

VICAR'S LETTER

The view from the study.

At the Thursday communion service, I enjoy the opportunity to remember in the sermon one of the many saints of history whose names feature in the church calendar. One of the more well-known saints celebrated in July is James the Apostle: the fisherman who, with his brother John, left his father Zebedee and ran after Jesus. James took a huge leap of faith in completely changing direction on the strength of a charismatic teacher's word.

Nowadays, James is associated with the concept of pilgrimage, his symbol being the scallop shell often worn by those making the pilgrimage to his shrine at Santiago de Compostela in northern Spain. Whether James ever visited Spain is uncertain, yet he is revered as the patron saint of that land and tradition maintains that he preached there at some point before his martyrdom in Jerusalem in 44AD.

Many of you reading this will have been to places of pilgrimage – perhaps to the Holy Land, Lourdes, Rome, Iona, Holy Island, Walsingham, Canterbury or one of countless other places of Christian pilgrimage. Many may have travelled far and wide across the world: many others may have travelled very little, never straying far from Preston and maybe never having set foot in a great site of pilgrimage.

The important thing about pilgrimage, however, is not how far we have travelled by land, sea and air, but rather how far we have moved in our inner selves. Going on pilgrimage is a wonderful experience, but its real value is measured in the strengthening of our faith. Whether James travelled to Spain or not is of little importance. The point is that he journeyed within: starting as a fisherman, he then followed the call of Jesus. This led him on a remarkable 3 year journey of inner growth: he made many mistakes, but he went on to become a solid disciple of Christ, standing firm under persecution and paying the price with his life. From fisherman on Lake Galilee to martyr in Jerusalem – not a long journey in terms of miles covered, but quite a remarkable inner journey.

With summer holidays in view for many people, take a moment to reflect: where have you travelled, literally, in your life - and what have you gained from those travels? Where have you travelled, metaphorically, in your hearts and minds with God - and what have you gained from that journey?

Remember James on 25th July and ponder your own pilgrimage: your journey through life, both with God and closer towards God.

Restoring the Chalice

It is almost unbelievable to think that we have not shared the chalice in church for over 2 years. Thankfully, the chalice is now restored in worship and is once again being offered to all at Holy Communion.

Whilst many will greet this with tremendous enthusiasm, others will remain hesitant about taking the cup to receive the wine. This is perfectly understandable, especially as we know Covid has not gone away and there remains anxiety about close physical contact and the use of shared items. Therefore, nobody should feel under any obligation to receive the wine. The principle remains that if you have received Christ in one kind (ie, the bread) then he is fully received. However, there also remains the powerful symbolism of the one cup that we share together as members of the body of Christ.

You are invited to make the decision that feels right for you, taking into account your own health and any sense of vulnerability. I do not have access to all the evidence, but there is certainly no evidence I am aware of that suggests the chalice is a likely route of Covid infection.

The procedure for administering the wine is as follows:

At BCP services (Sunday 8.30 and Thursday 11.00):

Come to the altar rail and kneel or stand to receive the wine. If you are not receiving the wine, please return to your seat once you have received the bread.

At the 10.00 service we shall continue to receive standing at the step: Please come forward to take the bread as normal, then move to your left where the chalice will be available, or simply continue back to your seat.

To maintain hygiene, those administering the chalice will wear face coverings and are asked to ensure that (i) the purificator (linen cloth) is moved to a clean section of cloth each time the rim of the cup is wiped; (ii) both the inner and outer edges of the rim are wiped and (iii) the chalice is rotated a quarter turn between each communicant.

Antiseptic wipes will be used to clean the chalice before and after services.

It’s all Greek to me! (cont)

Before moving on to deal with the supreme and classic period of Greek literature and the high point of its civilisation from c 500 to 350 BC, there is one other poet between the age of Homer and that period who merits attention, and of whom you will have heard at least by repute, because the person has given a word to the English language. And to those to whom the poet’s name is unfamiliar, you almost certainly will have heard of their island of birth, and by extension, their characteristic, one may even say, their notoriety; both in the classical period and today in the modern world. The poet is Sappho, of the island of Lesbos. She wrote love poetry and flourished around 600 BC. Her poetry was much admired in classical times though might today be characterised as “over the top”; as with much of Greek literature her work influenced her Roman successors. Another name to rate a mention before dealing with the Greek classics, is Pindar, who actually did live in the 5th century BC. He was as it

happens recently quoted in the TV production “Life after Life”, a programme series which I personally did not admire, or consider had much to say. The quote, via the philosopher Nietzsche, was: “Learn what you are, and be such”. As with most aphorisms, you can either regard that as deeply profound, or as a banal statement of the obvious. It is a version of another well-known Greek saying (Gno-ee Se-auton) “Know yourself”.

I make no excuses for writing my article about our recent speaker. The subject was Fraud and the speaker was Mark Aldridge (husband of Jennifer, one of our new members.) Mark is a retired policeman, who used to work on the Fraud team with Lancashire police so is very well qualified to help us all avoid fraud. From the beginning he stressed the fact that fraudsters are professional people who are extremely clever at seeing an opportunity and then cunningly making you give your bank details & part with your money.

So , Mark said, if you have been subject to fraud then do not feel stupid or embarrassed, but share the experience with your friends as this will hopefully prevent others suffering the same fate as well as keep-ing you contacted with people.. To illustrate this he give us the amounts of money lost in Lanca-shire....£10 million , in UK.... 130 Billion and in the world£3.89 Trillion which is £3.89,000,000,000,000 !

The largest amount lost by one lady in UK is £20 Million!

Fraudsters fall into 2 categories ..the vultures who sit high and watch what is going on, select a victim, then swoop in to commit fraud. The second type is the fisherman who lobs bait out there, (like a promise of a big lottery win) he sits and waits to see what comes back to them. Mark shared the dangers we need to be aware of that the fraudsters use to their

benefit, (especially at retired people)...we are accessible, maybe feeling isolated, lonely, maybe with health or wealth worries. So a sympathetic call (by phone or on the doorstep) is sometimes the way they get into your life and consequently, your lifesavings!

At that point in the talk, though very informative, left us feeling!

vulnerable and a little depressed!

Then Mark gave us some positive information about the right places to contact .



So as much as we feel we have a great God who protects us from all the bad things the world throws at us, He also provides help for us through these organisations should we need it. Thank God for them, and I must finish with a promise from God

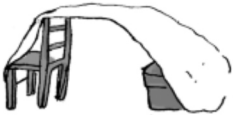


JUGSAW CLUB
