#### **VICAR'S LETTER**

#### The view from the study.

We were just having tea, sitting together as a family, when it was announced on the radio that Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II had died. This will surely go down in history as one of those where were you when you heard the news moments.

Even as you read this some weeks later, the images of huge crowds in London, Edinburgh, Balmoral and so many other places around the United Kingdom may be fresh in your mind. Some images were especially striking, such as traffic parked on the busy A40 in London as drivers stopped alongside the central reservation to glimpse the Queen's coffin being brought back to Buckingham Palace, or people queuing to file past the Queen lying in state. Then there were those large crowds of people equally enthusiastic to greet His Majesty, our new King. People and pageantry joining together: folk of all ages, nationalities and races gathered in response to the momentous piece of history we have just lived through. Equally, I have been struck by the stream of personal reminiscences from ordinary folk who had encountered the Queen during her long and glorious reign. Have you heard of Rosemary Hughes, a florist from Leicester? I hadn't, but the Queen had. Rosemary used to make nosegays (small posies of fragrant flowers) for the Queen, for which she was granted a royal warrant. Unfortunately, in July Rosie suffered a severe epileptic fit which has landed her in hospital. The Queen came to hear of this and, only a week before she died, sent a personal letter to Rosemary expressing her sadness and wishing her a good recovery, also thanking her for the beautiful nosegays she had supplied over the years.

Rosemary's experience shows that we had a Queen who cared about individuals just as much as she cared about national and international affairs of state. This compassion for a humble florist in Leicester epitomises just why Her late Majesty has been so deeply mourned, even causing many people to feel surprise at their emotional reaction to the news of her death. It speaks also of the Queen's deep faith in Christ, inspired by his example of reaching out to individuals who need him: whenever there was a crowd around Jesus in the Gospel accounts, there would also be an individual who needed his healing, or with whom he interacted to teach us something of eternal value.

As we give thanks for our late Queen, let us pray now for our new King, asking that he likewise will be inspired by the compassion of Christ, to touch those who are broken hearted or downtrodden in this world and bring them hope. Then, if we long for a better world, may we also be inspired to do the same

## The Mothers' Union Literacy and Numeracy Project (Harvest Appeal)



Nearly 6,000 miles away from the UK, Burundi, situated near the great Lakes in East Africa, is one of the poorest countries in the world. With a population of around 12 million, 71% live in poverty on less than £1.50 a day.

Women in particular are very poor; nearly half are illiterate and have no financial education so they can't read, write or understand maths. They are prevented from reaching their potential and fulfilling their dreams.

In total, 92% of people work in agriculture, harvesting crops like sweet potatoes, bananas, cassava and peanuts. There is a good climate but, due to the lack of education, the land isn't being used to its full potential.

## The Project's focus

The Mothers' Union is raising money to fund a two-year project which aims to support 2,500 women by providing adult literacy, savings, business and agricultural skills, thereby giving women the tools to change their situations, to lift themselves and their families out of a cycle of poverty.

Money raised will pay for project training specialist volunteers - often working church leaders who already have the trust of the community - to visit different communities twice weekly across three regions and teach valuable literacy and numeracy skills. This will enable women to progress and understand new concepts such as how to start a business, different agricultural techniques and crop diversification. Once adopted, women will eventually be able to increase their household income.

Through improved education, they will also benefit from a better understanding of hygiene practices and nutrition - benefitting the whole community.

This MU project is the focus of the Bishop's Harvest Appeal, which we are supporting this year. You can donate at the Harvest Festival on 2nd October (and in church the following week) or make a personal donation as follows:

## It's all Greek to me! (cont)

In the last article I referred to the invasion of Greece by the Persian king Xerxes 480BC. The first of the great tragedians was Aeschylus who fought for Athens at the naval battle of Salamis, and drew on his experiences in his play "The Persians". Greek tragedy on one analysis, centred on 3 main themes, human arrogance, or in the Greek word still used in English today, "Hubris", ruin (Greek "Ate") and Nemesis, another Greek word, roughly translated, punishment by the gods.

And the Persian war gave Aeschylus the perfect vehicle for these themes. The Persian king set out on his expedition with massive forces drawn from his vast empire, and the first obstacle was to cross from Asia into Europe across the Bosphorus, the strait at modern Istanbul, formerly Constantinople. The first attempt at bridging the strait was a disaster because storms swept away the boat bridge with extensive loss of life. This was lighted on by the Greeks as an example of Hubris because the king had sought to defy the gods of nature with his human structure, as they put it, trying to bind the sea. Next of course the Greeks pointed to the battle of Salamis itself and the Persian defeat; modern analysts are apt to describe the large Asian armies such as those defeated in the next century by Alexander, as akin to hordes of milling sheep, ie without proper military training, merely conscripted and forced into military service, often reluctantly. And the outcome at Salamis was total defeat for the Persian ships by a numerically inferior enemy. Spot any modern analogy? But Aeschylus had compassion; he alluded in the play to the numerous dead bodies in the aftermath of the battle which he witnessed washing on the Greek shores, another dreadful image, which we also today have witnessed in the Mediterranean, in modern times, of refugees.
