Speeding motorists beware!

Speeding has reached epidemic proportions in some areas of our country, and calls for a paradigm shift in the way we tackle it. That shift needs to include a change in the perception and management of community volunteers' involvement with road safety. For many understandable reasons, enforcement and broad-stroke campaigning have made little progress over the last decade, and focused, large-sale education is currently only organised efficiently in the shape of Speed Awareness Courses after an offence is detected. Modern preventative educational methodologies like Speedwatch have yet to be utilised to its fullest extent. Now is a good time to change that.

Research shows that on average 97% of speeding offences (not including Speedwatch observations) are detected by speed cameras. The vast majority of these are fixed at the roadside in areas known to both local residents and regular commuters, and therefore they have little effect in areas not covered by camera technology. Equally relevant - and

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especially in rural areas where fatalities are four times more likely to happen than in urban areas, the discussion about road safety has a tendency to focus on the number of casualties alone. In most areas where Speedwatch operates and where speeding is a concern to their communities, the quality-of-life issue as well as feeling safe when using the roads for recreational purposes, are equally important. This is not a diminishing of the high number of fatal and seriously injured victims, but a reminder that the problem of speeding goes well beyond quantifying its consequences with casualty statistics alone.

Speedwatch volunteers aim for personalised education as a methodology that is just as efficient in helping to bring the problem under control. Organising concerned, proactive community volunteers on a grand scale is vital to succeed with this goal. So come and join us the more volunteers we have the less we each have to do and, hopefully, the safer our villages will be. See back page for contact details.

Neighbourhood Watch



After a long time shouldering the particular community responsibility of the Neighbourhood Watch, Carly Truman has decided that despite trying to set this up in between work and the village hall bookings, she is finding she has insufficient time to fulfil

this role and is asking if anyone else would be prepared to take it on.

So what is Neighbourhood Watch? It's about people getting together with their neighbours to take action to reduce crime. They're community initiatives owned and run by their members which are supported by the police but not owned by them. Neighbourhood Watch members keep an eye out for unusual activities, strange people in the area, unexpected movement in the locality. Here, it is helpful to know if your neighbours are away at any time so you can monitor if something unusual or unexpected is happening. Ideally it would be great to have someone at either end of the two villages to cover most eventualities.

With regard to the Community Speedwatch initiative, a training session was held on Saturday 3rd September in the Village Hall to teach us how to use the equipment and report our findings. We need more volunteers to come forward to ease the burden and make it a more enjoyable task. High visibility jackets are provided and there will be groups of at least two people for safety and to ensure that vital information is captured of the vehicles who are speeding.

Sadly this does little for the speeding traffic at night, but there have been speed wires across the road in at least six parts of the Langford to Hatfield Peverel Road over the last few weeks, so hopefully we may yet get a speed camera which would be very good for us all. But in the meantime do sign up to be a volunteer for this as many hands are needed to make this an easier task to perform. Recycling at your local library

Here's a tip about disposing of your empty ink cartridges in an eco-friendly way. Take them to your local library.

Every library has a new Ink Bin recycling box to put your empty home-use ink cartridges in. Once they're collected, they'll be sorted, refilled and put back on the market as remanufactured ink cartridges. This will stop them ending up in landfill.

What else does your local library recycle? Most will take old batteries; some take small electrical items too. Save yourself a trip to the recycling centre!

If you're running short of recycling sacks or caddies for roadside collections, your local library may be the place to help. Food sacks, garden sacks and recycling boxes can all be found at some of our libraries. Coverage does vary, so check out the recycling facilities available at your local library. Don't forget that pink and green recycling bags can be obtained in St. Giles' Church, Langford, so do contact me (Irene) if you need anything.

The Closure of 'Heavenly Supplies' By Philip Magness, of Red Lodge, Langford

Christine and I moved, in 2013, for the first time after over 50 years in the same house, and it was with some trepidation after such a long time that we moved to a new abode my son had found in a new area.

After moving ourselves to Langford by various methods over two or three weeks we decided we didn't want to move again, not after all the form filling, changes of address, dealing with idiot mail, accounts etc. so set about making our home again. Our friends thought we were completely mad moving into such a house, and grounds, but we were always quite happy on our own, with a quiet place and were ready to start again, although we missed the wild life we had at our previous home. I mean the feathered type 'Animals'!

After a few days our friends were interested in what our plans were and were calling in at various times. We have a Bridle path near our house and if we were around a polite "hello" and a chat soon made things easier; the local Gentry and villagers made themselves known to us (very welcome), also walkers and horse riders stopped and had a chat and offered much help about the community and shopping. New arrivals often find it hard to join into a new community, Local pubs sometime do help. However at Langford I was told there was no local pub, but there was the famous St. Giles' Church, the Langford Water Works, the Mill House Hotel, and Langford Hall, all to be investigated. Somebody kindly delivered the local Langford and Ulting Newsletter to our house, and this magazine highlighted all the local Clubs, Societies, and voluntary bodies – a really superb introduction to new dwellers in the area, so we didn't need a pub!

When we had settled down at Langford each time we passed St. Giles' Church we saw the sign "Heavenly Supplies open". We thought this contained all the good things we should buy and do before we reach higher grounds! True! What a reception we had.

Parking the car in the car park we walked to the rear of the Church and entered. What a surprise. What no trolley, or £1 required? Just a cheerful greeting of "Hello" from the Vestry. That makes you spend more, as does all those tempting sweets; must be a lot of children in the village? But then the serious requirements, local produce, carrots, kale, potatoes, and many more healthy foods, soups, jams, and even birthday cards and all the daily requirements including matches, well presented, including all the local news, verbal and in paper form. The goods were added up, and money paid over, usually change was left for the education we received and local knowledge which had not been charged for as gratitude.

Regular visits were made, always a happy time well spent. We met many volunteer helpers and were grateful for their advice on village goings on, and events where we could join in the community.

The people who helped in the shop all had lovely characters, and were quite exceptional well suited for the job, and very kind. Thanks to every one of them. So for us 'Heavenly Supplies' was a happy meeting place. Sometimes a lovely man called Jock would be in charge of the store not only of the shop but entertainment as well – many times we thought we had arrived in Scotland by mistake! Bagpipes very often followed on by many unique stories of the sea and life and world travel. I often put these meetings down to further my education, you couldn't buy that anywhere. That smile Jock had after a tale!

Sometimes I would wander around the magnificent Church and see flowers, candles and candelabra, the brass lectern the stained glass windows, and many memorials, not forgetting the altar and so many other wonderful things to see. You can't take it all in by one visit – you need many visits. All very well kept by a dedicated few. The history of St. Giles is so interesting. I remember on Essex Radio the broadcast of Irene early on a Sunday morning, telling Essex listeners all about St. Giles' at Langford. After the broadcast many of my friends who heard it wanted to know more.

I haven't mentioned how 'Heavenly Supplies' started. But I understand that Irene, on a whim managed to get the finance for the shop, but had many



problems to overcome, like planners and diocese and many hours of work, but you cannot stop determined ladies, and what a great thing to offer the community so at its closure we wanted to give her a special gift, so from us all at Langford thanks Irene for all you do.

The shop actually started after an advertisement in the Essex Matters magazine in 2007 asked "What would you do for your community if you had £10,000?" As our little shop in the village had closed several years before, I thought it would be a good idea to see if we could put a shop in the Vestry. As Philip rightly noted, there were very many hoops and hurdles (and august bodies I had never heard of) that need to be gone through, jumped over, or consulted. But eventually got the go-ahead and it was officially opened in 2009 and ran, very successfully, for 10 years until the pandemic forced us to close. Since then, of course, as pointed out in the last issue, we have lost volunteer helpers, and most people now get their groceries delivered, so our little venture has outgrown its usefulness. However, it served its purpose and brought many lovely people into our church. We still open it on festival and event days and it is always available at 10.30 on a Sunday when the morning service finishes. Would I ever do it again? Probably not! But thank you so much for my beautiful urn – it is stunning and I love it]

The Wick Model Farm, Ulting



This picture, entitled 'The Wick Model Farm, Ulting' was painted by Arawhinoa Ella Constable, the Great-Granddaughter of John Constable RA.

Arawhinoa was born at Temuka in the District of Canterbury on the South Island of New Zealand on 30th April 1893, daughter of Hugh Golding Constable, who was an engineer, and his wife Elinor May née Bomford, and given the Maori name of Arawhinoa, which the family soon shortened to Winoa. Just to the east of Temuka is another town called Arowhenua, which may have something to do with Winoa's name.

In 1896 the family were living in the west of Ireland where her brother, John Hugh Constable, was born, and in 1911 the family were in Bushey in Hertfordshire, where Winoa was an art student. Sometime after that they moved into Hoe Mill House,

Maldon.

Winoa was a noted artist (as were both her parents). and all three were members of the Ipswich Art Club from



1932-1939 exhibiting from Hoe Mill House. Although Hugh never reached the heights of painting his grandfather had achieved, he was no mean artist, and he taught his wife to paint. He was a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, studied naval history, and travelled all over the world painting seascapes.

In 1932 Winoa exhibited an oil painting: 'The Copper Jug', two watercolours: 'White Poppies' and Farewell Salute...Crimea 1920' watercolour/black & white: 'Devonshire Cottage'; in 1933 two watercolours 'Sunset over Woodham Walter, Essex' and 'Little London, Essex'. In 1935 she exhibited 'Easter Flowers' and in 1937 an oil painting entitled 'Autumn Copper'. She never married and, when her parents died, (her mother in 1947 and her father in 1949, both at Hoe Mill House, she lived on quietly there, not too far distant from East Bergholt from where her famous great-grandfather John Constable came.

Winoa died at The Old Rectory, Kettleburgh, near Woodbridge, Suffolk on 2nd October 1966, aged 73. She left her estate to her younger brother, Lt. Col. John Hugh Constable (Retired) (1896-1974), late of the Royal Artillery.

There was also a special service in her memory which featured many of her favourite readings and hymns. A book of remembrance has been opened for her, and you are cordially to come and sign this on a Sunday morning after the service – you might even get a cup of tea!

News from All Saints Church, Ulting

The last Open Day of the year fell on the day after the death of Queen Elizabeth. The Open Gardens event at Ulting Wick went ahead and the church stayed open to visitors all afternoon, giving everyone the



opportunity for quiet reflection and prayer. During this time the church bell was rung in memory of the Queen. Her Majesty's life was remembered at a special service on 18th September, with some of her favourite hymns.

We welcomed Bishop Roger for the Service of Confirmation on 25th September, at which five members of the congregation were confirmed. During his sermon he spoke of occasions in the past when the Church might appear to be facing a crisis but how it had survived because of people just like those being confirmed on that day. He stayed to chat with many in the congregation afterwards when tea and coffee, cakes and hot sausage rolls were served in the marquee set up for the occasion. The marquee was also in use on the following Sunday for refreshments after the Harvest Thanksgiving. During the service, guest speaker Angus Doe spoke about the problems farmers face with recent droughts and crop diseases. East Anglia is known as 'The breadbasket of Britain', but is less known for its wine making, now a rapidly growing industry. The area along the River Crouch is ideal because of its clay soil and its situation with southfacing vineyards close to the river giving protection from frosts during the winter. The history of Essex wine goes back to at least 1120 and in fact the wine served during the signing of the Magna Carta came from Purleigh. Bringing the story up to date Angus said that Doe's had just sold the first grape picking machine in Britain to an Essex vineyard.

Ross and Gemma celebrated their wedding and all good wishes and blessings go with them from us all. Also in September, Lynette Abbott from the Mothers' Union in Witham, spoke to the congregation about its origins and how it developed into a world-wide organisation, embracing people of all faiths and cultures. They meet on the last Thursday of each month at St. Nicholas' Church Hall, Witham, at 2 p.m. All are welcome.

A Service of Remembrance will be held on 13th November at 10.30 a.m. Afterwards we will make our way to the War Memorial in the upper Churchyard where a two-minute silence will be observed. This will

replace the 9 a.m. service that morning.

Carols by Candlelight will be on Sunday 11th December at 4 p.m. There will be no 9 a.m. service that morning.
