Dear Lewes Swift Supporters,

Welcome to the June edition of the newsletter from Lewes Swift Supporters!

This year the weather has been very changeable during Swift season – with a range of hot, cold, wet, and windy evenings for surveying. Thank you to all the surveyors and Swift Watchers for sending in their valuable reports.

# Nest activity so far in 2024

At the time of writing, our surveys and reports from Swift Watchers have confirmed that Swifts have returned to **68 nest spaces** in Lewes.

The current range of the Swift nests across Lewes is as follows:

- Upper Western Road 5 nests
- St. Anne's Church 9 nests
- Valence Road − 2 nests
- St. Swithun's Terrace, (rear of High Street) 7 nests
- The Maltings 7 nests
- De Montfort Road 3 nests, (two in boxes)
- Market Lane one nest
- Westfield House, Western Road one nest
- Grange Road one nest
- Abinger Place one nest

- St. Martin's Lane 5 nests
- Station Street 7 nests
- Bridgewick Close 2 nests
- Southover High Street 4 nests, (2 in a double box)
- Potter's Lane one nest
- The Avenue 4 nests
- Flea Market 5 nests
- King Henry's Road 2 nests
- High Street one nest

## More Swift boxes and House Martin cups in Lewes!

On Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> June, we met up with Dave Boddington, Swift Champion of Sussex Ornithological Society to install eight more Swift nest boxes in Valence Road, West Street, Spences Lane, Queen's Road, and Stoneham Close. It was a beautiful day and we enjoyed watching the Swifts swooping and screaming low above us – a sign that we were installing the boxes in good places!

Thank you to Dave Boddington for his excellent help – and for his kind donation of the three boxes with bat backs which we installed in Valence Road.

On Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> June, we installed six artificial House Martin cups and three Swift boxes in Garden Street, Dorset Road. Southover Road and Southover High Street. We funded the House Martin cups in Garden Street and Dorset Road because, until recently, House Martins have built their own nests here and we wish to encourage them to return!









While we were installing the House Martin cups, see photographs above, we had the pleasure of watching House Martins flying above us and flying in and out of one of the established artificial nest cups in Garden Street. There were lots of Swifts flying over Southover Grange too!



#### **Nest Box successes!**

During one of our transect surveys on 5<sup>th</sup> June, we took a detour down St. John's Terrace to follow a group of seven Swifts and three House Martins flying over the terraces. We were delighted to see two of the House Martins enter a natural nest cup there. The resident reported that there had also been a lot of interest in the artificial House Martin cups which we installed in the street in December 2023. Sure enough, on 17<sup>th</sup> June, we were thrilled to hear from a resident in St. John's Terrace that House Martins were now going in and out of one of her artificial nest cups! We are funding nest cup installations in some of the streets where we have a record of House Martins nesting recently, so this news is very encouraging!

On 26<sup>th</sup> May, a resident of De Montfort Road contacted us to let us know that they had seen and heard Swifts in the nest box which we had installed for them in April 2021. This was part of our project which aimed to expand the colonies in the Swift hotspots of De Montfort Road and Western Road. The very next day our surveyors were able to see the Swifts entering the box for themselves.

Nearby in De Montfort Road is a Woodcrete box, installed by the previous resident eighteen years ago and used by the Swifts every year since then. On 6th June we were lucky enough to capture this shot, below, of one of the Swifts leaving the nest box.

If you live in Lewes and are thinking of installing a Swift nest box or an artificial House Martin cup, this is how we might support you – if your building proves to be suitable and there is access for a long ladder.

- Funding a Swift box and the installation when someone lives next to an existing Swift colony.
- If you do not live next to an existing colony, we still offer support and advice on installing a Swift nest box. We visit the homeowner to find out if the building and location are suitable and help to decide on the best place for a box. At current prices, this would cost you £48 for a single box and £25 for the installation. See: https://www.peakboxes.co.uk/shop
- A free House Martin cup and installation for anyone who lives in a suitable location in an existing colony so that we might encourage expansion of the existing colony.


If the weather is not suitable, we will send out a message by 6.00 p.m. on the day.

# Our Surveys in 2024

This year we are using several survey methods so that we might find out more about "our" Swifts and their behaviour and nesting sites.

Our tried and tested survey method involves several different surveyors who regularly monitor one of six areas of Lewes by following the Swifts and seeing where they go and what they do. We have several new surveyors this year, and if you would like to join in you would be very welcome.

We have also been trying out a transect method which was shared with us by RSPB. Once a week for eight weeks we are recording Swifts seen along The Avenue and the High Street, along the routes shown by the red markers on the map below.

We are also experimenting with two hour surveys at three of our colonies: St. Anne's Church, The Maltings and the Flea Market. We chose the perfect evening for our first two hour survey at St. Anne's Church!

We hope that a combination of the information from these surveys will help us to protect known nest sites, expand colonies with more Swift accommodation, and compare results year by year to reveal more about changes in our Swift population.
