The Parish Council has received many complaints recently about dog mess around the village particularly on The Strutt Memorial recreation ground. A gentle reminder that it is the responsibility of the dog owner to clear up their dogs mess and carries a fine of up to £1000 if not adhered to. We have been in contact with the Dog Warden at Braintree District Council who has agreed to make regular visits to the site in order to crack down on this problem. If the problem persists, the Parish Council may have to consider introducing a 'Dogs on leash only' control on the recreation ground.

Action needed on speeding traffic

A letter from Susie Blythe concerned about the traffic problem in our village

Speeding traffic through the village is an ongoing, and increasing problem - The Street, Church Road and Maldon Road in particular. The Street has some calming throughout the day with parked cars and volume of traffic, and Church Road has a sharp bend and a narrow stretch of road that forces most, but not all I know, cars to slow down, but Maldon Road seems to be the highway to heaven for some - no parked cars, and a lovely long straight and wide stretch of road and off they go, cars, motorbikes and lorries hurtling along throughout the day, every day, late at night and early morning at speeds that make your eyes water.

So what to do? The village has Speedwatch, a band of volunteers that monitor speeds from time to time, but I am informed by one of the Parish Councillors who champions this as the best option that Speedwatch has no powers to prosecute, and further, they have to wear high visibility coats which ensures every motorist slows down before their speed is noted, and they are not allowed to monitor speeds after dark because of Health and Safety! And we also have the smiley and no smiley face signs that tell you that you have exceeded the speed limit when you have already exceeded the speed limit.

I have suggested on the Facebook page 'Hatfield Peverel Community Hub' that the village needs more 30 mph signs. Currently there are none, aside from the ones when you first approach the village and one of those is currently obscured by an overhanging tree bough, and crucially, speed cameras along the Maldon Roadone each side of the road perhaps somewhere between the zebra crossing and The Wheatsheaf. I believe this is the only way to stop the high speeds along that road, they are 'official', they'll hit your pocket, they are always there and there's no escape from them!

A councillor has advised that a campaign would be the only route to get this actioned, as the Parish Council doesn't have much 'clout' with highway matters. I am going to attend the next meeting at the village hall (Monday 7th September at 7.30) to try and get the ball rolling. If you are interested in supporting this, please come along?
