An Ulting Man is the new High Sheriff of Essex

We are delighted to learn that Bryan Burrough, from Ulting, is the new High Sheriff for Essex. Bryan, who moved to Essex over 20 years ago, will become the 838th person to take on this ancient title. The Office of High Sheriff is an independent, non-political Royal appointment for a single year. The origins of the Office date back to Saxon times, when the 'Shire Reeve' was responsible to the king for the maintenance of law and order within the shire or county, and for the collection and return of taxes due to the Crown. High Sheriffs receive no remuneration and no part of the expense of a High Sheriff's year falls on the public purse.

There is a High Sheriff in every county in England and Wales, and their history and tradition goes back before the Norman Conquest. The Office is the oldest Royal appointment, although the modern day High Sheriff has a very different role and function to that of his ancient predecessors, but still plays an important role in our 21st Century society.

The office was a powerful position in earlier times, and it was only in 1908 under king Edward VII that the Lord Lieutenant became more senior than the High Sheriff. Since then the position of High Sheriff has become more ceremonial, with many of its previous responsibilities transferred to High

Court judges, magistrates, coroners, local authorities and the police.

Bryan will be accompanied in his duties by his wife Philippa, an avid gardener who runs Ulting Wick, the beautiful garden featured in the Summer 2013 issue of this newsletter. Bryan said on being appointed: "It is a unique opportunity and is almost a full-time job. But I feel that the role is even more relevant in this day and age. Austerity has had a wide-reaching effect on the judicial system and many issues are now being dealt with by the voluntary sector. The High Sheriff can give these voluntary organisations recognition and encourage them to interact."

Bryan is particularly keen to give prominence to organisations working with young men in Essex to try to steer them away from destroying their future prospects and damaging others with destructive behaviour. "Young men like this can be on a slippery slope which leads to offending and time in custody. I believe there should be far more focus on why people turn to crime and how we can prevent them from doing so. There are many issues involved, including literacy and having positive male role models...The High Sheriff can play an important part in thanking the unthanked."

The Parish Council offers him our heartiest congratulations on this appointment, and wish him every success in his new role.

The Museum reopened on 31st January and had a visit from the Essex Town & Parish Clerks group on 2nd February. Educational visits began the following week with a special needs group and Chelmsford College making the first of two visits in February. We also entertained two other special needs groups and hosted a ramblers walking group before the freezing weather arrived at the end of the month.

The first week of March ended up being very quiet because of the snow, but things have picked up since. Mandeville Primary School, Thundersley Primary School and Howbridge Primary School visited us over three weeks, with a combined total of over 180 children coming to the museum. We are also in the process of organising four educational visits with a Home Educated group, covering our four main themes over four months. We are delighted at how the Museum's learning programme for Key Stages 1-2 has developed and become known around Essex.

Away from schools, March has included 26 members of the Saffron Walden U3A group visiting us for a tour and lunch and we started our 2018 main programme with Science Sunday which, despite the cold weather, turned out to be a good event. Exhibition wise we are now putting together our new Earth & Space exhibition in the Generator Hall.

For 2018-19 the Museum is taking part in 'Snapping the Stiletto', which is a two-year project by Essex County Council, exploring how Essex women's lives have changed since 1918. The project has received a grant from the Esmée Fairbairn Collections Fund to work with 11 local museums to explore their collections and discover hidden inspirational stories. The aim of the project is to replace the outdated 'Essex Girls' stereotype with untold stories of strong Essex women. Look out for information on our social media platforms and for temporary exhibitions in the Museum over the year ahead.

Did you know...John Betjeman



When Langford Grove was a private girls' school, John Betjeman, the English poet, writer and broadcaster, gave a lecture there. In an article for *The Spectator* on 7th January, 2007, Andrew Geddes recounted the relationship between his mother Margie and the poet when he noted: "He invited her to lunch at the Café

Royal as a thank-you for arranging a lecture with Mrs. Curtis at Langford Grove School. 'You saved me financially,' he told her, 'I was down and out.' Mrs. Curtis told her later that he had spent most of his time on the roof looking at the leads and endlessly going to the loo on account of his nerves."

However, in the *Collins Guide to English Parish Churches* that he wrote in 1958, John Betjemen made a note of St. Giles' Church, Langford and its unusual western apse. (He was knighted in 1969, clearly after his work on Langford!)

The Flood Walkway at Hoe Mill

Planning Applications

May we point out that the Parish Council (PC) is a statutory consultee with no powers to accept or reject planning applications. However...

The Process

Maldon District Council (MDC) informs the clerk, via email, of planning applications within the parish boundary. In turn the clerk notifies councillors, who can then review planning applications via MDC's planning portal. (MDC no longer issues hard copies of plans to the PC; they may be viewed online or hard copies are available to view at MDC's offices, Princes Road, Maldon, CM9 5DL).

Where possible, taking into consideration the specified time frame, the clerk will include planning applications on the agenda of PC meetings. The agenda will include the reference number, the location of the proposed works and a brief summary of the scope of the application.

The clerk posts agendas on the PC's website and village noticeboards three clear days prior to each PC meeting. Parishioners and applicants are welcome to attend meetings and to comment or give additional information on the application if they wish to do so. Councillors will consider the merits of the application and any representations made by the public before

and any representations made by the public before voting on a response to MDC. This may be to lodge no objections, or to recommend the application is modified or conditions are imposed or to record grounds for rejecting the application. On behalf of the PC, the clerk will submit comments to MDC following the meeting.

If a planning application is rejected and the applicant appeals, the PC is again consulted and the above process is reinstigated.

Making a comment on a planning application

Parishioners are encouraged to make comments directly to MDC. This is a fairly straightforward process:- it can be done by letter to Planning Services, Road, Maldon, CM9 5DL, Princes email (planning@maldon.gov.uk) online or via www.maldon.gov.uk Once you access the MDC website, click on Planning and Building Control, then click on "Search and comment on planning applications". Then select "planning application search facility". You can then enter the reference number if known, or the address. If you enter Langford or Ulting in the search bar you will see a list of the most recent applications. Click on the application you wish to view. To make a comment online you are required to register and sign in.

News from All Saints Church, Ulting

You may have noticed that it has been quite busy at All Saints over the past couple of months. In fact there have been not one, but two Bishops attending there within two weeks of each other. On Monday 16th April,



Bishop Roger of Colchester came to lead the service celebrating my licensing as Associate Priest for Hatfield Peverel with Ulting and Wickham Bishops with Little Braxted. As a result, the church was filled with parishioners from all four churches who raised the roof with some magnificent hymn singing. A marquee was set up where everyone could get together after the service and the Welfare Unit provided some excellent refreshments.

Speaking of the Welfare Unit, it received an official blessing from the Bishop Stephen of Chelmsford, on Sunday 29th April. For anyone not familiar with All Saints' new Welfare Unit, it is a portable cabin which contains a kitchen with toilet and washroom attached. It is brought down to the car park area on the first Sunday of the month and for special services so that the congregation can get together after the service for a chat with tea and coffee. Bishop Stephen then quoted a passage in the Bible (Deuteronomy 23: 12-13) which was relevant to a particular facility of the Unit which has been lacking in the rural surroundings of All Saints in the past. After the service he led the congregation outside to bless the Welfare Unit, commenting that it was the first time he had ever blessed a toilet facility! The bacon rolls provided from the Unit's kitchen were very well received, and the whole event was filmed by ITN Anglia and made the news bulletins on Monday.

All Saints proved a very popular attraction when it was open in conjunction with the Open Gardens Day at Ulting Wick on Sunday 22nd and Friday 27th April. The fantastic displays of tulips at The Wick brought out the visitors in their hundreds and most of them walked through to All Saints where a team was on hand to welcome them and explain the architecture and history of the church. During that week Rayleigh's University of the Third Age and a group of keen gardeners from Hutton also visited as part of their day at The Wick's impressive gardens.

All Saints is also now open on the second Sunday between 0900 and 1000 for prayer and provides a quiet place to reflect in peaceful surroundings. If you are attending a service and would like a particular hymn
