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especially the Jackdaws that seem to have a nest in every chimney pot) and we reported back from the surrounding area. Ken was interested to hear about the swallows feeding on the wing, the unusual flora & the odd large mushroom we found whilst dog walking. Butterflies were always popular with Ken - indeed I have developed a habit of photographing any I see for later identification! It was probably no surprise that we found a number of field maps amongst Ken's personal items where he had carefully recorded all the local field names and also marked old ditch lines that had proven useful for historians researching the area in recent years.

To finish it seems appropriate to write one last report in the style of dad.

It has been a very wet Winter, possibly one of the wettest in living memory with more local flooding across fields and roads than I can remember. We have had a few sharp frosts and foggy days, although the spring flowers have started to emerge and even the odd Bumble Bee ventured out on the warm weekend we had in mid February. The first Primroses were seen on 23rd Jan in School Lane Abbess Roding, along with lots of Snowdrops. Daffodils mark the arrival of Spring on most verges and in gardens.

The Rooks have started repairing their nests ready for this years broods and the garden birds have started to investigate the nesting boxes and hedges. The Jackdaws of Holloway Close are even extending their nesting sites along the Stortford Road. I spotted 7 Long Tailed Tits on the garden feeder on a frosty morning in January, although these and Blue Tits currently seem more concerned with fighting for territory with their own reflections in windows and car wing-mirrors! Sparrows seem to be increasing in numbers locally if the squabbling in my garden is anything to go by. There also appears to be an increase in the number of Blackbirds in the gardens, which is nice to see. Please keep your bird feeders topped up as the cold and frost is never far away it seems.

The Local birds of Prey appear to be doing very well and rarely a day goes by without you seeing a Kestrel, Buzzard or Red Kite patrolling the skies. Recently, Sandra was delighted by the sight of a Barn Owl in flight early one morning at Leaden Hall. Fieldfares and Waxwings are making the most of a plentiful food supply and make a terrific noise in the hedges around Leaden Hall. Egrets have been spotted on the flooded meadows behind Bridge Houses and a flock of over 30 Swans were seen on the fields by Wapers Mill. Rabbits are eating the flowers off in Leaden Church yard and a Hare was spotted running across the



road by The Axe and Compasses, it won't be long before they start their 'boxing' matches in preparation for mating.





Winter in Leaden Roding



It is with much sadness that we have said goodbye to Ken Pavitt who sadly passed away in January after a short illness. Ken has been submitting his seasonal nature reports to this publication since the Spring of 2011(?) and I know that manyreaders looked forward to his articles.

Ken was a Leaden Roding man through and through, he was born at no.2 Bridge Houses in July 1936 and was the youngest of three child a brother Ed and sister Freda. Ken had a very rural upbringing and spent his youth in country pursuits, collecting birds eggs, rabbiting, fishing and no doubt getting into all sorts of mischief! His formal schooling was at Margaret Roding School and then he moved on to Ongar Secondary school. Ken often told us of his childhood memory of laying in his bed one morning during the war watching the planes fly over through a hole in the roof caused by a German 'Doodlebug' bomb that had exploded in the meadow behind the houses during the night!

Ken was very proud of being the fourth generation of his family to work at Leaden Hall Farm and apart from a short time working in the building trade and a period of National Service (Royal Horse Artillery) he spent his entire working life tending the fields and hedges of Leaden and Garnish Hall farms. He married Sylvia in 1964 at Leaden Church and soon after moved next door into no.1 Bridge House, where they lived until moving to Holloway Close in 2016. Ken & Sylvia had three children, son Roger & daughters Teresa and Sandra, all of whom live locally.

Ken's passion for the nature of this area remained strong throughout his life and he passed his knowledge to his children. Ken's other love in life was sport, he regularly played for Cloghams Cricket Club & when his playing days were over he umpired instead. Ken spent many a pleasant after-

noon at the cricket ground chatting to his friends at the club. When it came to football his allegiance was to White Roding, where he had something of a reputation for being a hard defender. Once he was unable to play he took on the linesman's role for his team and travelled all over Essex. Ken also enjoyed horse racing and in later life he was the proud owner of shares in a couple of racehorses and the occasional Greyhound.

Sunday mornings were often spent rabbiting and Ken was also Game Keeper for the Garnish Hall Shoot for many years. His breeding and feeding of the pheasants ensured that all the local woodland birds had a plentiful supply of wheat to get them through the harshest of Winters. Ken's knowledge of nature and especially the local wildlife was extensive and he took great pleasure in writing his articles for Leaden Reading where he could combine his interests in local farming, history, the weather and local wildlife whilst imparting some of his knowledge onto others.

This last year was difficult for Ken as he was shielding due to the Covid pandemic - Sandra & I took on the role of gathering as much information as we could whilst out and about in the local villages to help with his reports. Ken kept a close eye on the wildlife around Holloway Close

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The Village Hall remains closed for all activities. But wait!

The District Council has asked to use the hall in early May for local elections.

Dear Friends.

Saint John's account of the first Easter Sunday includes the meeting of Mary Magdalene with the resurrected Jesus in this way:

"When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵ Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you



have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶ Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher)." John 20: 14-16

It is an incredible moment and it is not surprising that she did not recognise Jesus straight away, and yet he is soon familiar and yet wonderfully different. The future would never be the same, and the power of death over life had been broken. His victory changes everything.

In a year when our Church buildings have been closed and the world has been locked down, it seems appropriate for our Churches to start to open again on Easter Sunday. A minor resurrection perhaps and although things will be different, still no singing and social distancing still in place, there will be something of the familiar and, I hope, a new sense of awe and expectation of what God might be doing.

MP welcomes new government cash boost for Chelmsford and Uttlesford's High Streets

Improvements can be made to local high streets across Chelmsford and Uttlesford to help them safely and successfully open after lockdown thanks to Government funding.

A total of £56 million will be invested through the new Welcome Back Fund to help councils across England boost tourism, improve green spaces and provide more outdoor seating areas, markets and food stall pop-ups – giving people more, safer options to reunite with friends and relatives this Summer.

Conservative MP for the Saffron Walden constituency Kemi Badenoch said she was delighted Chelmsford City Council is getting £159,001 and Uttlesford District Council £80,809. Mrs Badenoch looks forward to seeing how the money will be spent to help attract people back to the high streets post-lockdown.

Councils can use the funding to hold street markets and festivals, boost the look and feel of their high streets, with more seating areas and street planting, and install new signage to help keep people safe as restrictions are lifted.

This is part of a package announced by the Government to attract people back to high streets safely this Summer, including:

- Making it easier for hospitality businesses to operate as takeaways and host markets and stalls
- Enabling businesses like pubs and restaurants to use their land more flexibly, for example by setting up a marquee or
 creating new outside space, for the whole summer, so they can serve more customers and recover from the effects of
 the pandemic.
- Extending pavement licenses for another 12 months, so venues can continue serving customers 'al fresco' for longer without red tape.
- Tackling Cowboy private parking firms whose rogue practices can keep visitors away from town. The Government has supported high street businesses throughout the pandemic with targeted tax cuts, business rates relief and grants as part of an economic package worth £407 billion this year and next; enabled eateries and pubs to keep serving customers as takeaways during lockdown, and is making it easier for disused buildings in town centres to be repurposed to end the scourge of ugly buildings that drive away footfall.

Commenting, Mrs Badenoch said:

"I know how difficult it has been for businesses on our high streets over the last year, and I have and remain determined to secure them all the help they need to recover.

"That is why I am pleased that Chelmsford will receive over £159,000 and Uttlesford over £80,000 as part of the Government's new Welcome Back Fund, which will help our high streets to reopen safely and successfully this Summer as restrictions lift. This funding builds on the funding Chelmsford City Council and Uttlesford District Council received last June and the work the Chelmsford Saffron Walden BID teams have done.

"It will ensure that highstreets in Chelmsford, Dunmow and Saffron Walden have the support they need as we move into recovery, and build back better from the pandemic and I look forward to returning to our local shops, cafes, pubs and restaurants."

Redundancy: Key things to know

Redundancy is a fair reason to dismiss

Furlough has not changed normal employment law; your employer can still make you redundant even if you are furloughed



If you are made redundant there are statutory minimum notice periods, depending on how long you have worked for your employer If you are pregnant you have extra protections

Your employer may make you redundant because the business has closed down; the area of the business where you work closes down or because there is a reduced need for employees to do a particular type of work.

The legal rules surrounding redundancy are complex but, in general terms, the following should take place:

Before redundancy you should have been consulted.

You should be given notice.

All holidays you are owed should be paid.

The company should have considered whether there was an alternative to redundancy. Is there another job in the firm you could do?

The process of choosing who is going to be made redundant should be fair. If the company decided to choose you on a discriminatory basis, then your redundancy is unfair, giving you grounds to complain.

If more than 20 staff are to be made redundant, the law says there should be a period of collective consultation between the employer and 'appropriate' employee representatives (usually a union).

Voluntary redundancy?

You should think carefully about how voluntary redundancy will affect any money you are entitled to. Ask your employer about the redundancy package. Sometimes employers offer incentives for taking voluntary redundancy, such as extra redundancy pay or not having to work your notice period.

Claiming benefits

You might be able to claim benefits such as Universal Credit after taking voluntary redundancy. Turn to Us is a useful website to check your benefit entitlement www.turn2us.org.uk or contact Uttlesford Citizens Advice on 01799 618840 or email bureau@uttlesfordcab.cabnet.org.uk

Planning for after redundancy

If you've worked for your employer for 2 years at the end of your notice period, you're entitled to reasonable time off to apply for jobs or training, paid at your normal hourly rate, but only for up to 40% of a week's work.

Contact your local Job Centre Plus and ask for their Rapid Response Service - You can use the service during your notice period and for up to 13 weeks after you have been made redundant.

We had a lot of help from Information Assurance officers in the NHS, EPUT and Essex County Council to ensure the system is as secure as we can make it. We only ever collect information from you to make a good referral, we only hold your data for a maximum of 90 days, and we use the same level as encryption as on-line banking services. Who runs Frontline?

Frontline was designed by Uttlesford Citizens Advice, but it is really a large community project where organisations and services sign up to improve people's knowledge and access to local services. Frontline in west Essex is funded by Essex County Council and the NHS's West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group. Uttlesford's Council for Voluntary Services is helping to run the services.

I want to give some feedback on a local service - how would I do this?

Great! Good and bad feedback is really important to understand and improve local services. It can also be used to help funding arguments and identify gaps in services. 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Residents urged to register for postal votes ahead of May elections



On Thursday 6 May 2021, residents in Essex will go to the polls to have their say on who represents them, with elections for all 75 seats on Essex County Council taking place.

These elections are an opportunity to have a say on who represents residents on issues that directly affect day-to-day life in the county.

Ahead of the elections, Essex County Council is asking residents to 'Vote safe' by registering for postal voting in light of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Even though there are a number of ways to vote, including in a polling station, the safest way to vote as the situation stands, is by staying at home and voting by post.

Registering for a postal vote is quick and easy and can be done here: <u>Apply for a postal vote - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>.

If you haven't done so already, you will also need to register to vote here: https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote

Joanna Boaler, Head of Democracy at Essex County Council, said: "The Government is working hard to ensure that however you choose to cast your vote in May, you can do so safely.

"If you're thinking about voting by post, you can apply now. This will make sure your application is processed early and your postal vote can be sent to you more quickly.

"Remember that you need to be registered to be able to vote - don't miss your opportunity to have your say."

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Bank Account.

The clerk informed Parish Councillors that signatories on the bank account with Santander need to be updated. It was agreed that all signatories on the account apart from the Chairman, Dave Clayden, need to be removed and present Parish Councillors need to added. The clerk also needs to be able to access account information over the telephone, although at present statements are posted to the clerk's address, she does not appear to have the power to discuss transactions over the telephone when required. The clerk will also look into setting up online bank transfers. and carried unanimously.

Any other business:

- 1. D.Wareham stated that the recent installation of Broadband cables throughout the village had caused most pavements to be dug up. The repaving does not appear to be of the best standard, D. Wareham expressed concern that the pavements might disintegrate over the next few months due to bad weather. The clerk will contact Gigaclear and discuss this.
- 2. D.Wareham asked if the Parish Council is involved in assisting residents who might need help during the COVID-19 pandemic. The clerk explained there is a COVID-19 Help Group on WhatsApp which, although not set up by the Parish Council, both herself and Mrs Bush are members. This group was quite active in assisting residents with shopping and prescriptions during the first lockdown and is running again during this present lockdown although it appears not so much assistance is required. The Parish Council have also made donations to Rodings Sewing Group when they were making scrubs for the NHS and Rodings School who found it difficult to fund raise over the past year
- 3. P. Sutterby asked if the location of the defibrillator at the fire station needs to be advertised in the village. The clerk stated that if a defibrillator is needed the Ambulance service will tell the caller exactly where it is located and the code number necessary to open the case so in effect advertising the location is unnecessary, however she will put a notice on the village notice board and on the notice board at the village hall informing residents that there is a defibrillator in the village and it's location. She will not advertise the case code in case of vandalism.
- 4. The clerk received information from Cllr Barker which she received from a resident of Holloway Crescent flats stating that for the 7th year running Uttlesford Council has not refilled their oil tanks sufficiently and they had been without heating and hot water for several days. Mrs Bush also sent an email to Cllr Barker regarding the same issue as she was also experiencing the same problem. It appears this has happened because although the tank is refilled fortnightly, this is not covered over the Christmas period. It is the first time it has been brought to the clerk's notice. Cllr Barker reported the problem to officers at Uttlesford and it has now been resolved, residents are seeking compensation at this time.
- 5. The clerk received a telephone call from an owner of a piece of land adjacent to Chalks Farm regarding access which is thought to be through a field on High Easter Road. The clerk asked the owner of the field to contact him. He also wished to gather details regarding the ownership of Chalks Green, the clerk gave him details of the legal team at Uttlesford for this information.
- 6. Between meetings the clerk circulated a table of Highways defects reported during the last year. Parish Councillors noted that it showed that, as in most villages, although there were lots of problems outstanding, Leaden Roding was among the villages with the highest number of defects reported.
- 7. Various other documents were circulated for Councillors' attention by email outside the meeting. Date of the next meeting Tuesday 9 th March 2021 using the Zoom platform.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 9.20pm

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After discussion at the last Parish Council meeting a resident has drawn up a letter he intends to circulate to all residents requesting volunteers to join together to create a Speed Watch Team, the clerk will publish the letter on the village website and in the next edition of the Leaden Reading. As yet, it does not appear to have been circulated to residents.

- At the last Parish Council meeting Cllr Barker suggested the clerk should write to Highways asking for assistance in combating speeding throughout the village. The clerk did this and received a reply stating that when they previously looked at the site in the vicinity of Rodings School it was with a view to installing a VAS although at the time, no suitable location on Highways land could be identified so instead they improved the conspicuity of the existing signage to reinforce the message regarding speeding. Highways stated they were happy to revisit although they suspect the outcome will be the same being that they are limited on options. The clerk reported that she has emailed back requesting that they revisit again to see if any options can be found
- The clerk reported the Highways sign outside Walnut Tree Cottage with wires showing is in need of repair and could be dangerous this has not yet been repaired.
- Between meetings the Parish Council decided to donate £25 as a prize for the village Christmas lights competition (see public questions/concerns above).

Finance:

The clerk was given authority to pay: - £48.00 to PKF Littlejohn - Audit admin fee £25.00 to Mrs. T.E.Bell - donation to Christmas lights compete tion

Planning Applications:

The following application was circulated between meetings: West Point, Dunmow Road, Aythorpe Roding – Proposed erection of 1 dwelling, creation of new vehicular access (existing access will change to pedestrians) and associated landscaping works. The clerk contacted Uttlesford to ascertain whether this application was for Leaden Roding and received a reply stating as it is on the border of Aythorpe and Leaden Roding they were requesting comments from both Parish Councils if there were any concerns – Parish Councillors had no objections.

Between meetings the clerk received an email from the Enforcement Officer at Uttlesford stating an alleged breach of planning control has been made at Burniere, High Easter Road – failure to discharge condition 2 Biodiversity Enhancement Strategy. After investigation a decision was made to close the case as no breach had taken place. The Parish Council were unaware of this allegation.

Footpaths:


P. Sutterby reported that at this time footpaths in the village are very muddy as more people appear to be using them.

The clerk circulated income and expenditure details and bank account details before the meeting for Parish Councillors' reference. A lengthy debate followed on the budget for 2021/22 and the level of precept to set. Cllrs considered projects for 2021/22 and decided to include the cutting back of hedges on Dunmow Road approaching the school. The Chairman proposed that the Precept for 2021/22 to remain at £6,500.00, this was seconded by J. Mclintock

Minutes of Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 12th January 2021

Present: D.Clayden, P.Sutterby, J.Mclintock, M.Whitehead, Mrs Bush, D.Wareham and 2 members of the public.

After interviews between meetings Leaden Roding Parish Councillors co-opted Dave Wareham as Parish Councillor. An Acceptance of Office form will be completed by Cllr Wareham and given to the clerk shortly. Uttlesford District Council will be notified of this co-option once the form has been received

Minutes of the last meeting of 1st December 2020 were agreed. As this was a virtual meeting the minutes will be signed by the Chairman at a later date

Public questions/concerns addressed to the Parish Council

A resident thanked the Parish Council for the donation of £25 as a prize for the Christmas lights competition held in the village for the first time.

Another donation of £25 was made by the Village Hall Social Club, Mrs Bush and the clerk also donated bottles of wine. Keely Robinson organised the competition which was judged by P. Sutterby and M. Whitehead; she felt that it was appreciated by residents especially during this lockdown period and was happy to organise the same next year advertising it earlier in the year.

Parish Councillors unanimously agreed to make a donation next year.

Clerk's report.

A1060 speed limit – the clerk has not yet been informed of any update regarding a Cabinet Member's approval after an objection was made during consultation of the proposed extension to the 30mph limit.

- •Drainage problems on Stortford Road it appears that flooding opposite King William House during heavy rain is not quite so bad but flooding and water on the road has worsened on Stortford Road between the village hall and the church. Drains in the village appear to be being cleaned at this time so flooding will be monitored during heavy rain again to see if this has alleviated the problem.
- 30 mph sign beside village hall not yet repaired the clerk will request an update.
- •Fallen Highways sign approaching the roundabout on Chelmsford Road not repaired, the clerk will request an update.
- •Small village sign at Leaden Hill rusting and in need of repair not yet repaired.
- •Building waste left beside Windmill Café reported to Uttlesford but not yet removed. P Sutterby reported that there is also an old wheely bin at the site which needs removing too, the clerk will request this again along with another wheely bin left on the green in Holloway Crescent.
- After advice from Cllr Barker the clerk has emailed Uttlesford stating that the Parish Council do not wish to enter into costly legal actions to remove fencing at Chalks Green but will leave it to Uttlesford as guardians of the Green to act as necessary to find a solution to the issues raised with Leaden Roding Parish Council supporting Uttlesford in their efforts for request the fencing is removed if it is not legal to remain. She has not yet received acknowledgement of the email

Action Fraud and ABTA, The Travel Association, are reminding the public to think twice before handing over their money and personal information when booking holidays this year.

What is holiday fraud?


Holiday fraud can vary from fake accommodation listings that don't actually exist, to "too good to be true" offers with flights being particularly targeted. Criminals can approach you over the phone, via text, email and social media, offering incredibly cheap deals to tempt you into booking a holiday with them. In reality, the holiday you've booked, or parts of it, doesn't exist at all.

Before you buy:

- Do your research—make sure you've read plenty of reviews and have checked that the company is an ABTA member
- Pay Safe—use a credit card where possible and avoid paying into bank accounts
- If it's too good to be true, it usually is!







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Microchipping and Dog Tags - Are you aware?

You are probably aware that UK Law states that all dogs must be microchipped however, are you aware that the law also states that all dogs must have a tag. The tag must include your surname, full address and telephone number. The number of animal wardens is reducing and this additional information means that if somebody finds your dog they will know where to return it straight away.

Please also remember that if you have a change of address to make sure that you update the microchip details immediately and also make sure that you purchase a new tag.
