Annual General Meeting

The Society's 2020 AGM was held on 3rd March when our President, Michael George, chaired the meeting. He welcomed members and paid tribute to Tessa Madden and Joe Ratlidge, see above. Michael encouraged members to volunteer to serve on the Committee. Brian Butler presented the Chairman's Report. He thanked the Committee and all members who had helped the Society, in particular Charlie Taylor who, with David Ridgway's help, produced the yearbook. Peter Marsden presented the Treasurer's Report and explained the excess of expenditure over income, of £613.52. David Ridgway presented the Show Secretary's Report. He encouraged members to exhibit at our Shows and explained how the rules for the Novice Classes had been amended and classes for single blooms been added to the schedule. The President, Officers, Committee and Inspector of Accounts were all re-elected.

They will be left outside for collection along with a box for the correct money or cheque (cheques made payable to KEHS). The price of plants will be:- half trays £3, Tithonia, Shoo Fly, Cerinthe, Coleus and Chrysanthemums £1 each, Geraniums £1.25, Dahlias £3 & £4, Rhubarb £3 & £4, Runner beans tray of six plants £2.50, French beans £1 each, Courgettes £2.50 each, Tomatoes £1 each 6 for £5.

We shall hopefully sell perennials and house plants at a later date, possibly at the time of the Autumn Show. However if anyone is wanting herbaceous plants straight away please contact Jean Young on 01296 622306, Jean.ellesborough@gmail.com to see what she has available.
