

VICAR'S LETTER

The view from the study.

We are Easter people and 'Alleluia' is our song. So declared St. Augustine of Hippo in the uncertain times in which he lived (his life straddling the 4th and 5th centuries AD). He added, *Let us sing here and now in this life, even though we are oppressed by various worries, so that we may sing it one day in the world to come, when we are set free from all anxiety.* Powerful words in this ongoing Easter season.

We know from experience, however, that the resurrection does not exempt us from the harsh realities of life and the many trials we may all be subject to. Just think of the ongoing pandemic: this year was the first time we have been able to sing together our Easter hymns since 2019, reminding us of the restrictions we lived under for so long, as well as the suffering of so many that precipitated those strange times. And now we continue to look in horror at the tragic suffering of so many in Ukraine - and numerous other places where people still suffer though the news lens has moved on.

So, if we truly are an 'Easter People', what does that mean to us? The reality of the cross will always be present in the world and in our own lives. But let us not forget that there is no glory without a cross, no victory without sacrifice. Despite the agonies of this world, we are still called to celebrate that death has been defeated and no tomb can hold us forever; not the tomb of despair, nor discouragement, nor lack of faith nor the stresses of life. We can learn from St. Peter: he trusted in the love of Jesus and, despite having denied him, knew that he must run towards the empty tomb. After this, his whole life was focused on serving God and proclaiming the resurrection of Christ, in the face of frequent opposition and persecution.

We too can be encouraged by the hope that the resurrection brings us, living as people who have been renewed in Christ; people who know how to find, even amid the darkness of the world and of our own hearts, the light that overcomes darkness.

As an Easter People we also should be celebrating what is positive in this life, not remaining fixed on the negative. If there seems to be no good news around we might have to create it ourselves, by *being* good news for the world in showing that darkness does not win. Let's pray that God will help us to discover how we can bring life to that call to be Easter People.

Annual Meetings

Sunday 15th May, 11.00am.

The **Annual Meeting of Parishioners** (for the election of churchwardens) and the **Annual Parochial Church Meeting** (APCM) will take place after the main service on Sunday 15th May, starting at around 11.00am.

Nomination forms will be available in church for those wishing to stand for election as Churchwardens or Parochial Church Council (PCC) members. To attend and vote at the Annual Meeting of Parishioners, you must be on the church or civil electoral roll for Grimsargh. To participate in the APCM or stand for office as a PCC member, you must be on the *church* electoral roll.

At the APCM we can elect up to 9 members of PCC.

We will also appoint sidespersons to assist the churchwardens, with a special focus on the ministry of welcome on Sunday mornings.

PCC members will need to complete a declaration that they are ‘fit and proper persons’ to serve as trustees of a charity (which is the status of the PCC, even though we are not registered as a separate charity). New members will also be required to complete a basic introduction to safeguarding.

May I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to all those who have, in any way, served the parish over the last year. Thank you for being prepared to offer your time and skills in the service of Christ through his church here in Grimsargh.

It's all Greek to me! (cont)

All Greek to me...

I mentioned in the last article that the ancient author used the word "sing" to describe the poem, the Iliad. This is as I said, because poetry derived from singing, and poetry was, and is, delivered in a metrical way. The Homeric poems, the Iliad and the Odyssey, are indeed metric. Every one of the lines in the poems conforms to a strict metric, summarised in the jokey line, "Down in a deep dark dell, sat an old cow munching a beanstalk". It is a 6 beat metre ("Hexameter", Greek word for 6 is Hex). Some variation was allowed in the first 4 beats, but every single one of the last 2 beats, in all 28,000 lines of the epic poems, conformed to "munching a beanstalk", tum titty tum tum, long short short long long. And so it is that when people ask, how can you tell how an extinct ancient language was pronounced, then one can reply that we know from the above with a near scientific certainty at least whether the sounds were long or short.

So the first line of the Iliad, see March edition of the Church Magazine, scans:

Mahnin a eide Thea, Pe leid e o A chil ah os

(- u u) (- u u) (-, -) (- u u) (- u u) (- -)

Tum titty tum titty tum , tum tum titty tum titty tum tum

Footnote on Latin: some Roman poets, Horace and Ovid, used a 5 beat metre (Pentameter). This is summarised by the equally jokey addition to the above, "When out of its mouth came forth, yesterday's dinner and tea".
