



Unauthorised encampments in Essex fall by 70% in four years

The Rural Engagement Team (RET) specialise in issues affecting rural communities. The number of unauthorised encampments in Essex has fallen by more than two-thirds since 2018 due to their work. Unauthorised encampments (UEs) occur when trespassers occupy land belonging to private landowners or public authorities without permission. As trespass is a civil rather than criminal offence it falls under the authority of local councils, however police officers do have the power to evict people from unauthorised encampments under Sections 60C and 61 of the Criminal Justice & Public Order Act. These powers will be used where behaviour or conduct is inappropriate, or where the impact of an encampment on others is deemed unacceptable.

Sergeant Ben Felton said RET officers’ practical approach and detailed knowledge of the law has seen numbers of unauthorised encampments fall from 171 in 2018 down to 52 in 2022. He said: “Between April and September, a good 50% of our work is dealing with unauthorised encampments. “What is different to many other forces in the country is that our team goes to every single UE. We’ve become experts at dealing with them. We talk to the people who come here and lay out our expectations. If they don’t stick to the rules, they’ll be politely moved on, and we make sure they understand why they’re being moved. RET officers visit every unauthorised encampment reported. Previously we were managing between 10 and 15 UEs at a time. That number is now down to between two and four. The people who don’t want to work with us have mainly stopped coming here.”

Reasons that people forming an encampment may be asked to move on include disrupting locals’ access to amenities like parks or football pitches, affecting the local economy by camping in shops’ car parks or on agricultural land, or if there have been instances of anti-social behaviour. Changes in the legislation now mean that officers don’t need to know who the landowner is to move an encampment. This prevents people evicted from one camp being able to set up another in the same area. A key aspect of the team’s work is having good lines of communication between both sides.

“It’s about managing the rights of the people to enjoy their chosen way of life, and the concerns and rights of local communities and the landowners. We are very sensitive to how we deal with them, but we are robust. Once the locals see we are coming back daily to monitor the sites, they understand that we’re doing what we can.

“We have emails from Parish Councillors thanking us for how we've dealt with situations. We're taking a common-sense approach and making sure there is consistency in the way we're applying the legislation. We're balancing the needs of both sides so everyone can get on with life.

Do you want to report non-emergency crime, antisocial behaviour or tell us about suspicious behaviour in your community? You can submit a report online or use our Live Chat service.

To use the service, select the 'Live Chat' icon at the bottom right of your screen when you're on our website. It can be accessed from a desktop computer, laptop, tablet or mobile phone.

We still have our 24-hour 101 service which people can call if they feel it is more appropriate to speak to us or don't have access to the internet.

If it's an emergency or someone is in immediate danger, please call 999 at once.

If you have a hearing or speech impairment, use our textphone service 18000 or text us on 999 if you've pre-registered with the emergencySMS service.”

It is also good to know that the RETs are also tackling more areas of concern, like the illegal practices of hare coursing, farm thefts and other anti-social behaviours in our rural areas. There is now a dedicated team to look after our countryside to ensure our safety and well-being, and they are very willing to attend local events and Parish Council Meetings to talk to residents and interested parties on the work that they do and how we can all help keep our rural areas safe.

We are very grateful that the Rural Engagement teams are looking out for us, but they also need our help as they cannot be everywhere at once, and rely on information from the public, so please stay alert and let them know if you see or hear of anything suspicious.

Maldon District Conservation Awards Design Highly Commended

The Old Post Office, Langford, has been given this award for the renovation and extension of a building in a conservation area. Dating from early in the 19th Century, the property was, for many years, the village post office. Later in the 20th century it was considerably altered, including the introduction of unsympathetic plastic windows. This award is for the refurbishment and extension of the house for its owners, Mr. and Mrs. Truman. The plastic windows were replaced by high-quality painted timber windows, and subservient side and rear extensions were added, clad in timber weatherboarding in reference to the previous finish of the house. The judges were particularly impressed by the workmanship and execution of the project.

It may also be of interest to readers of this newsletter that the winner of the competition, Hazeleigh Hall, (in, not surprisingly), Hazeleigh, had new panelling made by Kevin Gribble, of Maeldune Joinery, Church Cottages, Langford.

The new panels were installed in the attic of the building, and evidence found in this space showed that it was originally the 'long gallery,' a popular feature of high-status Elizabethan and Jacobean houses, used for entertaining guests and exercise. The space is now in use as a master bedroom.

The judges were extremely impressed by this project, which 'breathed new life into an important historic building.' They admired the way in which the scheme was informed by a detailed analysis of the building's history and significance, and that important features were carefully retained. Well done Kevin!

Tragedy at Hoe Mill House

Following last issue's little article on Winoa Constable, who lived at Hoe Mill House, further information about this wonderful building has come to light. It appears that in 1896 Robert Horsnell, of Hatfield Peverel, began working as a groom for Captain C.E. Morton, of Hoe Mill House. Sadly, at the end of August 1898, Robert, aged 30, committed suicide by taking weed killing powder, at the house, '...whilst of unsound mind', leaving a widow and five children, aged from 8 months to 8 years. A lengthy report appeared the following week in the *Essex County Chronicle*, but it was unclear why he had done so as he himself had never talked about suicide, or an adequate reason for it, although money worries seem to have been part of the problem.

However, there is a happy ending to this story, as on 28th April, 1901, Robert's widow, Alice, married Arthur Doe, a farm labourer from Hatfield Peverel. Alice and Arthur, and Alice's five children, three boys and two girls, aged from 3 to 11, moved to School Lane, Hatfield Peverel. Alice and Arthur had six children – four boys and two girls.



Despite the relationship, and the age difference, the Horsnell family were evidently close to their younger half-siblings (the greatest age difference being 20 years, between Frederick Horsnell and Frank Doe). In letters written home during the Great War, both Frederick and Arthur Horsnell commented on letters they had received from the Doe children, often signing off with love and kisses to 'the little ones.'

In letters written by Arthur in March and June 1916, he refers to himself affectionately as 'old bunny', 'your son bunny' or plain 'bunny'. Perhaps we're seeing Arthur's humour at work, playing on the Doe surname – a female rabbit being a 'doe' and his mother (Mrs. Doe), like a rabbit, having gone on to produce a second family of six children (bunnies), who were Arthur's younger half-siblings. Railway Cottage

Who remembers the old halt at Langford? Do you recall having to walk to the top of the railway bridge and then through the gate and down the stairs to the platform? Many will not, as the line closed in 1964, and the railway, as we knew it, disappeared into history.



Now, sadly, the stairs are no longer there, and they have been replaced by a path from the main road that links onto the platform where the old steps used to be, and then onto what is now the 'Blackwater Rail Trail.' A lot safer, of course, especially with all the traffic, but sad to think that yet another piece of our history, together with the railway it served, has been lost forever. How wonderful, then, to still have these old photographs to remind us of what used to be.



But, of course, not all is lost. As mentioned, what used to be the Maldon to Langford part of the railway, now The Blackwater Rail Trail, is a nice, easy cycle way or walk. The route includes views of the River Blackwater and a riverside section along the River Chelmer into Maldon. Here you can enjoy fine views of the Blackwater Estuary at the Marine Lake in Promenade Park. You can also pick up the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation Canal and enjoy easy waterside walking or cycling along the towpath.

Sadly, the idea to reinstate the railway, suggested by MP John Whittingdale and Maldon District Council didn't come to anything, so there will be no trains any time soon!

Essex & Suffolk Water – Layer to Langford new Pipeline

To ensure Essex & Suffolk Water (ESW) can continue to provide a reliable and resilient supply of water to its 1.5 million customers in Essex, it is looking to improve the raw water transfer capacity between its operating areas. To achieve this ESW are intending to construct a pipeline to transfer raw water from Layer-de-la-Haye Water Treatment Works to the existing storage reservoir at Langford Water Treatment Works.

The pipeline will be constructed along a route that has been optimised following consultations with land owners, the completion of ecological surveys, ground investigation work and hydraulic requirements.

The pipeline will be approximately 19km in length and will be able to transfer up to 50 million litres of water per day.

The work is due to start in February 2023 and is due to be completed by August 2025. Upon completion of the pipeline there will be no obvious above ground features, allowing ESW to return the land to its previous appearance and use.



A popular pub history book about Maldon's inns, alehouses, and breweries is revisited



Dr. Patrick Chaplin, who grew up in Ulting Lane, Langford, has spent two years revisiting and improving a popular book about the history of Maldon's public houses, for a post-Covid world.

The book was first published in 1988 by Maldon's Ken Stubbings entitled "*Here's Good Luck to the Pint Pot! – A brief history of Maldon's Inns, Alehouses and Breweries*" and was the first ever book produced on the subject, but, sadly, has been out of print for more than 30 years.

In 2020 Patrick, a local author and Chairman of the Pub History Society, decided to revisit it. He said "There was a genuine need to revisit 'Pint Pot'" and set about doing just that, noting that he had obtained the necessary permissions to reproduce and 'gently' edit Ken's work. All the advertisements and images that appeared in the original book remain, but Patrick has revised and substantially expanded the text and added further black and white and colour images.

He has also added two further chapters – one about the town's micro-pubs and another looking at Maldon's pubs through today's perspective. He has also updated the information about the pubs of Langford and Ulting which Ken had included in his original.


Patrick hopes that this will be of great interest to anyone interested in pubs in the local area, as well as Maldon's history in general.

The revisited 'Pint Pot' also includes a tribute to Ken, who died in 2012.

The book costs £10 and is available from 'Maldon Books' in the High Street, (01621 854968) the Maeldune Heritage Centre, St. Peter's Tower, Maldon, and St. Giles' Church, Langford, or direct from Patrick (01621 856040).

This drawing shows what was The *White Hart* beer house, which was attached to its brewery when it was in use from

1832 till 1874. All the buildings have now gone except the house itself, which is now greatly altered. The Museum of Power is now behind the building.



Changes to Voting procedures for Maldon District Residents at Elections on 4th May 2023

For the first time, residents in Maldon District will need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Residents are being urged to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID.



Accepted forms of ID include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK, EEA, or Commonwealth drivers' licence; and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass or an Oyster 60+ card. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at www.voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk/ or by completing a paper form. The full list of accepted ID is available on the Electoral Commission's website, along with more information about the new requirement and details of how to apply for the free ID, at electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID.

Residents who do not have one of the accepted forms of ID can apply for free ID either online or by completing a paper application form and sending this to Maldon District Council's electoral services team. If you need any help with applying for the free ID or want to request an application form, contact the electoral services team on elections@maldon.gov.uk

Anyone who wants to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. It only takes five minutes to register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. Voters wishing to apply to their council for free ID should first make sure they are registered to vote.

The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station, is a new requirement, introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and comes into effect for the first time this May.

If you wish to vote (and of course we all hope you will) please remember to have some form of photo ID with you when you arrive at the polling station so that you are not turned away. We are particularly hoping that more women will vote as it was a long hard fight to get this right, but some people don't realise this.

News from All Saints Church, Ulting

Now that the churchyard is full of snowdrops, the Carols by Candlelight Services seems a long time ago. It was held on a particularly chilly afternoon with the threat of snow at any moment, but the warmth of
