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

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Barn Owls are being seen more frequently locally, mostly at night flying silently through the air or hovering searching for food. According to the RSPB there are currently four thousand breeding pairs in the UK and they are not on an endangered list.

Greenfinches are declining in numbers, mainly due to the fungus which grows in the bottom of bird feeders. You can help here,

please try to ensure that you clean your feeders thoroughly before you start to refill them for the winter.

I also took great delight in seeing a Kingfisher at the lagoon at Garnish Hall last weekend.



It has been a good year for fruit and berries, the apple, pear and plum tress in the village have all been laden with fruit. I have noted that the Sloe bushes in hedgerows that have been cut back by mechanical hedge cutters appear to produce more fruit that those in hedges that have been left uncut. I suppose like our cultivated varieties of fruit they benefit from a good pruning. If you look closely at the Hazel Nut trees you can see the catkins forming ready for the spring.

The Butterflies have all but disappeared for the winter, although you may have seen a few on warmer autumn days especially the odd Red Admiral possibly feeding on ripe apples. The warm and wet weather has also produced a larger number of Mushrooms again this year, if you do go on a ramble and are tempted to pick Mushrooms for consumption please ensure you know what variety they are before eating them as some can be poisonous.

That brings me to the end of my report and with the end of another year fast approaching let me wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.

Both species are reddish brown in colour and have white bellies, although in colder climates Stoats will turn white in winter, although the tips of their tails remain black.

started and you will need to take extra care on the roads as the herds are on the move. The Bucks make a roaring sound to attract the females and the young will be born in June or July.







Foxes and Badgers are continuing to thrive although rabbit numbers still seem to be in decline. Bird migration is well under way, the Wheatears, Swifts and Swallows have returned to their winter feeding grounds with fewer birds being seen this summer. The Winter visitors have arrived although I am yet to see any Fieldfares or Redwings. I have been lucky enough to see one Woodcock. The Wood Pigeons seem to have reduced in numbers this year which will please the local farmers.



Buzzards and Red Kites are increasing locally and garden birds are well up in numbers. We have had up to thirty five House Sparrows in the garden, together with Blue Tits, Great Tits, Hedge Sparrows, Collared Doves and Robins on our feeders. Jack-



daws are making full use of disused chimney pots in the village. Watching them carrying sticks to the roof tops I wonder if they have planning permission!

Autumn in Leaden Roding

We've had some unusually good weather this Autumn with high temperatures well into October, although as I write this report we note that some areas of the country have seen extremely high rain fall and the resulting floods have caused widespread devastation. Locally the trees have held on to their leaves well into November. The harvest seems a distant memory and most of the fields have been drilled with new crops and are already turning green with new growth.

I walk passed a Walnut tree most mornings and note that it seems to be raided earlier every year by Rooks and Squirrels. The Grey squirrel has only been resident to the UK since the 1870's. They are native to the Eastern half of North America and were brought to the UK as a fashionable addition to large estates. It has been a good year for other hedgerow species with plenty of Sloes ready to be collected for the making of Sloe Gin, together with many hedges full of Haws and Rose Hips which are a particular favourite food of mice.




(There is a walnut tree on Cloghams Green planted 25yrs ago and in August/September you can stand underneath it and get hit by nut shells dropped by the squirrels)

There are six species of Mice in the UK. Five are native to the UK and the sixth, the Edible Dormouse was introduced to Hertfordshire by an escapee in 1902. The species of Mouse you are most likely to see is the

HOUSE MOUSE

House Mouse, being uniformly brown-grey with a mostly hairless tail, small feet, large eyes and ears and pointed nose. The Field or Wood Mouse has large back feet and its tail is roughly the same length as its head and body. The Harvest Mouse stores berries and seeds in the autumn to feed itself through the winter. The Harvest Mouse is the cute one you see on calendars with a prehensile tail clinging around stalks of wheat. They weigh as little as

6 grams and have a blunt nose. The Yellow Necked Mouse is easily confused with the more Common Wood Mouse but can be identified by the collar of yellowish fur. This species is mainly found in Southern England, the Midlands and South Wales.



vulnerable to extinction. They have golden brown fur with large black eyes and are the only UK species of small mammals that have a furry tail. They are a nocturnal

species and in summer spend most of their time in the branches of trees. They sometimes use old birds nest but also make their own nests usually in brambles or other shrubs. When the weather is wet or cold they go into a hibernation type state called torpor to save energy.



Other small mammals which are rarely seen are Stoats and Weasels. although I did have a Stoat streak across the Chelmsford road in front of my car recently. (Here's a chart which might help)

Our Central region is in drought Above average rain will be needed Affinity Water this autumn and winter for water resource situation to improve

We welcomed the rain in late September in our Central region, which was above the long-term average at 137%.

However, following nearly three years of below average rainfall our Central region is in drought. Groundwater levels are still well below average and a few good weeks of rain is not enough to make

This means we may need to introduce temporary water restrictions (also known as hosepipe bans) in spring 2020 if we do not get above average rainfall this autumn and winter.

We have now entered the recharge season, which is when rain is more likely to filter down into the aguifer (porous rock where groundwater is stored). This period usually runs from October to March. However, soils were drier than average in September and any rain that falls will first need to saturate the soil before filtering down to the aquifer, potentially delaying recharge of groundwater.

In September, we launched an extensive campaign through direct customer emails, social media and traditional media to ensure customers are fully aware of the situation. This resulted in over 4,000 orders for water saving devices in just 24 hours and we would like to thank customers for their support in saving water.

We will continue to update customers as the situation progresses and in November, we will engage with customers to get their views to ensure they are fully prepared if restrictions need to be introduced in spring 2020.

Was that a Bus? How to find out about transport options in our area

There's no doubt that living in this part of the UK has many advantages. We are surrounded by beautiful countryside and picturesque villages, have London within easy reach, Cambridge on our doorstep, and all number of stately homes and interesting places to visit.

However, life being what it is, rural living comes with its own set of issues. One of which is transport. Cuts to local services mean buses are few and far between. So for most of us a car is essential - whether to get to the station for the daily commute, to medical appointments or the nearest town. But what happens when driving is no longer an option?

Fortunately, there are alternatives, though tracking them down can be time-consuming and frustrating. And what's available largely depends on where you live.

For the over 60's who find public transport too difficult, Uttlesford Community Travel can be a godsend as can the Social Car Schemes which some villages offer to ferry residents to medical appointments. While for those who have been assessed as in medical need there's the non emergency transport service for hospital appointments.

For a comprehensive over-view of all local transport options Uttlesford Frontline offers a free fact sheet "Getting Places" - via www. uttlesfordfrontline.org.uk.

This includes: Social car schemes; bus travel - with access to route planning and timetables; DaRT (on demand) services - villages covered and booking details plus how to check whether a particular bus is accessible for anyone with mobility problems; rail travel and how to gain assistance by Greater Anglia, as well as at Stansted Airport. Details about concessionary bus passes, the Blue Badge Scheme and help available to pay travel costs for medical appointments are included together with full contact details, links and telephone numbers.

P. Sutterby reported that Footpath 11, Sewerage Works to Longsted Lane is overgrown and has been reported, (Ref 2633269) this should be rectified within 56 days of being reported.

Fencing of Chalks Green:

Since the last meeting Cllr Barker received an email from Essex County Council stating that they have not received a response from Mr Collins to the original letter sent and they have sent a further letter as per the request from Cllr Barker. They advised they do not usually get involved in these matters as it is not their duty to act. They stated that under Legislation anyone has the power to take action against illegal works on commons (this includes members of the public and/or Parish / District/Borough Councils). Cllr Barker passed this information to the clerk between meetings and Parish Councillors were made aware. At the meeting Cllr Barker suggested she report the fencing to the Legal Officer at Uttlesford District Council as she was concerned that if the green is fenced off indefinitely the owner of the soil could claim ownership of the land. She stated that the original suggestion by the Parish Council of removing the wire and cutting the fences by half is still fencing off the green, M.Whitehead was in agreement.

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Minutes of Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 29th October 2019

Minutes of the last meeting of 3rd September 2019 were agreed and duly signed.

Public questions/concerns addressed to the Parish Council

A resident stated that she had sent photos of weeds growing from the gullies on Stortford Road stopping rainwater from draining to Cllr Barker who confirmed she had reported this to Highways.

A resident stated that part of a tree was falling towards the road at Leaden Hill. P. Sutterby will inspect the severity and decide whether he can remove the tree part himself or report to Highways.

A resident once again stated that vegetation is encroaching the footpath on Dunmow Road towards Kears Green, this has been reported several times to Highways who state that the problem is not severe enough to rectify at this time. Cllr Barker will report this again.

Cllr Barker's report

Cllr Barker reported that 3 Uttlsford Councillors elected to represent the Residents for Uttlesford Party have defected to the Green Party.

At this time a number of planning applications for new development are being refused by Uttlesford, there is concern that when being passed after appeal the housing is not passed to the same standard as the original application.

A report from inspectors should be received in the next few weeks regarding the Local Plan. There is concern that Uttlesford are querying sections of the 106 Agreement regarding planning for Stansted Airport which has already been agreed.

A Youth Strategy Group has been set up to support young people in Uttlesford.

Village organisations can now apply for Micro Grants with an easy application to complete. Cllr Barker will send information to the clerk to pass to village organisations who could benefit. Cllr Barker has used £600 of her Councillor Allowance for a grant for Roding School towards refurbishing the playground.

Clerk's report.

- A1060 speed limit the extension to the existing speed is to be formally advertised towards the end of the financial year so that funding can be agreed for the installation to start in the early part of 2019/2020 financial year still ongoing.
- Puddle outside King William House this does not appear to have been repaired since being reported under the Highways Repair Scheme, Cllr Barker will enquire as to why.
- Drainage problems on Stortford Road see above.

Microchipping and Dog Tags - Are you aware?

You are probably aware that UK Law states that all dogs must be microchipped however, are you aware that the law also states that all dogs must have a tag. The tag must include your surname, full address and telephone number. The number of animal wardens is reducing and this additional information means that if somebody finds your dog they will know where to return it straight away.

Please also remember that if you have a change of address to make sure that you update the microchip details immediately and also make sure that you purchase a new tag.

How to claim bereavement benefits

You might be able to claim some money if someone has died.

What you can claim depends on your circumstances and what your relationship was to the person who died

Get help to pay for their funeral

If you get benefits, you might be able to get help to pay for the funeral of a partner, close relative, close friend or child you were responsible for. You can check if you can get a Funeral Expenses Payment on GOV.UK.

<u>Claiming Bereavement Support Payment</u> If your husband, wife or civil partner has died, you might be able to claim Bereavement Support Payment.

Check if you're eligible

You can only claim Bereavement Support Payment if your husband, wife or civil partner died on or after 6 April 2017. You can't claim if you or your partner weren't married or in a civil partnership. You need to have been under your State Pension age when your partner died - check your State Pension age on GOV.UK if you're not sure. It doesn't matter what your income is, if you have any savings or if you're working.

Your husband, wife or civil partner must have either:

- paid National Insurance contributions for at least 25 weeks in one tax year
- died because of an accident at work, or a disease caused by their work

When you apply, the DWP will check to see if your partner paid enough National Insurance contributions.

How much you can get

If you don't have children, you can get a lump sum payment of £2,500 and monthly payments of £100 for up to 18 months. If you have children or you're pregnant, you can get a lump sum payment of £3,500 and monthly payments of £350 for up to 18 months. You won't have to pay tax on any of the payments, including the lump sum. Your monthly payments won't affect your other benefits. If you still have some of the lump sum left after a year, it could affect the amount of other benefits you can get.

You won't be paid your Bereavement Support Payment if you're given a prison sentence. If you're on remand, your Bereavement Support Payment will stop but you'll get any missed payments if you're released.

When to apply

You should try and fill in the form within 3 months of your husband, wife or civil partner's death to get the full amount of money. After 3 months, the DWP will count your application as late. You'll lose one monthly payment for every month your application is late. To get the lump sum, your application must reach the DWP within 12 months of your husband, wife or civil partner's death. If your application arrives after 12 months, you won't get the lump sum.

How to apply

You can apply for Bereavement Support Payment by filling in a form or calling the Bereavement Service helpline. You can download a <u>Bereavement Support Payment claim form</u> on GOV.UK or order one by calling <u>your local Jobcentre Plus</u>. The form comes with notes to help you. If you need more help <u>contact your nearest Citizens Advice</u>. Read through the form before you send it to make sure you've answered everything properly. Make a copy of the form if you can - you might need to refer to it later. If you send it by post, ask the Post Office for proof of postage - you might need to prove when you applied.

When you've filled it in you should take it to your local Jobcentre Plus or send it to:

Bereavement Support Payment You can also apply over the phone by calling the Bereavement Service helpline. Make a note of the date and time you call and write down the name of the person you speak to. You might need these details later in your application

Cllr Barker reminded the Parish Council that the entire fence should not be permitted and could, at their request, ask Essex County Council to request it be removed. Residents present at the meeting stated the fence should be removed. After discussion where P.Sutterby and A Ringrose at first stated they would prefer to stay with the decision made at the last meeting, it was agreed that the clerk make a written request to Cllr Barker for her to request that Essex County Council ask Mr Collins to remove the entire fencing.

Any other business:

- 1. P. Sutterby requested that Cllr Barker pass his thanks to Uttlesford for the very speedy removal of rubbish after a recent fly tipping incident in the village.
- 2. The clerk will report to Highways that the school traffic sign is in need of repair.
- 3. The Chairman suggested consideration for a defibulator to be installed in the village, suggesting the fire station might be the preferred location. P. Sutterby will make enquiries from the Essex Fire Brigade to see if this is an option and the clerk will look into costings.
- 4. P.Sutterby stated that he is organising another litter pick on Saturday $14^{\rm th}$ Setember.
- 5. Various other documents were circulated for Councillors' attention outside the meeting.




A resident asked for an update on the fencing of Chalks Green – see below for report.


Cllr Barker's report

The Uttlesford Local Plan is progressing with some modifications being made. There is concern regarding costs of planning appeals being made and concern that if development is refused the amount of homes required to be built will be too low.

There has been a recent change in the criteria in Blue Badge applications, residents who did not meet the old criteria may now qualify for a Blue Badge.

Clerk's report.





- Drainage problems on Stortford Road the gullies have been jetted recently; it appears there is some improvement but will be continued to be monitored after further rainfall.
- The clerk reported that the yellow lines between Long Hide and the School have not been painted all the way to the school leaving a gap where parents are still parking on the pavement. Highways stated that the yellow lines installed is the planned length there can be no extension.
- VAS sign on Dunmow Road as Highways state the pavement is too narrow to install a VAS sign, the clerk requested that Cllr Barker look into when the improvements to the speed limit signage will be installed. Request for vegetation on Dunmow Road to be cut see above.

The tips for a crime free Christmas shop start before you leave your house, after all you don't want to come home to find the house broken into.

- 1. Garden tools securely locked away in the shed Burglars will be happy to use your tools to break into your house
- 2. Create the illusion your home is occupied Radio and lights on a timer in rooms you would normally occupy, there is even a device called "Fake TV" that flashes a series of lights when it gets dark that looks like the TV is on. There are now door bells that you can view and answer from your Smartphone.
- 3. Lock up properly not just your windows and doors in the house, but also any gates and outbuildings.
- 4. Choose a "Park Mark" car park where you can http://www.parkmark.co.uk/. By choosing a Park Mark® Safer Parking facility you are visiting a car park that has been vetted by the Police and has measures in place in order to create a safer environment for both you and your vehicle.
- 5. Leave nothing in sight within your car, remove the "Sat Nav" cradle and clean the mark on the wind-screen.
- 6. When you lock your car with the remote look for the light flash confirmation or better still try the door handle before leaving the car.
- 7. Now you're starting your shop watch your purse, wallet, mobile phone and handbag especially in busy places, don't leave them on display in bags or on counters while you pay, and while you're paying watch that no one is watching you entering your PIN when making purchases or withdrawing cash.
- 8. Time to stop for lunch or a cuppa, don't drop your guard. Mobile phone on the table, shopping by the chair, wallet or purse visible, coat, jacket or handbag over the chair; if a thief sees it a thief will steal it.
- 9. Need to off load some of those purchases in the car, look around are you being watched? Back to (5 & 6) above again.
- 10. Time go home, don't fall for any distractions while you load the car i.e. "you dropped some money" pointing to cash on the ground, holding a map "can you tell me the way to....". While you are engaged the second person steals from your car on the other side. Close and lock your car before speaking to anyone.
