
CABINET MEMBER FOR HIGHWAYS INFRASTRUCTURE AND SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT

ROAD SURFACING? WE'VE GOT IT COVERED



Although some road surfacing is completed all year round, it is very weather dependent. Therefore, our major resurfacing programme begins with the new financial year and warmer weather from April.

Now that the nights are truly longer and darker and we've all forgotten what sunshine feels like, our resurfacing programme is all but over. So, we thought we'd give you a roundup of all the resurfacing work we have completed between April and October.

We've attended 130 sites and resurfaced 884,259 square metres of road, which is the same as...

SURFACING TECHNIQUES

- 1. **Surface dressing** is used where the surface is in reasonably good condition, but needs sealing to stop water ingress which can last up to ten years. We can cover a large area very quickly at relatively low cost. We use surface dressing on most of our surfacing programme.
- 2. **Micro surfacing** is a slightly more durable and more expensive process which places a thin layer of a completely new surface on the road. It takes longer to cover a given area than surface dressing but is used where roads are busier, and the road needs more levelling off.
- 3. **Machine resurfacing** is where the existing surface is removed, and completely new depth of surface is laid as a replacement. It is a more expensive and slow process but is a great treatment to use in places where the road is badly worn and is required to take heavy traffic.
- 4. **Insitu-recycling** is only used in limited areas where the road is very badly out of shape. A very durable new surface can be laid, and logistics make it easier to reuse existing materials rather than bring in new stone. It is marginally more expensive treatment per area covered than resurfacing or other treatments.









£121m FUNDING FOR ROAD REPAIRS ANNOUNCED

Essex is to receive £121 million of funding for road repairs and resurfacing between now and 2034, the Government has confirmed. The funding is a reallocation of monies to Local Authorities from the HS2 scheme, helping ensure that our road network will receive repairs while maintaining the condition of roads across the county. ECC already receives funding from the Department for Transport (DfT) each year, including the additional funding the Chancellor announced in March in the Budget for pothole repairs, which is available this financial year and next. The new funding announced will ensure there is financial support for road repairs until 2034. It allows Essex Highways to deliver repairs and resurfacing for priority routes and defects, as per the current strategy to target the most unsafe issues. This follows the additional investment ECC allocated to highways in this year's budget of £17.4 million, currently being spent providing additional works across the county that might not have otherwise taken place.

Councillor Tom Cunningham, Essex County Council Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Sustainable Transport, said: "The Government has recognised that well maintained and repaired roads are a priority for Essex residents. ECC made an important commitment to delivering more road maintenance works this year, allocating additional financial support for highways, and I'm pleased to see that extra repairs are being delivered up and down the county thanks to that support. The Government funding will help us continue with the repairs Essex Highways works hard to deliver."

Essex's allocation includes:

- £30.6 million existing annual allocation 2023/24 (highways maintenance block funding, Pothole Fund)
- £7.6 million of additional funding over the next two years
- £121 million of funding between 2023 and 2034

WALKING AND CYCLING IMPROVEMENTS FOR KEY CHELMSFORD ROUTES

Work to improve a key walking and cycling route in Chelmsford city centre will start next month.

Improvements are being made to Bunny Walks. This connects Broomfield and Springfield to the city centre. New surfacing and tactile paving will be laid, improving safety for walkers and cyclists.

Works on the first section between Victoria Road and the first bridge crossing will start on the Monday 4 December. These will be completed before Christmas. The section to Hillview Road will begin in January and take around six weeks. Works on the bridges will be undertaken in February and March, depending on weather and water levels.

Diversion routes for pedestrians and cyclists will be via Victoria Road, Bunny Walks, Brook Street, New Street and vice versa.
