

VICAR'S LETTER

The view from the study.

Listening to the radio while washing up one evening, I heard Alan Titchmarsh speaking on an episode of 'A Good Read'. I thought to myself that the voice didn't sound quite right. It then dawned on me that I hadn't heard him for a while, although I had listened to an impressionist playing him on a radio comedy sketch show a few times. It dawned on me that I had become so familiar with the audio caricature of his voice that I no longer recognised the real Mr Titchmarsh!

So, what about us trying to get to the authentic voice of Jesus? Whenever we seek Jesus, his voice is mediated through the transmission and translation of the Scriptures, through the teaching of the Church, through the vicar's last sermon, and maybe even through whichever film, theatre and TV portrayals of Jesus we have seen.

Surely Lent is a good time to try listening to Jesus, to try and hear his authentic voice. The paradox is that the only way we can do that is to rely on the kind of understandings, interpretations and portrayals of Jesus that I have just alluded to, all of which risk somehow tweaking, diminishing or misrepresenting his voice!

Maybe, then, we need to keep our minds wide open as we approach Jesus. If we rely ONLY on our favourite scenes from films about Jesus, we hear only a fraction of his voice, presented in a way that may even be deliberately provocative or controversial. If we rely ONLY on the formal teaching of the Church, we might miss out on some of the human face of Jesus. If we rely ONLY on the scriptures, we still need to process what we read in our own fallible minds, and may end up with an understanding of Jesus that is far too similar to ourselves!

During Lent, try to take a balanced approach to discerning the authentic voice of Jesus (as far as anyone can). If you have not watched a film of his life in recent years, give it a go. How long is it since you read a Gospel? Why not turn to the diocesan Lent reflection, *Signs of Life*, which takes us on a journey through Lent with John? Take time to get to church, if you can. Take time to pray at home and read your bible. Take time to show the care and compassion of Christ to others in need. Take time to be still, to ponder and to pray.

We may never hear the genuine voice of Christ this side of Glory, but our experience of him in this life can still be an authentic one - if we take time to seek him in the right places and attune our hearts to the prompting of the Spirit.



IT'S ALL GREEK TO ME! (cont)



I had not realised that last month's original Greek text would come out looking quite so obscure, enough to tax the most dedicated Greekist, so here are the title and the first 2 lines of the passage again, which is of course, as you all already undoubtedly know, is (TO KATA IOANNEN AGION ENANGELION), literally, the according to John holy gospel. IOANNEN, John; AGION, pronounced hagian, holy, the word brought across to English in eg hagiography, a book about a saint, usually used in a critical sense of someone who has written a book, hero worshipping their subject. ENANGELION, gospel – or, message, English word angel derives from this word.

Then, the text; EN ARCHE, in the beginning; the word ARCHE comes to us in our word “archetype”, beginning or start-up model. Next word, EEN, long e, pronounced ayn, was. Next word, o with a small letter c above it; I lied last month in saying you could ignore the squiggles above the Greek words, but only in respect of this one. The “c” above imports an “H” sound, so the word is ho, short o as in rock, the word for “the”. Greek like English and most other European languages has a word for the definite article, “the”; unlike Latin, or for that matter, Lancastrian, both of which dispense with the definite article. The next word is LOGOS, word; English transposition, logic. So, in the beginning was the word; KAI, meaning, and: “and the word was to (literally) God” THEON (“theological”, English derivation), and God was the word. The same was in the beginning to God. Everything (PANTA), PAN – “all” was made (EGENETO), or, generated or born (Genesis), through him.

And there you have it, so it's no longer all Greek to you. And you can also see how many of our English words directly derive from Greek.
