# Food Bank and The Salvation Army

Dear Friends,

We would like to say an extremely big thank you for your help and support this year with our Annual Christmas Appeal & Emergency Food Provision.



This year we helped 262 families with toy/gift hampers. We provided toys for 260 0–10-year-olds, and gifts for 254 10–19-year-olds. A total of 514 children. On average each child was given about 15 items making the total around 7710 toys/gifts that were given out.

The food bank was also extremely busy in December which saw us giving out 1196 bags of food & 236 bags of toiletries to people in need.

This year we requested feedback for the support we provided. Here are a couple of snippets:

"After losing my partner last year, I was not looking forward to Christmas at all. Having this help took so much pressure off and made me feel less alone"

"I was extremely worried about giving my children a Christmas, but thank you to The Salvation Army, they really did think of everything for my children. They took away the stress"

Without all the wonderful donations we received we would have been unable to help as many families as we did. Your giving enabled The Salvation Army, Preston, to serve others across the city and beyond.

## It's all Greek to me! (cont)

It is now time to summarise the Greek prose writers, starting with the historian and geographer Herodotus. He wrote in the 5<sup>th</sup> century BC, on his travels round the eastern Mediterranean, bringing exotic phenomena such as crocodiles in the Nile to the attention of his countrymen. The other leading historian of the classical period (c500 – 400BC) is Thucydides. Both men have been called "the father of history". Thucydides probably merits the accolade more in that he was the first writer of history to report history by being trying to be objective. So that even though he himself was Athenian and once held high office as a general, he could describe events of the bitter and prolonged struggle of the Peloponnesian War between Athens and Sparta in the latter 5<sup>th</sup>

century BC, describing the catastrophic defeat of the Athenian expedition on Sicily ending at 413BC as a neutral observer. The war was a disaster for Greek culture because it destroyed both cities economically. The Spartans were a land-based power, repeatedly invading and devastating Athenian territory, without being able to conquer and occupy Athens, while the Athenians were a naval power but without the means to isolate and conquer the Peloponnese (literally "the island of Pelops" a mythical figure who met a dire fate), the land mass with the distinctive 3 prongs of land at the south of Greece where Sparta was the principal city. The Peloponnese is not in fact an island but a peninsula with a narrow isthmus joining it to mainland Greece, thus affording the Spartans the means of invading Athens' territory. So the bitter struggle played out over some 30 years until the Athenians took on Spartan colonies in Sicily. But their navy was there defeated by a combination of Sparta in alliance with the Persians, who popped up again, this time to defeat the Athenians in a naval battle off the Sicilian coast. Thucydides has a vivid and moving description of the Athenian soldiers on shore anxiously watching the battle, to its unfavourable outcome, and their then certain knowledge of inevitable starvation

and defeat. This came upon them as they were bottled up in a quarry

on the island, without food or the means to resist, followed by surrender and humiliation. It brought the relatively short period of Athenian dominance to an end, and Greek culture as a whole did not

much longer outlast it into the next century BC.
