More Homes Planned for Chelmsford

There was a large and vocal attendance at the May Village Meeting. This was largely driven by the very recent publication of the Planning Department's proposals for meeting Chelmsford's housing needs between 2026 and 2041.

There are two small housing estates proposed for East Hanningfield, one adjacent to Highfields Mead (20 homes) and the second at Abbey Fields (15 homes). Residents were also concerned with potential for increased traffic and strain on services from the planned northern expansion of South Woodham Ferrers (1220 homes) and the new proposal for a 4000 home estate on the site of Hammonds Farm. That is located east of the A12 between the Sandon and Boreham junctions. There are over 100 new homes planned for Bicknacre.

These are all significant proposals. They are now likely to be increased.

One of the first acts of the new government was to announce the need to increase new home building. To achieve this they have imposed mandatory annual house building targets with sanctions, including the withdrawal of planning authority if not achieved.

The target for the Chelmsford Planning area has been increased from an annual 913 homes to 1406. An increase of 54%. We are not alone. Maldon's target has been increased by 97%.

Chelmsford City was already planning to overachieve versus its previous target. In the proposed revision to the Local Plan the Council had increased the annual target to 1000 homes as they had declared a "Housing Crisis". In addition the Planning department had increased this to 1200 homes a year to provide flexibility for potential non delivery. Hopefully the Council will use some of this headroom to avoid the full 54% increase and not be tempted by more expansion of the city. The Local Plan will need to be rewritten. I have no inside knowledge on how this may change.

It is unlikely there will be a major change to the location of the already planned new homes. Too much work has gone into developing these plans. Any major change would just delay delivery.

What is clear is that there will be a significant increase in new home building in this area and soon.

A further government change is the dropping of the requirement for developments to be "beautiful" and **increasing the percentage of af-fordable homes to 40%.**

The biggest single cost of a new home is the cost of land and developing the site. Achieving more affordable homes will need the market priced homes to bear more of these costs. The likely result of these two changes is that **e**state build density will increase and money planned on making the homes and estates attractive will reduce.

So more homes, more smaller homes, more crowded estates.

Regarding the two small estates proposed for East Hanningfield the most likely change will be pressure to build sooner rather than later. There may also be pressure to make all the villages take their share of the pain of the 54% target increase. For East Hanningfield that would be 60 homes rather than 40.

The government has **reduced the protection for the Green Belt**. Building on previously developed land, the "Grey Belt", is to be encouraged. A large part of the Chelmsford Planning area is in the Metropolitan Green Belt. That is the majority of the open land South of the Roxwell Rd and West of the old A130 Southend Rd. Expect a **rush of applications for planning permission** on any previously developed land in this area.

These are all major changes. The Parish Council will continue to monitor developments and keep residents informed.

As a frequent visitor to Broomfield Hospital and having experienced the challenges of car parking, it was good to hear the shuttle bus service from the Chelmer Valley Park and Ride has been reinstated. The shuttle bus service will run every half hour from 6.30 am to 8pm Monday to Friday. Staff at the hospital are entitled to a discount so hopefully it will ease some of the pressures to us users!

The Essex Community Initiatives Fund is now open. Voluntary organisations, community groups and our Parish Council can apply for a grant. The £350k fund offers grants up to £10k and can be used to support projects such as upgrades to sports facilities, improvements to community buildings, transport, IT systems and cultural events. The closing date is the 18th of October and is being administered by the Essex Association of Local Councils - application details can be found on their website.

Highways have announced an extra £25m to their budget. The focus will be on larger road resurfacing but will also include more drain clearing, repainting white lines, cutting back vegetation and repairing signs. Let's hope we see the benefits locally!

HANNA'S FIELD CHARITY Village Hall & Playing Fields

A very slow start to our Summer this year, but we finally got there around the time of the start of the school holiday break!

Unfortunately, the weather was against us for the Annual Village Fete on 6^{th} July, but we did still manage to make a substantial amount to be shared between Hanna's Field Charity and All Saint's Church, full details of the event will be in the Fete Committee Report from Mel Mavers. HFC intend to put their share of this fund-raising money towards new Play Equipment on the playing fields. A big thank you though to everyone who gave their support with setting up, running a stall, taking down and clearing away on the day and the final bits on the Sunday morning with packing away the dried-out gazebo covers and assessing the damage to some of the frames, all very much appreciated. We then later managed to get all the broken frames collected by a scrap merchant, together with other bits from the storage container – a good opportunity to clear some old stuff out!

Following the Play Area Equipment Survey through Pre-school and the School, we have been able to collate all the responses and now need to set up a Working Group to look at what we are aiming at, for the future improvements, and how to get funding to be able to achieve this. Any parents out there who would like be part of this Working Group would be very welcome, as it is your children who are the ones to use these areas, so your input is very important!

Earlier in the year, we had to make the decision to switch football pitches because of problems on the North pitch. It was not an easy decision to make because of the close proximity to the Children's Play Area, and sadly it did receive some complaints from nearby residents, especially on one particular occasion with a visiting team and the totally unacceptable language being used by them. This was all reported to the local League, who looked into it but ultimately misconduct has to be dealt with by the Essex County Football Association, so we are awaiting their response. Remedial work on the North pitch has been carried out now by the maintenance contractors, levelling, re-seeding and rolling, so we hope to switch back ready for the start of the next season.

In August we invited people to come and try Free Taster Sessions of 'Pickle Ball', a new racquet sport, at a couple of sessions on Sat 17th and Thursday 29th August, to see if we could generate enough interest to start a regular new weekly class in the Hall. We will report the outcome of these 'Taster' sessions in the Winter issue of the Newsletter.

Our next fundraising event is the Annual Art Show on Saturday 5th and Sunday 6th October, with the Pre-View Evening on Friday 4th. Please see the separate advert in the magazine for full details of times etc. We will again welcome our volunteers who come along to help with setting up/taking down etc. we could not do it without you all!

With the warm evenings there has been a noticeable increase in rubbish – particularly beer bottles and cans, left around the seating areas on the field. **Please use the bins provided**, it is especially dangerous with both young children and dogs about if these bottles get broken, and it makes it more difficult for our volunteers who do a sterling job of litter picking, but this is obviously not done every day of the week.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Essex Police: With over five and a half thousand police officers, staff, and volunteers, Essex Police is the largest non-metropolitan police force!

Essex Police is split into three local policing areas (LPA) in Essex; north, south and west. These LPA are further divided into 14 districts. Each district has a team of police officers, detectives, police staff and volunteers. The Chief Constable is Ben-Julian Harrington QPM (who has been in position since Oct 2018).

East Hanningfield is part of the Chelmsford district and policing in Chelmsford is now affiliated with the Maldon district. Both districts are overseen by District Commander Chief Inspector Paul Ballard. Similarly, the Chelmsford and Maldon NhW organisations are combined under one district coordinator, who liaises with the District Commander).

The Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner: Roger Hirst was reelected in May as Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner for Essex for a third successive term. He has the key role as PF&CC of holding our Chief Constable (and the Chief Fire Officer) to account in making the police and fire and rescue services efficient and effective.

Roger Hirst has set out as his new priorities as, making policing more local, visible and accessible in order to drive down crime and antisocial behavior and has pledged to reduce knife crime, protect young people and improve road safety to reduce road death in Essex to zero (CSW is part of that strategy). Protecting women and girls from violence and domestic abuse and ensuring vulnerable people are protected is also included in Roger Hirst 's policing priorities. Over the past eight years he successfully grown Essex Police, recruiting more than 905 extra officers to the force.

Local Crime News: It's been a quiet period again with very little local actual crime reported to NhW. Crime reported to the police in our Chelmsford district has been falling in general over this last 12 months (309 crimes in July 2023 against 233 in July this year) - hopefully a good sign which will continue.

When & how to contact the Police: Use the digital 101 service to contact the local policing team about something you have seen or heard, or request information. A Live Chat service is available where you can send direct messages to a digital 101 operator Monday to Friday between 10am-9pm. A 24-hour 101 call service is still there if you need to speak to someone or don't have internet access.

Always call 999 if a serious offence is in progress or has just been committed, if someone is in immediate danger or harm, if property is in danger of being damaged, or if serious disruption to the public is likely.

East Hanningfield NhW and Email Alerts: Some people in the village may remember NhW started in the village with a chap called Mike Philpot as area coordinator, followed, after he left by Edward Poulter, and subsequently Geoff Dickman? My notes only go back to 2006 but it was probably started earlier than that!

Back then it was run in the traditional way with reporting of local crimes/feedback passed on verbally, or on bits of paper, between neighbours and street coordinators into the local area coordinator. With the advent of email, Facebook and Whatsap messaging the ability to share information more quickly and efficiently made the passing of messages verbally and on bits of paper a touch outdated. Nevertheless, the principle is valid and NhW is still valued by the police as a source of local grass roots intelligence and support.

Over 130 EH residents receive emailed local crime alerts and can provide and send in intelligence, but it still needs someone to co-ordinate and feed information into the system and provide feedback to the police. This bit hasn't been working well and I hold up my hand. Several people have asked to be added to the local NhW alerts distribution but, with other work commitments this hasn't happened. In fact, it's become necessary for me to ask if there is anyone else in the village interested in taking this role on for NhW? If so, please contact me as shown below and I will happily explain more.

COMMUNITY SPEED-WATCH

EH Community Speed Watch (CSW): The CSW volunteers continue with regular 30 mph CSW checks in the village at police approved sites in Old Church Road, The Tye, Bicknacre Road & the Common.


Why Bother: To make our village roads safer for everyone here. CSW is part of the overall police strategy to deter speeding, the main cause of road accidents/fatalities. Speeding is antisocial, and collisions, deaths and injuries caused by driving too fast are largely avoidable if speed limits are complied with.

There is a direct relationship between road traffic accidents and speed. Speed kills and wrecks lives. In 2022 in Essex, road traffic accidents

resulted in 53 deaths (more than one per week), 773 serious injuries (more than two per day) and 2,767 lesser injuries (more than 7 each day).

Our local roads are set to become still busier with increasing through traffic as a result of housing developments at South Woodham and the area north of Howe Green and A12.

Road speed limits and the traffic calming measures in the village are our only defence.

THE ESSEX BIG WEEKEND

We were taken around in trailer, with seats but no windows, pulled by a tractor, quite a bumpy ride I might add. Of course this was followed by a cream tea in a marguee, but, not before, we had been taken to sample their variety of fruit liqueurs. I am not sure whether it was Raspberry Vodka or Mulberry Rum that was the favourite.

July was also good, Gary Mathews came from Easton Lodge to tell us about the gardens, which have been given, 'Historic England, Grade 11 registered Garden.' There has been signs of life in the area since 1066 when it was a hamlet in what was part of Epping Forest. In 1597 by dint of a reward it was given to Henry Maynard by Elizabeth 1st, from which time it developed depending on the fashions at the time. A momentous change came in 1865 when it was left to Daisy Maynard, aged 3 years. Daisy grew up to marry, Lord Brooke in spite of Queen Victoria wanting her to marry Lord Brookes friend, Prince Leopold, a brave Lady. Countess of Warwick, as she became, led an eventful life, part of which was a 9 year liaison with Edward , Prince of Wales and a Hobby of Bicycle riding, hence the song, 'Daisy, Daisy give me your answer do,'

Well I think I have given enough, info for this time. If you want to know more about amazing people or places pay us a visit you never know what you will hear plus you get tea and cake.

Jacqui was born in Aberdeen, Scotland and is married with two grownup sons, one of whom lives in Essex and the other works and lives in America.

In 2018, Jacqui began ordination training sponsored by the Diocese of Chelmsford. She spent three years studying with St Mellitus College towards a degree in Theology, Ministry & Mission while working parttime as the County Ecumenical Officer for Churches Together in Essex & East London. She was ordained in 2021 and has served her curacy in the neighbouring Maldon & Dengie Deanery.

Jacqui enjoys working with other churches and is passionate about churches' relationships with schools, encouraging people to discover their gifts and pastoral care- she is on the team of Day Chaplains at Pleshey, the Chelmsford Diocese House of Retreat. She sees lots of opportunities ahead within each of the parishes in the Hill & Vale Churches. East Hanningfield will share Jacqui with Bicknacre, Woodham Ferrers, and South Woodham Ferrers churches.

Before curacy, Jacqui lived in Braintree and worshipped at an ecumenical partnership in Great Notley. Jacqui's career has been varied, she has worked in human resources, managed and inspected homeless and supported housing projects, and, before training for the priesthood, for several years directed the research and development unit of The Salvation Army in the UK, overseeing a diverse portfolio of missional projects.

We look forward to welcoming Rev. Jacqui to All Saints and liaising with the other Hill and Vale Churches. She will move into the Vicarage in South Woodham Ferrers at the beginning of October, and we wish her well with the move. She will be licensed by Bishop Adam of Bradwell at 7.30pm on Monday, 14th October, at Holy Trinity Church, South Woodham Ferrers, and she is looking forward to meeting you then or soon afterwards.

This is the Day that the Lord has made.

There now seems to be a day for everything imaginable. We have awareness days such as 'World Cancer Day' and 'Walk to Work Day'. On the 7th July, we have 'World Chocolate Day', or how about 'Squirrel Appreciation Day' on the 21st January.

There appears to be a day designated to great causes and the not-sogreat.

However, one day that I was interested to discover is that there is a Homelessness Day. This falls on the first Sunday in October - and is known as Homelessness Sunday. Many churches all over the country, along with Homeless charities, come together to put on events to create awareness of this growing issue.

At Bethel Church, we are involved in a charity called 'Above Us Only Sky? It was formed in 2010 to meet the immediate needs of people living on the streets of Westminster, Canning Town and Ilford. We team up with another organisation, 'Church Without Walls' that has been serving the homeless for the past 30 years. Every week without fail, they have been meeting rough sleepers and helping wherever possible.



On Saturday, 20th July, I attended the 30th birthday on the streets of Westminster. It was a real time of celebration as many ex-homeless folk came to say thank you – and give testimony of how God had trans-

formed their lives. Many battling addictions and mental health problems who had come to faith in Jesus Christ.

There are over 2,000 Bible verses about helping the poor. That speaks volumes – literally.

How close it must be to God's heart if the Creator of the Universe encourages and instructs us so many times to care for the poor, the orphan, the widow and the afflicted.

When you dive into these Bible verses you notice the strong action verbs. Whether it's God or us taking up the cause of the downtrodden, look how many times you see words like "rescue," "defend," and "speak up."

There are so many powerfully simple verses that beg a response from us.

God doesn't just say "remember the poor," or "pray for the poor," though both of those things are good and important to do. He calls us, to go into a hurting world and proclaim his love. This is the gospel being worked out in word and deed.

Homelessness isn't going away any time soon. In fact, there is a yearon-year growth in the numbers of rough sleepers and those living in poverty. So, we will continue to raise awareness and help in practical ways, and of course, share with them the words of eternal life.

We also have a couple of 'Days' when you might like to come and join us:

Wednesday 18 September – **Christianity Explored**. A 6-week course that looks at the heart of the Christian Faith.

Sunday 13th October – **Harvest Sunday Family Service** at 10:45am

Friday 18th October – **Harvest Supper**. An informal time to celebrate and give thanks for all God's blessing. Come and join us for a Ploughman's Lunch.


News from East Hanningfield Pre-School
