Ulting's heritage

This fine village sign highlights some of Ulting's heritage in three plaques – its recording in the Domesday Book of 1086, the fact that the Artist and Photographer Humphrey Spender (1910-2005) lived in the village from 1949 to 2005, and one to record the Christian Millennium.

In his book *The History and Topography of Essex* of 1836, Thomas Wright described Ulting as "...a parish about six miles in circumference, bounded on the south by the River Chelmer, and on the north by Hatfield Peverel. It lies three miles south-west from Witham and thirty-four miles from London. It has

two capital estates. In 1821 this parish contained eighty-three females and ninety-two males; total one hundred and seventy-five."

The two 'capital estates' he mentions appear to be those of Ulting Hall and Mugdon Hall (also known variously as Mugledon Hall, Mowden Hall [with Cardvilles] and Cardfields (although Cardfields is now a Residential Study Centre in Bumfords Lane). The 'Architector and Surveyor' John Walker undertook a survey of Mugdon Hall in 1589, and this and other papers relating to the Hall are lodged in the Essex Record Office. It is now remembered in Mowden Hall Lane.

PROPOSED LANGFORD PARISH BOUNDARY CHANGE - LANGFORD RESIDENTS ONLY

For a long time, the residents of a few properties along Langford Road, Heybridge have wanted to become part of Langford. On the advice of Maldon District Council we will be collecting signatures for a petition of the electors of Langford Parish and those electors in the parish of Heybridge who will be affected by the proposed change to the south eastern boundary of the parish. If at least 50% of the electors ask for a 'Community Governance Review' the District Council will consider conducting a review of the parish boundary, consulting all interested parties, before making a decision. Please sign and return the enclosed petition in the stamped addressed envelope provided in support of this request.

Upgrading of the effluent pipeline between Chelmer Village and Langford

As you will be aware, Essex & Suffolk Water are upgrading the effluent pipeline between Chelmer Village and Langford. The existing pipeline between Anglia Water's Chelmsford sewage treatment works near Boreham to the discharge point in the Blackwater Estuary at Beeleigh is nearing full capacity due to the increased growth in the Chelmsford catchment area.



Various options were assessed to increase its capacity whilst minimising the impact on the environment, and the preferred option was a gravity underground pipeline running alongside the route of the existing pipeline. Where possible existing assets are being reused to lessen the environmental impacts of the project, such as employing existing redundant pipeline thereby significantly reducing the amount of new pipeline being needed. Hedgerows or trees affected by this work will be replaced by the contractors once the work has been completed, and Essex & Suffolk Water are committed to working with the local community to minimise disruption.



neighbourhood
planning:

In the past year work has continued to build an evidence base for our Neighbourhood Plan. Councillor Vicky Anfilogoff, Chair of the Neighbourhood Plan writes: "We held two workshops last summer, one in Langford and the other in Ulting to provide opportunities for all residents to come and give their views on, and discuss their vision for the future development of our communities over the next 15 years. Whilst neither meeting was inundated with attendees, those who did come seemed to find them interesting and had ample opportunity to talk about various topics and put forward their views during lively discussions. Additionally, we were at the Art Shows last year and this, again seeking residents' views and opinions and both of these engagements seemed to be quite successful.

You may remember that we sent out a residents' survey on which we had a 50+% return which was a wonderful response. Rachel Smith has completed an excellent piece of work on the results and translated them into a readable format which is to be put on the website so that everyone can see them. The plan at this stage is very much about gathering the views and aspirations of residents to provide an evidence base on which the Plan Policies will be formulated. To this end a survey of local landowners has been undertaken and is almost completed and a follow-up residents' survey has been distributed – it would be great if we had the same enthusiastic return rate! – also a business survey is in the pipeline. Additionally, Jenny Clemo has kept a spreadsheet showing steps achieved and processes covered and, inevitably, all that still needs to be done to achieve delivery of the plan.

Last month both Jenny and I attended 3-day Planning Camps delivered by the Eden Project and Locality, me to York and, subsequently, Jenny to Oxford. These were great opportunities (and free!). We both found them to be very full-on and intensive, packed with information delivered by the experts in their fields and attended by a large number of delegates from communities large and small representing just about every corner, nook and cranny of England.

Following on from this, through the auspices of the Parish Council, we applied for, and were awarded, a £7,000 grant by the Supporting Communities in Neighbourhood Planning Programme led by Locality in association with TRPI/Planning Aid England, CDF and partners. This has enabled us to go ahead and seek a Planning Consultant to keep us on the right track and, particularly, to help write the policies and we have engaged a very well qualified consultant based in Chelmsford who is really keen to be involved in producing our Plan. She is a great fit for us as she has local knowledge as well as terrific

experience plus she is a NP examiner to boot!

We are optimistic that by the end of the year or, certainly early 2015, the Plan will have gone out to independent examination, you will have voted on it and it will have been delivered.

Neighbourhood Plan Residents SURVEY – REMINDER

Please can you complete the survey that was delivered to you during May and return it in the SAE even if you've missed the 14th June deadline. So far only 19 out of 56 surveys sent to Ulting residents have been returned – Langford has returned 33 so far!

We want everyone in Langford and Ulting to have the opportunity to tell us what they feel is the right amount and type of development for our villages. Your responses to this survey will be analysed and this information will form the basis of our draft Neighbourhood Plan. Our last survey in 2012 resulted in an excellent return of 55%. New Trees Planted at the Village Hall



When trees in the grounds of the Village Hall had to be removed for safety reasons, it was decided to replace them. Can anyone shed any light on this?

£10m Rural Broadband Fund Opens

A £10m fund to help take superfast broadband to Britain's most remote communities has opened for business. Firms can now bid for funding to test innovative ways of connecting up communities in the countryside. The focus is shifting to bring better broadband to the hardest-to-reach premises in Britain, and follows an announcement of the funding package earlier this year. The Culture Secretary said: "The Government's rollout of superfast broadband is already reaching more than 10,000 homes every week but now we need to focus on the hardest to reach communities. These pilots will be instrumental in helping us understand how to overcome the challenges of reaching the most remote areas of the UK." The Government believes its ambitious broadband programme is already on track to deliver superfast speeds to 95% of the UK by 2017 – but we will see.

The £10 million fund will enable a range of pilot projects and suppliers can submit bids in three different categories:

- * Technology - seeing whether a technology that works can be used in remote areas
- * Operating models - trying novel operating models such as joining smaller networks together into a common larger network
- * Financial - testing innovative public/private funding models that could bring in new investment

The Rural Affairs Minister said: "The aim of this fund is to help people living in very remote areas secure the benefits of superfast broadband...Fast and reliable broadband coverage is crucial in building a stronger economy and fairer society for farmers and all rural businesses to be able to compete and grow." I'm sure we all agree with that!

Houses in Ulting Lane



When the new waterworks was built in Langford in 1927 it was clear that homes would be needed for the workers. Accommodation for the staff, in the form of four pairs of semi-detached houses, was built in Ulting Lane in 1928 in addition to four properties which had already been purchased by the Southend Waterworks Company. This early photograph shows Nos. 1-8 Ulting Lane before the low wall and footpath were built, and the road made up.

With the expansion of the works, the Ulting Lane residences were increased by a further eight properties in 1954 constructed by L.E. Claydon of Ulting. These new houses were built around a large green which was kept in pristine condition by the waterworks groundsmen (and jealously guarded against small children with bicycles, although they were not averse to giving rides in the trailer which carried the grass cuttings!). The grass is currently cut by a volunteer and the Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank him for his help with this.

In 1986 many of the houses were sold off to sitting tenants, and now very few of them actually house workers from the Waterworks, but for years this was a tight community who knew when everyone else was on watch, and made allowances for night workers.

Did you know...

Lost in The Great War

Stanley Charles Harvey (1895-1916)



Born in 1895, the son of Charles Ernest & Minnie Harvey, Stanley was baptised on 1st December that year in St. Giles' Church, Langford. He was the second of nine children (six boys and three girls), and grew up in The [Old] Post Office, Langford, which his family ran (although it was

mainly his mother who kept it going.) His father worked as a jobbing gardener both in Langford Grove and elsewhere in the village. According to the 1911 census, Stanley worked as a Clerk in the Maldon Iron Works Foundry in Fullbridge, Maldon. In May 1912 he became a Patrol Leader in the newly formed troop of Langford Boy Scouts where Mr. Barne (ex-member of Scott's 1904 Antarctic Expedition [see Vol. 1 issue 2]) was Scout Master, and he was often the standard bearer at Scout Rallies and services in St. Giles' Church, Langford.

Stanley enlisted at Chelmsford at the outbreak of war in 1914, joining as a private (No. 25650) in the Bedfordshire Regiment which later became the 1st Battalion, the Cambridgeshire Regiment when his service number changed to 6817. He was killed in action on the Somme on 13th November 1916 aged 21. His body was never found, and he was reputedly 'blown up' in a sortie. The Langford and Ulting Parish Magazine of December 1916 stated: '...Stanley....of whom everyone had a good word, was a dutiful son.' It also went on to praise his contribution as a 'regular and useful member of the church choir.' Stanley was known as a 'serious, studious boy' and his loss was keenly felt by his very close family.



He is remembered on the family grave kerb in Langford, at the Thiepval Memorial in France pictured above (Departement de la Somme, Picardie, face and pier 16B) and on the War memorial in St. Giles' Churchyard, Langford where, with all the other young men lost from this little village, his name is read out every Remembrance Sunday.

Neighbourhood Watch

For quite some time now an informal Neighbourhood Watch group for our two villages has been running. Regular information from the local police liaison officer is provided and then all relevant information is forwarded to people on the NHW list. More importantly, perhaps, information is gathered from residents in Langford and Ulting about any attempted break-ins or, perhaps, any suspicious activity they may see such as people hanging about or vehicles driving up and down, and this information is sent around immediately so that everyone is aware of any real threats in our communities.

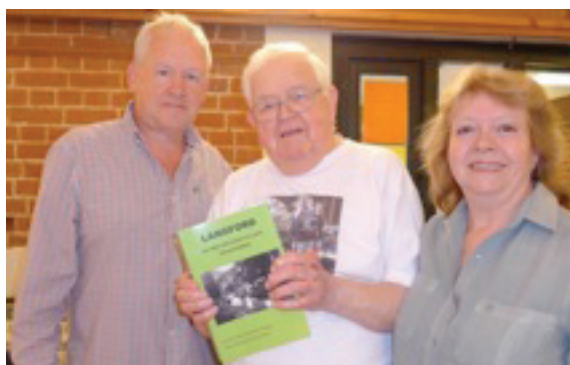

Chairman's Report 2014.



The highlight of the past year was the appeal by CML Microsystems Ltd. against the decision by Maldon District Council to refuse their application for a 149 property housing development on the Oval Park site. My thanks go to

fellow councillors in both parishes of Langford and Ulting, as well as our ward councillors at Maldon District Council, for the consolidated effort made to support the council at the appeal. I must also thank, on behalf of the council, all those residents who gave their time to attend the hearing during one of the hottest months of last year. Without doubt, the strength in public opinion shown by the numbers seated in the public gallery each day had a marked effect on the planning inspector's decision to dismiss the appeal.

Despite my announcement last year that the summer newsletter would be the last, I am pleased to report that CML have continued to provide sponsorship for the village newsletter and with a donation from Ernest Doe & Sons we will be able to publish two further editions of this worthwhile publication. My thanks go to both sponsors and our vice chairman, Councillor Irene Allen, for her sterling efforts in producing the newsletter three times a year. Our vision of the future, namely the neighbourhood plan, is progressing well under the guidance of Councillor Vicky Anfilogoff. Along with our clerk, Jenny Clemo, both have recently attended national planning workshops in York and Oxford.

The proposed boundary change, bringing a number of properties back into the parish from Heybridge has been stalled by Heybridge Parish Council. Following suggestions from Maldon District Council, we had hoped to come to an agreement with Heybridge cutting out some of the bureaucracy involved but it now seems we shall have to proceed with the resident's petition in order to initiate the process.

The situation with 'wild swimmers' using the Ulting churchyard as a recreational area has continued to cause problems for some time and with the summer fast approaching I see no reason why this year will be any different. Members of the Parochial

Church Council have made requests to the publishers of the wild swimming guide to have the site removed from their publications and website without success. However, with closer liaison now proposed between the PCC and the Parish Council over this matter it is hoped that a solution may be found and that the normal peace and tranquillity in the churchyard can be restored.

It is encouraging to see a few more residents attending meetings and taking an interest in what we do as a council. As mentioned in previous reports, our meetings are open to the public and we encourage everybody to attend.

Finally, thanks go to my fellow councillors for their support and hard work throughout the past year and especially to the Parish Clerk, without whom the council would not function.
