banks within their fields. These features may be

visible from footpaths during the winter months so make a note of where they are and plan return visits during the summer to observe them full of flowers and other wildlife. Tricia Moxey, Trustee.

This is a summary of some items discussed at the November and December meetings of the Parish Council. For more details, see the full and approved minutes of all Council meetings, available on the parish website (e-voice.org.uk/greatwalthamparish).

In November, our county councillor, Mike Steel, reported that at an ECC meeting the new national housing targets were discussed and a motion was passed that additional infrastructure is required to support increased targets. We also agreed, because no members of the public attended the latest Community Policing Team's 'Let's Talk' drop-in session arranged and advertised by the Council, that rather than continue to facilitate this type of event, we will instead invite the Team to the annual assembly to provide an update of police activities. In addition, we agreed the Council's budget for 2025/26. This will generate a marginally lower parish precept demand compared to 2024/25, which will be reflected in the element of the Council Tax paid to cover our activities.

At our December meeting, we noted the resignation of Cllr. Palmer and thanked her for work on the Council over a number of years. We also received further representations on, and provided an update concerning developments since the last meeting in relation to, VG150 (the village green in Ford End). The Council will continue to object to the adverse possession claim submitted to HM Land Registry. Separately, we understand Essex Highways are continuing with their enforcement action process for the removal of the unauthorised fence and planting on VG150.

Also in December, we noted the outcome of the recent automatic traffic count conducted on the B1008 close to Ford End school, and we agreed to post the data and a discussion paper prepared for the meeting on the parish website so that all parishioners can see the results. We also signed-off a revised agreement with Great Waltham Village Hall for the continued rental of public car parking spaces at the Hall. In addition, we agreed our response to a government consultation on "Enabling remote attendance and proxy voting at local authority meetings" — we broadly support the notion of facilitating remote attendance in appropriate circumstances, but are firmly against the concept of proxy voting.

The next monthly meeting will be on Monday 17th February 2025 at the Pavilion, Great Waltham Recreation Ground, starting at 7.00pm. As always, all parishioners are welcome to attend these public meetings. Steve Gilbert Chair
