Easter was not for the few but for all, not just for them but the whole world!

You have given us good news; teach us to share it.

Lord Jesus Christ, forgive us that so often we forget that.

Having experienced your risen presence, we keep it to ourselves.

Having met with you, we fail to introduce others to you in turn.

Having received so much, we have shared so little.

You have given us good news; teach us to share it.

Lord Jesus Christ, we thank you for those who have fulfilled your call – those who first made the Gospel known to us, those who proclaim it to others, those who sow, nurture, and bring to fruition the seeds of faith.

We pray for all you have specially gifted to proclaim the Good news – preachers and evangelists, ministers and missionaries, teachers and writers.

May many meet with you through their labours and come to know you as their God.

You have given us good news; teach us to share it.

Lord Jesus Christ, you call each one of us to be your witnesses – to tell others what we have experiences of your love, to make known what you have done for us, to testify to the way you have changed our lives.

Help us to do that faithfully, to play our part in your kingdom and purpose.

And so through us may others come to meet you and know you for themselves.

New Testament Readings: 1 John 3:16-25, Acts 4:5-12

Gospel Reading: John 10:11-18

Reflection:

Sheep are often underestimated! At first sight they may appear a bit stupid, following each other about and not really looking out for themselves. But if you find out more about them, or maybe talk to an experienced shepherd, you will quickly realise that there's more to sheep than meets the eye. They are all individuals. So the notion of a relationship between a shepherd and some sheep is more profound than it might seem at first sight.

In Jesus' time, sheep were usually not fenced into fields, but went around in small flocks, accompanied by their shepherd. It was the shepherd's task to lead the flock to places where they could find good grazing, and water to drink, and protect them from hazards.

So the relationship between the shepherd and his flock was very significant - a flock of sheep was a valuable asset and thus a big responsibility. As Jesus explains here, the good shepherd might even need to give up his life for his sheep, if, for example, the flock was attacked by wild animals. And he goes on to explain the difference between a shepherd who owns his flock and so takes an 'owners' interest in them - versus the hired worker 'just doing the job'.

So Jesus presents this image of the shepherd and his sheep to help his audience understand the kind of relationship he has with his followers. It's a powerful story, looking forwards to Jesus giving up his life for the sake of his flock.

To Ponder: What does the image of Jesus as 'shepherd' mean for you?

Sheep in a flock are individuals who interact with each other. How do you relate to the notion of being one of Jesus' flock?

How does the concept of a shepherd prepared to give up his life for his sheep help you to understand Jesus' crucifixion?
