3000 primary school children attended the show to learn about food, farming and rural issues.

TEAM TRAINING

RET continue to innovate and stay ahead of criminals.

Identifying stolen recovered stolen property can be challenging, especially with construction and agricultural machinery.



The team welcomed Data Tag to HQ for some training around the CESAR property marking system.

Unique to the vehicle, the CESAR system uses a hard to remove sticker and codes to help police identify the legitimate owner of stolen items.



ENCAMPMENTS

The team have been out across Essex managing any reports of unauthorised encampments.

Traditionally, summer is travelling season for the Gypsy, Romany, Traveller community. RET manage all reports of unauthorised encampments to ensure the law, which can be complex, is applied correctly and consistently and the rights of both the travelling community and local residents are safeguarded.



So far this year we have had 33 encampments. We have used our police powers to require encampments to move 5 times.

RET work with encampments and local communities to minimise disruption.

RIFLE SEIZED

RET responded to reports of males armed with a rifle shooting at wildlife in Colne Point nature reserve.

Officers searched the area and found the males, along with an air rifle and ammunition.

Fortunately, enquiries showed no birds were harmed so the rifle will be destroyed by Police.

Possession of a loaded air rifle in a public place is an offence. You must always have permission to shoot on the land you are using.

RET provided support to the D Day 80 celebrations this month.

Officers attended the Colchester City war memorial to provide additional security to the large military parade.

RET often help local Community Policing Teams with events and operations, providing staff and specialist skills.



KEEPING YOU SAFE

The team have been keeping people safe in many ways during June.

We deployed our new TruCam speed camera to the A130 where we caught several speeders, including one driving at 103 mph. His penalty ticket is in the post and he will be facing a driving ban at court.



In Colchester, a three year old child was reported missing in Highwoods Country Park.

RET were on scene within three minutes from the call being taken and found the child safe and well. They were swiftly reunited with carers.
