Sidney House and The Laurels surgeries

Dear Patients,

Since COVID-19 lockdown, the Surgery has made a number of changes to enable us to continue providing General Practice services for the residents of Boreham, Hatfield Peverel and the surrounding areas. The guidance regarding how we operate as a Surgery is constantly changing so please be advised to regularly look at our website for the most up-to-date information (see link below).

Appointments

Like other surgeries throughout Mid-Essex, the Surgery doors at Sidney House and The Laurels surgeries remain closed as per NHS England guidance. Patients are still able to telephone the Surgery, book a telephone consultation on line, order repeat medication on line or via an email to Dispensary. Unless you have been given an appointment to attend the Surgery there is currently no walk-in access to the premises.

These measures have been taken to ensure the safety of our workforce and that of our Patients. As we have been conducting telephone consultations for over 2 years, Patients registered at our surgeries are aware the majority of issues can be dealt with via the telephone, however, to compensate for the lack of face to face appointments and to improve access with a clinician, the Surgery is able to offer video consultations to those Patients that have a smart mobile phone with video call technology. If a clinician feels a video consultation would be beneficial, they are able to send a text message to a Patient's mobile phone, with a link to enable the video consultation to start. Furthermore, if a clinician feels that a photo would be helpful; for example, to examine a rash or a sore throat, the clinician is able to send a link that allows Patients to send a photo back to the GP. The photo can then be saved in the Patients' medical records.

Feedback from Patients who have experienced a video consultation and photo messaging has been very positive. The Practice hope to continue with all of the new technology options available to us, even when we return to providing services in whatever is the 'new normal'.

Primary Care Networks

Sidney House and The Laurels Surgeries are a member of Aegros Healthcare Primary Care network (PCN). "Aegros" is the Latin word for Patient. Other member practices of the PCN include Little Waltham Surgery, Great Notley Surgery and Douglas Grove Surgery. All GP surgeries in England have been encouraged to work in PCNs, which are groups of Practices that work together to "enable greater provision of proactive, personalised, coordinated and more integrated health and social care". One of the aims of PCNs is to provide a more efficient service to Patients and improve their health and well-being. Primary Care networks are still in their infancy and although there have been setbacks due to COVID-19, Aegros Healthcare has managed to recruit new staff for the benefit of all Patients across our network.

New PCN Staff

Hazel Throssell is a Social Prescriber. Social prescribers take a holistic non-medical approach to people's health and well-being. The Patients most likely to benefit from seeing Hazel are those with multiple and complex needs but all Patients can request to speak to her. Although Hazel is employed by the PCN she has links to voluntary sector organisations and groups in the local area and can signpost patients for emotional and practical support. Hazel works from one of our surgeries each Wednesday.

Philip Nadone is an experienced Physiotherapist and is based at our surgeries on Monday and Tuesday. He has a similar role to Hannah Broadbridge who works on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Philip and Hannah are both first contact Physiotherapists. They assess, diagnose and manage joint and limb problems. They are able to give expert advice on how best to manage these conditions, but, they are able to refer for further investigations or refer onto specialist services if necessary. **Continued on page5**

Riana Gandecha is a Clinical Pharmacist with experience of working in community pharmacies and has been working out of Little Waltham, Great Notley and Douglas Grove surgeries. Play Areas

The Parish Council understands how frustrating it has been for young families during 'lockdown' with the play areas closed. Since 4 July, the Government has allowed local authorities to re-open play facilities should they assess that they can do so safely:

The play areas are now open and children are enjoying the facilities once again. At the August meeting, the Parish Council agreed to re-open the MUGA too. Visits to care homes now allowed

Essex care homes can now decide whether to allow visitors after the government published an update on visiting arrangements. Homes will carry out a full risk assessment prior to allowing visitors to return. Where visits go ahead, they will be limited to a single, consistent visitor, per resident, wherever possible in order to minimise the risk. We encourage visitors to follow policies which care homes have put in place to protect people. It will be down to individual care homes to determine arrangements and family members wishing to visit a loved one should contact the home.

News from St Andrews

There isn't a great deal of news, hardly surprising since we have been under lockdown restrictions for over four months. Our churches were closed, along with all places of worship across Britain. Though re-opened for weddings and funerals few have availed themselves of our facilities because of the social distancing restrictions.



On a personal note I would like to thank those who responded to my appeal about my cat Romeo (usually known

as Bob 2 as he was a Bengal like Bob 1). Though nothing came of it, I was touched that people with their own problems due to being locked down, took time to respond and commiserate. The worst thing about losing an animal is the not knowing. I feel he had been stolen to order and believe some dogs have gone missing in our area. My commiserations to those who have lost beloved pets and not known their fate.

On a more positive note, we are now allowed to hold services in our church buildings provided certain conditions can be met. I won't bore you with exact details, suffice to say that social distancing is the main driver behind what we can and cannot do. We are allowed to hold Sunday worship but with no singing or coffee afterwards. Baptisms, weddings and funerals can take place but numbers are limited to 30 persons and, in the case of weddings, that includes the couple, the bridesmaids/pageboys, and others - organist and photographer/videographer. Needless to say, there has not been a great rush, though I am going to perform my first baptism later on in August.

For the present, one service a Sunday will be held in St Andrews at 10.15am. If you wish to join in but are unsure about actually coming to church, the Service Order, Hymns and the Sermon can be found on the Hatfield Peverel and Ulting website. Sadly, as I write we still cannot have services at All Saints, but provided we do not have a second wave in this part of Essex and lockdown rules ease in August, we may be able to resume worship there as well. Keep an eye on our website for further details, or contact myself 380958 or Fr Derek 380627 for up to date information.

When you receive this Review we will be well into the Sundays after Trinity. Our colours will be green, the colour of growth. It is important to remind ourselves that growth in the faith is not just about the big Christian festivals of Christmas, Holy Week and Easter, Ascension and Whitsun. These are pointers to something much greater; how we reflect on our faith and allow it to inform our lives. Lockdown has posed the question, what is important to us and what can we let go? For me, speaking as a priest, the most difficult was not being able to celebrate Holy Communion. Over the next few weeks we will complete a risk assessment to see if one of the Sunday services can be a Service of Holy Communion.

For those who would like to pray privately St Andrews will be open on Sundays and Wednesdays between 12pm and 2pm, subject of course to the current social distancing rules.

All Saints Church, Ulting

Good news from All Saints! The Church opened again at 9 am on Sunday 10 August for Morning Service for the first time since Services had to be suspended five months ago due to the pandemic. Whilst other Churches have been able to reopen earlier All Saints is such a small building the implications of welcoming a congregation had to be even more carefully considered.

Inevitably, safety measures have had to be put in place. There will be a sanitising station at the entrance where everyone will be requested to give their name for Track and Trace purposes.



Face masks will have to be worn inside and alternate pews only will be available for seating. Everyone will be given an Order of Service which can be taken away and brought for each Service. Instead of hymn books, individual hymn sheets will be given out at each Service and although we will all have to suppress our enthusiasm for singing while the hymns are played on the organ, it will give an opportunity to read the actual words of the hymns and take in their meaning, which is something so often overlooked.

All Saints has had a very difficult time during the past few months when it has become popular (in fact too popular) with groups using the Churchyard for recreation. Sadly, as a result the riverbank by the Churchyard has seriously eroded and the roots of the trees are now exposed. To protect the Churchyard it has been necessary to erect a see-through fence along the riverbank to prevent access to and from the river. All Saints Church has come close to being flooded on many occasions and further erosion could increase this possibility. It would be a tragedy if the Church and its unique location were to be permanently damaged by being too popular.

All Saints has always had the reputation of being 'A Place of Peace and Pilgrimage' something that has possibly been overlooked by some visitors to the Churchyard recently. Now that its doors are open again it will be good to embrace the important and positive aspects the Church and its community has to offer.

Morning Services will be at 9 am on the first, third and fifth Sundays of the month with Holy Communion offering bread only for those wishing to participate. On the second Sunday of the month there will be Morning Prayer at 9 am. I very much look forward to greeting you at All Saints again.

Fine historical pageant in Hatfield Peverel, 1924

In 1924, a grand pageant of the history of Hatfield Peverel was staged in a field at the back of Hatfield Place. The show was organised by the Women's Institute and it was received with great acclaim.

Featured in The Essex Chronicle on 11 July 1924, the gala was hailed as a 'fine pageant at Hatfield – whole parish participates'.

Months of preparation were involved with men, women and children taking part. Almost every character was played by someone native to the village. The newspaper praised the actors and noted that 'many were quite new to this sort of work'.

Those who did not play a role worked feverishly behind the set - making props, painting backdrops and designing costumes. Old fashioned dresses were noted by The Chronicle as being of 'excellent and imposing design'.

Historical scenes were acted out by a cast of one-hundred-and-fifty in that summer of nearly a century ago. An almost one-thousand strong audience was charmed by tales of Hatfield Peverel down through the ages. Some of the stories that the actors played out were of:

Down-trodden locals forced to build the Roman Road; the Plague of 668AD; the repentance of beautiful Ingelrica in the second half of the eleventh century; the dissolution of the Priory in 1536; the sixteenth century witches and their cat Satan; and Dick Turpin's 'escapades' by the Bury in 1725.

The pageant concluded with a torchlight procession with all the actors in period costume. As they emerged on stage - some on horseback - the audience responded with rapturous applause and 'rousing cheer'. A grand finale to their theatrical performance, in 'the ideal setting' of Hatfield Place. After the show, the actors and crew retired to the old Village Hall in The Street where the Women's Institute laid on supper for the troupe.

Life before Lockdown



The year began on an exciting note with the introduction of Forest School learning sessions, school trips to the Hindu Temple in Neasden (Y5), Harry Potter Studios (Y6) and Sutton Hoo (Y4). February saw an overwhelming response to our Grandparents' morning - sharing work together and chatting about the learning that





has been happening. In March the whole school celebrated World Book Day based on the book 'The Day the Crayons Quit' and the children were asked to dress in as much of one colour as possible.

School life was rich and buzzing with enthusiasm when we were all given the news we had been dreading.

Lockdown.

Whilst this meant 'school closed' for the majority of our children, we have remained open for children of our key and front-line workers every day since school closures were announced on 20 March (including the Easter holiday break when the country was in full lockdown). We acknowledged the significant part our school had to play in supporting the wider community whilst delivering a full and varied curriculum to the rest of the children being schooled from home. This has proved challenging for parents (and we have understood from the outset the differing restraints of each family) we have provided 'home learning' bulletins each week to enable the children to continue working from home on a wide range of topics.

Google Classroom has been a fantastic resource and we have tailored it to provide the most appropriate environment for our children. As well as providing a safe and secure way for staff and pupils to connect with each other, the children have used it to upload and show us their work. As staff, we felt the main benefit was to put the children back in touch with their teachers and classmates (albeit virtually) during these extraordinarily challenging times and support our children in their well-being and relationships. The children have enjoyed Google 'meets' with their teachers and classes, whole school quizzes, story-time and they have also been able to share some time 'catching up' with their friends.

Year 6 Return

From 1 June DfE guidance allowed Year 6 children to return. After considerable furniture shifting, space measuring and a rigorous risk assessment, on 3 June we were delighted to welcome back 70% of this year group to their new 'Bubbles'. They adapted to the 'new normal' with the spirit and resilience that we have come to expect from our St Andrew's children. We are enormously proud of them and the way they have organised themselves up to their time of leaving. This has not been the end any of us wanted for them but on Thursday 9 July, we were able to enjoy a family leaver's celebration with a socially distanced picnic and say 'Goodbye'. They also enjoyed a visit from an ice-cream van and a surprise leavers' film which is shared on our website – we recommend a viewing, it will bring a smile to your face!

A special moment (which may well have started a new St Andrew's tradition) came when the staff and children in school-based childcare 'lined the route' out of school for the leavers, clapping the whole time.



From Friday 10 July we began to welcome into school our new Year Three children, followed by our current Years 3-5 for transition sessions in preparation for September. These are precious opportunities to meet the new Year Two children who will be joining us in September. These sessions also ensure that all of the children have said 'goodbye' to their old teachers and a 'hello' to their new teachers so that when September arrives the children are better prepared for a 'full return' to school life.

May we wish everyone in the Hatfield Peverel community a safe and happy summer 2020.

Suffered loss and grief. Hatfield Peverel Cricket Club joins our community in adding their condolences and thoughts and prayers for all of those who have suffered. Every organisation like the Cricket Club is the sum of all the people involved in its activities. The continued existence of the club has been of paramount importance for the well-being of those who love cricket. Sadly, many clubs have not been able to survive and have closed or been forced into mergers losing some part of their identity as a consequence.



Happily, HPCC has been able to ride out the lockdown despite loss in revenue generated by playing cricket during the season. This has been achieved by cutting expenditure to a minimum, the generosity of those who maintain the ground by providing their services at vastly reduced cost or for free, and by obtaining a grant that in large part compensated for the loss of income caused by the enforced lockdown.

That said, we always welcome new members and membership is vital for our continued existence. I hope you are doing well and staying as positive as possible during these challenging time. Here is an update on what has been has been happening at Helen Rollason Cancer Charity over the past months and what our plans for the future are.

"As many of you will know our Support Centres, including our one on The Street, and Charity Shops all



closed on 23 March in line with Government guidelines, with the majority of staff being put on furlough leave. Knowing how important our services are to our clients meant we have had to diversify the support we could provide at this time and implemented welfare calls, by telephone, to clients and volunteers.

I am very proud to say that to date the therapists have had **1192** conversations and left **470** messages. These have been very well received – listening to clients who have had medical treatment cancelled or delayed, sign posting people to the range of online and virtual support groups such as mindfulness and yoga that we have set up, or have a general chat, has been hugely beneficial. We have also been providing emergency and crisis counselling sessions by telephone.

As for so many charities and businesses, the pandemic has impacted our budgeted income. Our annual cycle event Ride for Helen, in May at Crix in the village, has been rescheduled to Sunday 20 September 2020. We may have to restrict numbers and change some processes but I am confident this will take place. Online registration is available at www.rideforhelen.co.uk

We are currently looking for some additional storage space in the village to store the donations we have been receiving. If anyone has an unused garage, large shed, warehouse or similar in the local area that we could borrow for the next 3 or 4 months then please do get in touch with me (contact details below)

I wish I could tell you when we are going to be re-opening **all** our Support Centres but I cannot. When we do reopen I am anticipating a staggered start, reduced hours and limited activities. What I can say is that they will only reopen once it is in the best interest of our clients, staff and volunteers. The welfare of all is paramount and this will not be compromised.



However I can confirm the Mid Essex Support Centre in Hatfield Peverel will be reopening on 1st September. Initially we will be offering a limited number of appointments and our services will be reduced but for more information clients can contact Hazel, the Centre Co-ordinator on 07874 945994

Allotments and gardens are good for fresh air...

While so much of the year has featured distressing, sad, and horrible news, let's see if we can find and emphasise the positive. Allotments and gardens are good for fresh air, exercise, social distance, and mental well-being - good health which hopefully you all are all experiencing

Our allotments look better than ever - mostly due to a common factor all of us with allotments share. Time! Lockdown has given everyone more personal and discretionary time and our allotments are looking great. I suspect the same is true for home gardens. How do we keep them looking good especially in this dry weather? Water is the key! Here are some tips.

Golden rules for watering - rarely shared, are usually learned through experience. And bits of rain such as we've recently had, do not replace watering. We have developed long arms hauling water from our water tanks to compensate for dry soil. Homeowners have hose-pipes. Plants do need plenty of water: how much, how often? How much is enough? When should we water - not in the heat of the day.

Rule 1 Keep soil evenly moist - most plants depend on even moisture and slight drying out before watering, promotes root growth. But avoid water logging – causing root cells to drown without oxygen.

Rule 2 Water seldom but thoroughly – every other day or 2 to 3 times per week is usually sufficient. Better to water seldom but with plenty of water rather than a little bit daily.

Rule 3 Water late in the evening or early morning . Cooled soil means less water evaporates.

Rule 4 Keep leaves dry, water soil below. Roots absorb water, not leaves - wet leaves may become diseased or sunburnt.. Always apply water around the plant near the roots to prevent one-sided root growth.

Rule 5 Give the right quantity of water - top 2 inches of soil should be damp. Water needs a moment to seep into the soil. Better to water and repeat to avoid water flowing away unused.

Rule 6 Lawn grasses are plants too - water 30 to 60 minutes every 10 days. Spraying for a few minutes a day stresses the grass.

Rule 7: Irrigate to save water - water as much as necessary and as little as possible.

The Jazz Century – Cakewalk to Culture

Our Spring term course just made it before lockdown!

An enjoyable look at the development of Jazz in the 20th Century. We time travelled through the decades, early years in New Orleans, the movement to other American cities, particularly New York and Chicago, and thence to Europe and beyond. Most bands were segregated, black or white, and this continued well through the century. Lots of music to lister to and film align and we learned about recording technology and how it influences.

to listen to, and film clips, and we learned about recording technology, and how it influenced the success of various bands. Graham Platts, our tutor is very knowledgeable.

Next term will be different. Due to Covid-19 restrictions, WEA has decided there will be no face-to-face courses in the autumn term; we are going online, using Zoom. One of our favourite tutors, Ted Woodgate, will deliver a series of lectures entitled 'The East End Strikes Back', looking at social problems caused by the industrial revolution, particularly poverty and inequality, and how those in power attempted to cope with the resulting political pressures. The dramatic events in London in 1888 and 1889 are set in this national context. We will also learn how this movement, inspired by economic circumstances, went on to influence a national political realignment which eventually to the rise of the Labour Party.

It is an interesting experiment, and we shall have to see how it goes. We are hoping normal service will be resumed in January, and we can once again meet in the Scout HQ on Tuesday mornings. Watch this space! We will sadly be unable to run our evening lectures in the autumn but again are hopeful for 2021.

The course starts on Tuesday 22 September and runs for 10 weeks. Start time is 9.15 am, finishing at 10.45 am. Bring your own coffee and biscuits! The cost is £48 for the term. To enrol, go to the WEA website (www.wea.org.uk/). Use the Course Reference C2227526. Click on 'I know the course reference', put the Course Reference in the box, and the exact course should come up. You read about the course, and enrol online. Instructions on using Zoom should follow.


