

# Spring in Leaden Roding

This is the year that has become known as the "year with no Spring", we go from hot sunny days wearing T shirts in the garden to snow and thermals within 24 hours. I start writing this article for Leaden Reading on a May day colder than last Christmas day where we have had 2 inches of rain in the last 24 hours. We can only wait and see what these extremes of weather are doing to the local wildlife.

On one of the first sunny days we had I saw a Brimstone Butterfly in Holloway Close. These are usually the first of the butterflies to emerge as they hibernate in the butterfly state. The next Butterfly to be seen was the Small Tortoiseshell which survives the Winter by laying dormant in old houses and farm buildings. I caught sight of three Orange Tips as I walked around Cloghams Cricket pitch, these probably hibernated in the thatch on the pavilion.

The Winter visiting Fieldfares and Redwings are gradually being replaced by the incoming Wheatears, ChiffChaff, Swallows and Martins. My daughter's nesting Swallows returned at the beginning of May and she hopes they successfully breed a few broods this year. I hope that this is the year when I hear the Cuckoo again, the RSBP still show this species as wide spread over the UK but believes there are only 15,000 breeding pairs migrating here every year. The Rooks still seem to be increasing in numbers and the local birds have been nesting for some time now. I remember an old farm worker saying "you will always get snow on a Rooks back' and this is especially true this year although this species seems to thrive whatever the conditions. Most of our native birds have survived the Winter due to an abundance of Hips, Haws and Berries.

We are still waiting to see the first Swift, which is the last summer visitor to arrive and the first to leave as it needs warm weather to provide a constant supply of flying insects. These birds only spend about 3 months in the UK before starting their long migration back to Africa. You will never see a Swift perching on wires like Swallows as they have tiny feet and legs and can hardly walk. They even sleep on the wing and only settle when they breed their young in holes, often inside old buildings. One local bird which is thriving is the Buzzard as there is plenty of woodland around for these birds to build their nests. We even have the rarer Red Kite nesting in our local woods. We have a pair of Moorhens nesting again on the pond leading down to Leaden Cricket Club and ducks are pairing up and nesting in brooks and on river banks. My daughter had the pleasure of watching a Barn Owl hunting across Meadows for a good twenty minutes whilst walking her dog late one evening.

We have taken part in the RSPB birdwatch earlier this year and in one hour of watching we noticed the following visiting our garden. 2 Wrens, 3 House Sparrows, 1 Chaffinch, 2 Blackbirds, 1 Robin, 1 Blue Tit, 2 Collared Doves, 3 Pigeons, 1 Jackdaw, 1 Gold Crest, 1 Magpie, 4 Starlings and 1 Great Tit. We were very impressed with the number of species that visit our garden on a regular basis. I am still waiting to see a Waxwing this year and also hopeful of spotting a Nightingale which is also declining in numbers although one used to nest regularly in Lords Wood. I am saddened by the continuing decline of the Green Finch. This is partially due to a particular parasite that thrives at the bottom of bird feeders. These parasites transfer to the Green Finches and the birds then unfortunately die. Can I please ask that you all give your birds feeders a thorough clean regularly.

The bizarre weather this year has had a big impact on the flowers with all varieties flowering later than usual although this has had a beneficial effect of the Primroses which seem to be blooming in abundance, especially in Leaden Woods and along Longsters Lane. White and Blue violets can also be found along Longsters Lane. You can also see Marsh Marigold and even some fruit trees which were originally in the garden of the old pub called the Cock House, situated in Longsters Lane which was demolished in 1935. The Daffodil and Bluebells seem to have had a very short flowering season and I have seen more than usual Cow Slips or Peggles along the roadsides.

Badgers still seem to be thriving, with an ever increasing number being killed on the roads. the American Mink, which have descended from the animals released either by accident or deliberately from Mink farms are also increasing in number locally. I see less foxes but breeding pairs will already have their first cubs of the season. Hares still seem unable to increase in numbers but this is probably why the local Buzzard population is thriving, although my daughter did see a pair locally earlier this year. The local rabbits seem to be holding their own numbers wise even though they are fighting two debilitating diseases. As I finish this article I'm sitting in my back garden bathed in glorious sunshine. I still haven't heard the Cuckoo, but if anyone is lucky enough to hear one could you kindly let me know.

So ends another ramble through Leaden Roding and hopefully the end of the cold weather.

# **Leaden Roding Fire Station** The Second World War and After

As the Second World War approached, the 1668 fire brigades that existed in 1939 were quickly consolidated in the face of war and by 1942 the whole country came under the protection of the National Fire Service. How Leaden Roding and the surrounding area were served during the war is unclear but until 1944 village was still in possession of its manual fire engine. This would not have been taken into the National Fire Service as it was far too outdated.

Soon after the war it was announced that the National Fire Service was to be disbanded and the task of organising a fire brigade was returned to local government at county or county borough level. On April 1st, 1948, Essex Fire Brigade came into being and by 1952, a decision had been taken to place a station at Leaden Roding.

Training of the crew started on 3rd August 1952 and for the next 6 months the 7 members of the crew trained once a week and received instruction in all areas of firefighting from full time firefighters based at Loughton and Harlow. From March 1953 this was stepped up to twice a week.



A plot of land was found, and a station constructed. The original station building stood closer to the road than the current one, on the edge of the plot adjacent to what would many years later become Leaden Close. Like a lot of wartime and post-war stations, it was very much a temporary structure having previously been used as an ambulance station in Great Dunmow. The crew would be summoned by the sounding of a siren, seen just to the left of the station in the picture below, during the day and by the activation of bells installed in their homes for calls overnight.

As the opening of the station neared, a final drill was undertaken. Firemen Easter, Mead and Rolph faced a simulated fire at Leaden Bridge in front of two senior officers - Divisional Officer Jones and Station Officer Fernie - on 27th May 1953. It must have been judged more than satisfactory as Station 68 Leaden Roding was put into commission at 08:39 the next day with no fanfare, just an entry made into the Watch Room logbook that recorded in minute detail the life of a 1950's Fire station. The fact that these early logs still survive has provided much of the information for these articles. The following Wednesday saw the Chief Officer Mr Barton and his deputy Mr Tobias visit the crew but they had to wait almost a month until 12:45 on 21st June for their first call which was to a fire in the front room of The Mount, Sawbridgeworth Road, Hatfield Heath.



The first appliance was an auxiliary towing vehicle, a Land Rover (registration PPU 178) and trailer pump DG584. Almost all pumps in service in the early 1950's were ex wartime

issue. Replacements were extremely hard to come by and were allocated by central government based on a combination of need and wartime service, with Essex Fire Brigade sending its share to the bigger towns first. The trailer pump was replaced by a more recognisable Fire engine as early as late 1954 and as we shall see Leaden Roding did fairly well when it came to getting an upgraded station.

Like a lot of fire stations just after the war, especially the more rural retained ones, the station at Leaden Roding was little more than a large shed and wasn't really fit for purpose. With money tight, the replacement of these stations was a long slow process which Essex Fire Brigade did not fully complete until the 1980's but Leaden Roding was lucky. Its station wasn't by any means the worst of the bunch, but it was one of the first to be replaced by a purpose built building, the present fire station.

The presentation of the crew at the opening of the new station

At 3:10pm on Saturday 27th October 1962, the current station was officially opened in the presence of a host of senior officers including Chief Officer Ellis, Divisional Officers Cashman and Garnham.

37-year-old MP who only entered the House of Commons seven months ago has been put in charge of selecting Conservative candidates for the 2022 general election as Theresa May seeks to broaden the appeal of the party.

Kemi Badenoch, who was brought up in Nigeria and introduced Mrs May's leader's speech at the party conference in October, becomes vice chairman for candidates.

The Tory party is expecting to start selecting candidates to fight next election in the next few months, putting Ms Badenoch in an influential position over the next generation of Conservative MPs.

Ms Badenoch, who entered Parliament at last June's election, is one of nine new vice chairmen appointed by Mrs May in the reshuffle taking the total number of party vice-chairmen to 13 MPs.

# **ARE YOU PAYING TOO MUCH FOR** YOUR UTILITIES

Economy 7 tariffs give cheaper rates at night (usually midnight - 7am) and more expensive ones during the day. If you have storage heaters this can save you money. However, if you use nearly all your electricity in the daytime, you could be overpaying on your electricity bill.

If you're on Economy 7 and decide it's not for you, check if your supplier will switch you to a normal meter for free. If your current supplier charges for new meters, see if you can switch to another provider that will transfer you over without charge, try British Gas, SSE, Scottish Power, Npower, EDF or Eon. You will probably find you will be placed on a standard tariff, so as soon as you move to a new meter, do a comparison online and then move to the cheapest deal (be aware that if you've got storage heaters and move to a electricity-only tariff, using them on a normal rate can be expensive )

If you decide to stick with Economy 7, make sure you are making the best use of the cheap night rate:

Always check exactly when your off-peak period begins and ends. Be careful when the clocks change!Make sure your meter's clock is working correctly

Maximise your night time usage. For example, install timers on washing machines, set tumble dryers to come on just before you wake, (fire brigades advise against setting tumble dryers to come on while you're asleep) and charge gadgets at night

Sewerage Charges. While the water meter billing system is mostly straightforward, it's assumed "what goes in, must come out" and that any water used creates roughly an equivalent amount in sewerage. The general assumption is that 90-95% goes back. But this can be wrong in a few specific circumstances.

Do you have a soakaway? This is a large underground pit that collects water from the roof or drive. If you're unsure you can check your property deeds or see your local authority to check the planning application.

Water companies should give rebates to those whose surface rainwater goes into a soakaway or straight into a river or canal, rather than mains sewers. This is usually between £20-£50/year and can be claimed whether you're on a meter or not. To apply for a rebate call or go online to request a form.

Do you have a cesspit or septic tank? If you're in an area with no connection to mains sewerage, so have a cesspit or septic tank, you don't have to pay sewerage charges. This only applies to a few people, but you should query any charges paid for sewerage services if your property isn't connected to the main sewerage system.

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### Our Disability Benefits Home Visit Team needs YOU!



### We are looking for volunteers to join our Disability Benefits Home Visit team. This specialised service operates across the district offering continuity of care, confidentiality and reassurance for those living with long-term conditions. Volunteers help with the often complex applications for Attendance Allowance, Disability Living Allowance (DLA) and Personal Independent Payment (PIP). They also provide advice on financial issues or care needs such as purchasing aids and appliances, getting a blue badge, or lowering fuel bills.

For people living with disabilities getting access to advice can be difficult and many people in Uttlesford do not claim the benefits to which they may be entitled. As a client put it, 'I felt extremely intimidated by the DLA form, but by having my adviser to fill in the form, it allowed me to answer the very challenging and personal questions honestly and with less distress.' A disability benefit award allows people to pay for services that aid independence and substantially improve their quality of life.

A home visit can take up to three hours; volunteers must also have access to a car. Full training is given and travel expenses are paid. One volunteer said, 'Being a volunteer in the disability benefits team feels like a privilege. I can use many of the skills developed during my working life, and really help people to express the problems they are facing. And the positive feedback evident in the success rate of my clients is an added bonus. The role is also flexible and can be easily adapted to fit in with my life.'






# **Green Bin Collections**

# 1<sup>st</sup> Moreton & Fyfield Scout Group Scouts - 10 to 14 years - Friday 7.30pm to 9.30pm

After the weekend at Thriftwood Pedal Kart Olympics the Scout Troop turned to survival techniques as it was time for the annual brass monkey camp. Unfortunately, the Troop could not attend the District camp at the beginning of February as the Leaders were either away or working. So instead they went to Danbury Edward the V11 site in the woods on 24<sup>th</sup>/25<sup>th</sup> February. ### 1st Moreton & Fyfield Scout Group Leaders Adventure

To raise money for the Scout Group minibus & funds for the World Jamboree Explorers & Scouts picked to go to the USA & Australia in 2019, scout leader Rolf Bassnett & Assistant explorer leader Denise Haves & her friend Kay completed the Yorkshire 3 Peaks Challenge, 3 peaks to be completed in 12 hours along a cross country rocky 25 mile route. They achieved this on the hottest day of the year. Rolf was the driver & Denise the navigator to get to Yorkshire after 11pm on Friday night, up at 3-30am Saturday morning drove a further 16 miles to the start & somehow found a parking space in Horton in Ribblesdale for this popular northern event. Started walking up Pen - y - Ghent at 6-10am to the peak at 694m, arrived at the top at after a steep climb feeling good in the fresh early morning air with a feeling that we could easily do this challenge. After a further 10 miles in the heat of the day of 24 to 25 degrees arrived tired at a tea wagon for a break before ascending Wernside by a 4.5 mile circuitous route, much of the route was in the heat without a breath of wind & not a tree in site for any shade. Much of the chit chat between ourselves & other hikers evaporated on this climb as it dawned on us & many around us that the challenge had only really just begun. Rolf was running out of water & feeling dizzy with a few stop on the way up; but we made it to the top of Wernside 736m, made the summit & did not sit down as our legs felt beyond being tired & we were worried if we sat down we might not get up. The worst part of the hike we now faced our tired leg muscles the rocky & winding decent with a constant sharp impact on knee joints thighs & calves, Rolf went down with cramps in both legs a mountain ranger helped him & stretch the legs, Denise & Kay donated the last of the water to Rolf; the ranger informed us if we could make the next 2 miles where Rolf could re-hydrate, but the ranger said your day of hiking is over for you, after much suffering we made the 2 miles & bought as much sports drink & water to re-hydrate & had a 20 minute rest. Checked the map & revaluated our situation, filled water bottles & collectively decided that if Rolf could walk the valley below the last peak Ingleborough it was worth a try, if not he could walk back to the cafe & wait there for a vehicle rescue, while Denise & Kay would go on. Ingelborough 4.5 mile ascent has a near vertical short section of rocks & stone steps cut into the ridge & this was a challenge to scramble up, when on the ridge the last hike to the top was easier but when everyone is tired we saw a number of people trip & fall on the rocky path; you had to concentrate on each & every step you took. Last summit Ingelborough 724m with a fantastic view of the sea at Morecombe bay in Cumbria like a strip of silver in the afternoon sun was a fantastic relief to see.

We were elated enjoying taking photos posing around the stone trig point at the top. The decent was a hard grind on joints & tired muscles & we had to check our euphoria of achieving the 3 summits against the sheer practical requirements of finding the best route through a boulder strewn limestone pavement area with sections of bog land but we made it without a fall. Found the car & were pleased to see we were not the last one parked along the road from the morning, drove slowly back to the hotel & went in dressed as we were, covered in dust with the taste of salt on our lips to the restaurant & order 3 pints of lager shandy & had dinner without commenting what it tasted like, we just needed fuel. We were informed when we ordered our dinners it would be about 45 minutes; they appeared in under 10 minutes; we thought that perhaps the staff wanted to get these 3 dishevelled hikers fed & gone as we were attracting attention. We were pleased to hear others recounting their experience of the day & were pleased to note that some had only completed 2 peaks; were were certainly one of the more mature teams. Well we made it as a team & worked together as a team with each member working for the other 2 & encouraging each other & that is what scouting is about.



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## Ofsted, Retirement and the Ancient Greeks.

All schools dread the phone call to notify them that they are going to be inspected and after waiting in anticipation for over two years, that phone call finally came on the 29th January. However, rather than approaching the Ofsted Inspection with dread we took the opportunity to celebrate and show off all the amazing work that has been going on in school over the last couple of years.

Thankfully, that hard work and commitment from the staff, children, governors and parents was recognised by the inspector and the report really reflects what a great position the school is in.

My favorite phrase from the day followed the inspector going out on to the school gate to canvas the views of parents first thing in the morning. After spending nearly 30 minutes at the school gate (he had planned to be about 10 minutes) he came back in, took his coat off, sighed and said 'That was outrageously positive'. And that phrase really summed up the day.

There were many other positives too. It was identified that there is a real 'Team Rodings' spirit in the school with everyone working together closely to provide the best possible education. The report mentions the 'skilful leadership' in managing change and moving the school forward. There have been significant improvements in Early Years provision, which was great feedback, as early Years was an area for development from the previous inspection. Children's engagement in their learning and behaviour was deemed to be excellent with the children reporting that they felt safe and happy in school.

So what do we need to work on in the future?

The inspectors have asked us to concentrate on the broader curriculum, so making sure that all subjects that we teach are at the same standard as Maths and English. Consequently, looking at how we assess subjects such as art and geography.
