PARISH LETTER

Lent – a time for renewal.

I am sure that we're all relieved that there are some signs of winter coming to an end given the storms and cold weather we've seen. There seem to be huge numbers of snowdrops popping up, even in our garden. I know that some of you have seen even greater signs that spring is on its way — maybe even our church building will begin to feel warmer soon!

This year Lent starts on Wednesday 5th of March and we will begin as usual with a service of Holy Communion at 7.30pm, including the option for the Imposition of Ashes. Lent is often seen as a solemn time of reflection and preparation to celebrate Easter Day. However, in the early church this was a time of preparation for baptism for new believers.

Those who had heard the good news message of Jesus and wanted to become Christian believers had to go through a time of teaching and learning. It was important, especially in times of persecution, that the faith was understood and the commitments made could be said with integrity and certainty. The six weeks of Lent was a time of spiritual renewal for these new believers as they looked forward to joining the church on Easter Day.

Often as we journey through life our faith can become tired, stale and matter-offact. We can rely on old understandings of scripture or faith and not let the Lord speak new life through the Holy Spirit. So how can we change this and allow our faith to be renewed?

Using the 6 weeks of Lent to renew our faith and let the Holy Spirit speak to us afresh could be a good use of our time. Here are some ways we can do this, as well as gathering to worship on Sunday mornings;

join the Bible Study group and explore the Bible together,

read the Diocesan Lent booklet (either in paper form or online via the Fruitful app),

join the Prayer Group where we'll pray for growth in the church and renewal of ourselves.

read a passage of scripture each day (maybe a whole gospel during Lent) asking the Holy Spirit to teach you new things,

read a Christian book to help build up your faith (there will be a selection to borrow at the back of church).

Our Lord wants us to grow in faith and understanding so that we can be renewed and live a vibrant faith in the world. Why not use Lent in the way that will help you best do that – and share the new things you've learnt come Easter Day.

30th March - Mothering Sunday, 4th Sunday in Lent

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods – our human mothers – all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' – as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their

My dear Nephew Darren

I cannot be wholly sympathetic because your church car park is now inadequate, only having space for 100 cars. Your solution of advising members of the congregation to park in the adjoining supermarket car park may not have been wise. The maximum time people can stop there is 90 minutes, and as your services often reach that length, returning to find their cars clamped may not make you universally popular – although it may give your congregation the opportunity of practising Christian forgiveness.

Since the medieval architect who built St James the Least of All was not overly concerned with car parking, the only space we have is along the road by the church. Inevitably, it gets blocked, which causes us all immense satisfaction when those not attending church but intending to have a morning shopping, find themselves unable to get out of the village until Mattins is over.

I did once encourage people to walk to church across the fields, but after we had nearly lost the present Earl in that swampy bit near the brook, I decided the idea was best dropped.

For most, the inconvenience of parking only makes attending church more of a pleasurable challenge; we so enjoy having something to complain about. Major Hastings, however, who has complained endlessly about parking problems, made a point last Christmas by leaving his car in the middle of the vicarage lawn. I was so pleased he happened to park just where I had had a garden pond filled in only the previous week. He returned to find that the car had sunk up to the windscreen and needed a crane to remove it.

For weddings, a farmer allows us to use the field adjoining the church. While he rarely attends church on Sundays, he is always there the week before – I suspect praying for heavy rain, so he can make a fortune charging to tow out with his tractor those who have got stuck. Perhaps the greatest act of witness your church could perform would be to get everyone attending church to park on the ring road, bringing the entire town to a halt until your Sunday morning Service is over.

WORSHIP

Do you enjoy action films? Why?
