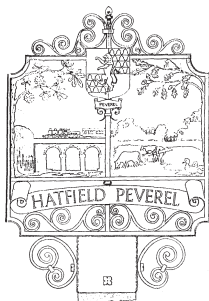

Station Road bridge repairs - date provisional don't get too excited!

Over the last few years the bridge surface has deteriorated significantly and following considerable pressure from the Parish Council and our local MP, the Highways Agency and Essex County Council are proposing a major work programme to rectify the problem.

This work is anticipated to start in July and last some weeks. There will be significant disruption to traffic in Station Road due to single lane travel over the bridge, controlled by traffic lights, and some closures at night of the A12 resulting in traffic increases through the village. Detailed information will be made available to residents in the area when the programme dates are finalised.

Beating the Bounds

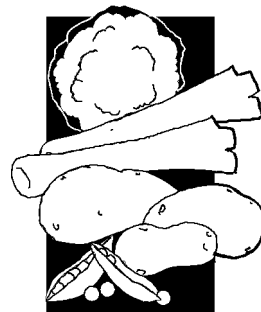
The boundary walk on Spring Bank Holiday Monday, 7th May, was cancelled due to a combination weather, ground conditions and ankle injury of the organiser. It may well go ahead on Saturday 16th June but because of the ankle injury this is uncertain at the time of writing. Also, the continued abysmal June weather may be a factor in considering whether or not to abandon the idea altogether for this year.

The route crosses Terling Hall Road at Terling Hall farm - that's after about 4½ miles, or Terling Road before Whitelands - about 6 miles. People were sinking half way up their wellies and the earth was like a china clay pug. However, May produced some useful periods of drier weather and thoughts of good watercress crops were thwarted. With the best allotment competition timed for the end of June serious work has commenced and the plots are suddenly coming to life. Strawberries are well ahead and potatoes, this year not disrupted by heavy frost, will be available at the beginning of June onwards.

Many will know that during the course of the development by Greenfields Community Housing of the garage area between Baker Avenue and New Road, the footway leading from Baker Avenue into the garage area has been closed off. This way has been in existence and used ever since the houses in Baker Avenue were built in the early '60s. The approved plan provides for its retention and it will be reopened once the development is complete. However, to give the path a higher degree of protection from any possible future moves to close it the Parish Council wants to make an application to Essex County Council to have it added to the village's public footpath network on the county Definitive Map. The other path which runs through the site, along from the rec' then turning right up to New Road is already on the Definitive Map, so has that protection (the bold dashed line in the sketch below).

We need to gather evidence of its use as a public footpath over the twenty year period preceding its closure in late March, and we are seeking responses from anyone who has used the path regularly for any significant length of time within that period in the belief that it was a public right of way, ie, as of right, with no-one ever attempting to prevent them from doing so. A small working group has been formed consisting of parish councillors Alan Ingram and Bernie Heard, and Ken Earney, Parish Paths Partnership rep for the village, to put together the application and assist people willing to provide the evidence with the form that needs to be completed.

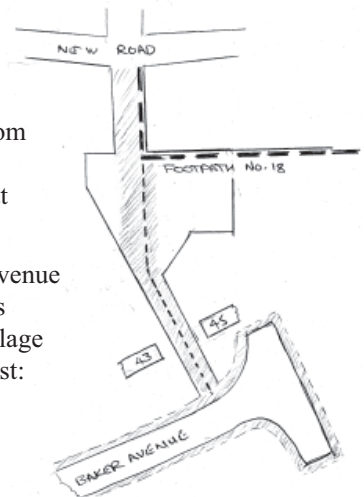
The form asks questions about the time over which you have used the path; the purpose of your journey, eg, to get to and from the bus or train or the shops, journeys to and from school, and so on; how often and when you used the path; did you ever have anyone ever trying to prevent you from using it. It would be helpful if you would be prepared to attend any public inquiry that might be called to examine the evidence that we provide – that way your evidence would carry more weight.

The working group members will be calling on the residents of Baker Avenue and those nearby in Church Road, but we need to spread the net as wide as possible, and indeed to contact people who have moved away from the village who were users when residents here. Planning

All planning meetings are open to the public. Notification of these meetings will be erected in the village notice boards three clear days prior to each meeting.

The following applications have recently been made

Erection of single storey rear extension at Vinehurst, The Street. No comment other than the dates on the application form referring to related proposals are incorrect; proposed new entrance gates to front and rear at Rainbirds, Paper Mill Bridge. No comment to be made. Erection of two storey side extension with alteration to existing roof at 4 Yew Tree Close. No comment to be made. Erection of a two storey side extension to existing two storey semi-detached dwelling and erection of single storey front porch/bay extension at 29 New Road. No comment to be made. Amended proposal for approved planning application ref: 11/01020/FUL for five dwellings and associated car parking at land at Prospect Close. No comment to be made.

The following applications have been approved by the District Council

Erection of kitchen extension at Lower Farm Road, Hatfield Peverel; proposal to extend front and rear dormer windows, remove existing first floor left hand side window, brick up to match existing brickwork, replace with new windows to front and rear to match existing at 6 Priory Farm Road; erection of single storey bathroom extension at Darrowood, The Vineyards; erection of detached garage at 4 Ingelrica Avenue; erection of single storey extension and alterations to existing detached dwelling at 3 Woodham Drive; erection of two storey side extension and single storey rear extension, alterations and refurbishment together with a replacement garage and associated landscaping works at Brecklands, Station Road; erection of replacement conservatory at 13 Garden Field.

The following application has been refused by the District Council

Application for a non-material amendment to approved application 11/01453/FUL (change from facing brickwork to decorated render) - erection of front/side first floor extension above existing garage and new pitched roof to replace existing lean-to roof at 1 Station Cottages, Station Road.

Hadfelda car park

After consulting with an arboriculturalist, Braintree District Council was advised that the horse chestnut tree in the car park had to be removed. The planter around the tree was broken and the roots were sitting 18" proud of the tarmac. If the roots were cut back, it could destabilise the tree and thus present a risk of serious damage to users of the car park as well as to neighbouring properties.

Road closures

Essex Highways has notified us that Link Road and Ulting Road will be closed at some time from 4th June 2012 to allow highway maintenance. Further information will be given when dates are confirmed.

Maldon Road will be closed in one direction on Friday 6th July during the Olympic Torch Relay. The traffic will be diverted down Church Road and out onto The Street by the Blue Strawberry where traffic management will be present to assist.

Update on parking restrictions

The Parish Council is proposing to implement parking restrictions in part of Arthy Close and parts of Stonepath Drive. This proposal has been sent to the Parking Partnership for approval and the council will inform all residents of the details of these restrictions once approval has been given.

From the 4th July 2012, the Mobile Library will visit Manor Road Nounsley fortnightly on a Wednesday arriving 11.25am and leaving at 11.40am.

An invitation from the Queen

Royal Garden Party 22nd May 2012 - Jo Jarvis tells us about the day she took tea with the Queen

It started with a letter in December informing me I had been nominated to attend a Royal Garden party at Buckingham Palace on 22nd May 2012 - the nomination was for Services to the Community*. I accepted the invitation from the Queen, and was able to take someone with me who was over 18, and I asked my mother.

In April I received the Official invitation from the Lord Chamberlain at Buckingham Palace - May seemed a long time away but suddenly it was here. The day dawned cloudy but by 10am the sun was out and warm. We got the 12.33 train to Liverpool Street and after a quick bite to eat headed to the taxi rank, only to find the first taxi was a limousine - what a treat. When we arrived at the Mall it was closed because of preparations for the Diamond Jubilee celebrations but the taxi was given permission to go through and we were dropped outside the main gates.

We queued to be allowed in and at 2 o'clock the gates opened, we showed our invitation and passports and walked across the main forecourt and under the arch into the quadrangle where the royal coaches go, and entered the doors. The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge went through on their wedding day. We walked through two state rooms with wonderful gold ceilings, red carpets at least 4 inches thick, and paintings on the walls. This led us onto the patio and gardens - what a sight, a tea tent at least 100 metres long, the royal tea tent with its golden chairs and the diplomats' tent to the side. Iced water or iced lemonade was served - by now the temperature was at least 26°C.

We had time to walk around the gardens, the azaleas in so many colours, the smell of lilac, ducks on the lake, and at 3 o'clock we lined up on the lawn and The Queen and Duke of Edinburgh arrived at the top of the steps, followed by Princess Royal, Prince Andrew, Duke of Kent, Princess Alexandra, Prince and Princess Michael of Kent, Duke and Duchess of Gloucester. We stood and sang The National Anthem and everyone clapped as the Queen walked down onto the lawn and was introduced to members of the public - I didn't speak to her but was only six feet away. We also got close to The Duke of Edinburgh.

Tea was cucumber and mint finger sandwiches, ham and tomato sandwiches, tiny fruit tarts, éclairs and small chocolate mousses with tiny gold crowns on top. To drink - tea, iced coffee or fruit juices, and later ice creams. Afterwards we headed towards the Royal tent to watch the Queen depart at 5.40pm. As she left she turned towards us and waved - she seemed to be looking straight at us.

The whole afternoon went so quickly and I felt honoured to be able to attend such a wonderful occasion, in such a wonderful Royal year it makes you proud to be British.

* Jo is a Learning Support Assistant at Sandon School and was nominated for Services to the Community. This has included some thirty years involvement in the Scouting movement in Hatfield Peverel - she became a Brownie in Terling at the age of seven and was a Queen's Guide at seventeen - as Cub Leader, Assistant Scout and Scout Leader and Group Scout Leader. Jo now runs 1st Hatfield Peverel Cubs. Many may not be aware that leaders of all youth orientated organisations - including Scouts and Guides - are on the job (voluntarily) up to fifty two weeks a year. Jo has also for many years run swimming classes in Terling pool two days a week, from teaching children to swim to getting their life saving awards. She has helped at the local Infant School in Hatfield Peverel and organised cycling proficiency for the children.

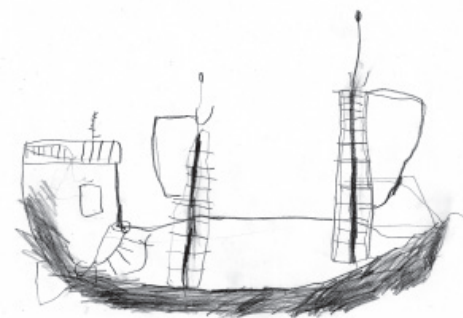
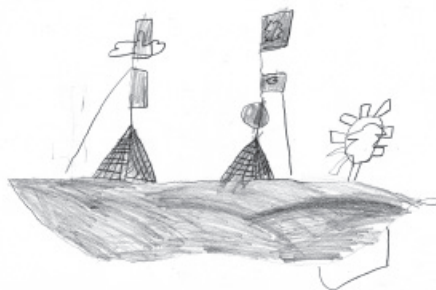

We're now into June, the weather is better after the flooding and really cold spell in May, so before BBQ season gets into full swing, a few reminders.

If you open windows don't leave valuables in plain sight as opportunist thieves will have your treasures away.

When you leave the house close the windows - and be aware of open doors especially if you can't keep an eye on who could be popping into your home without you knowing.

If you leave doors open to let the breeze through don't leave car keys, handbags and purses, mobile phones within arms reach - they may be stolen.

People are busy on allotments and in the garden: lock your tools and your shed as there have been incidents of tool and mower thefts. If you would like your bits of equipment marked or coded please get in touch with me and I will be happy to oblige. This aids police in enquiries: if people are caught with stolen equipment or tools and it can be proved they have been stolen then the offenders can be dealt with appropriately.

Remember to lock your vehicles and don't leave windows wound down if you cannot see your car; don't leave valuables on display in your car if it is left unattended and insecure.

Taking your car to walk your dogs further afield? Heat in vehicles is amplified - if you take dogs on long journeys stop to let them stretch their legs and take water for them to drink.

Bear in mind when driving that sunlight can be reflected off the road; at sun rise and sunset conditions can be difficult, especially if you are on a narrow windy lane and you are heading into the sun. This can affect the way you can or cannot see oncoming traffic.

'Brainwave' helps children

Mother's Union

17th April - At the evening meeting Gerry Gould spoke about the children's charity Brainwave which helps to unlock the potential of children with various learning disabilities. Brainwave works with families to give home-based therapies and exercises to help their children to become more independent when they grow up. Gerry, who works in Brainwave's Witham centre, explained the working of the centre, how families are referred and the vital support they are given.



Since its inception in 1982 Brainwave has helped around 2,000 families from the UK and is always busy fundraising as demand for its services keeps growing. Members made a collection and the speaker donated her fee for the evening.

1st May, 2.30pm - Jean Ashby conducted the opening service and then gave an entertaining and interesting talk of her '70 years of singing' which began at a young age listening to her mother's lullabies. Her father had a pleasant voice and was asked to sing at social gatherings, and

although she loved her dad singing at home, she was embarrassed when he sang in front of other people!

The family moved to Hatfield Peverel in 1940 and Jean joined the Methodist Church where she met a lady interested in her singing ability and encouraged her love of drama, and she became a member of the Choral Society run by Mr West. Jean and her future husband Dennis both sang with the society and Dennis also sang in the church choir which Jean joined after she married and became a member of St Andrew's Church.

When the children were young Jean joined Boreham Ladies Choir where she had the honour of performing The Messiah with other choirs in the Royal Albert Hall conducted by Sir Malcolm Sergeant. After Boreham Choir folded she joined Witham Choral Society, performing together with Weinham Choir in Germany and singing at Snape Maltings.

While teaching in the 70s at Springfield C of E Primary School Jean shared her love of music with the children and had fun participating in numerous music festivals.

Jean concluded her fascinating talk by saying as long as she can manage to reach the correct notes and sing in tune, she will go on. Long may that be.

Methodist Church

Our pre-Easter craft event proved a delightful occasion when the ladies of the church rediscovered their skills in making Easter bonnets, decorated Easter eggs, an Easter cross and a papier-mâché depiction of the Easter tomb. After this skilled work we sat down to lunch and admired our efforts. These items were put into use on Easter Day when we celebrated the risen Lord. The church looked lovely with all the extra handicrafts and the tomb, which had been left bare in the period leading up to Easter, was covered by the congregation in spring flowers to illustrate the new beginning which Christ's death on the Cross gave to us all.

On 20th April our members had a Spring outing to Sandon garden centre for afternoon tea. The

heavy rain, lightning and thunder in the morning gave way sufficiently for us all to stay dry, and let us wander around the centre to work off the large cakes and pastries we enjoyed.

We celebrated 137 years of Methodist worship on 6th May in a service led by our Minister Rev Sue Lambert. She reminded us of the beginnings of Methodism when John and Charles Wesley preached in the open air and wrote many of the hymns we sing today. We proved how memorable the words and music of the well-loved Charles Wesley Hymn 'How can it be' by singing unaccompanied and without hymn books and got as far as verse 3 before our memories failed us. We sang choruses from our Sunday school days which have left an imprint in our heads – who remembers 'Jesus wants me for a sunbeam'?

We have discovered newspaper cuttings from the time the church was opened in 1875 which shows the building of the Methodist Chapel was controversial at that time and led to the resignation of the Parish vicar who was of the opinion that the new church was totally unnecessary. He believed promoters of the new church, including a subscriber from Maldon, were trying to weaken the Christian community here and the church is 'no more wanted than the Crystal Palace (built in London in 1851) is wanted in the parish'. Times have changed and we have a good relationship with members of St Andrews and the Salvation Army and share a United service with them once a quarter as well as individually supporting one another in our Christian lives.

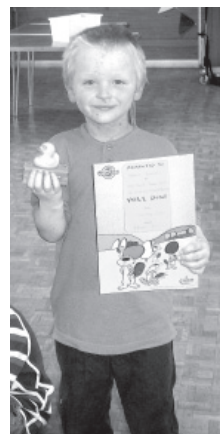
