# **Summary of the Garden**

Visit inspiring herbaceous borders, glasshouses that take you around the world or simply relax in the UK's oldest botanic garden.

With nearly 6,000 different types of plants, the Garden is a year-round oasis of biodiversity, right in the heart of the city.

**There are seven glasshouses** - the conservatory, alpine house, cloud forest, lily house, arid house, palm house and carnivorous plant house. The first was built at the Botanic Garden more than 300 years ago.

**The Walled Garden** dates back to the Oxford Botanic Garden's foundation in 1621 and is the Garden's oldest section. It houses the Geographic Beds, the Medicinal Plants Beds and the Woodland Walk and Literary Trail.

**The Lower Garden** holds ornamental collections. They include the Rock Garden which has many Mediterranean species, the Gin Border in which plants commonly used in the production of gin are grown, the Herbaceous Border, Plants That Changed the World beds, and the Merton Borders.

**Herbarium Room – the** Oxford University Herbaria is a global cultural resource of approximately one million dried plant specimens. It was founded in the seventeenth century, and is the oldest herbarium in the United Kingdom.

**Pop-up café-** From April to September, the Jericho Coffee Traders' pop-up café will be at the Botanic Garden, near the River Cherwell. The café serve delicious coffees, teas, cakes and ice cream.
