DNA DETERRENT

The team are always looking at new ways to deter and catch criminals. Using the latest technology such as the drone gives us the edge.

Tackling high value theft of agricultural machinery and plant is a team priority. Identifying items of recovered plant and its owner is always challenging.

We have teamed up with Selecta DNA to find a solution to this issue.



Selecta DNA produce a paint on solution that contains a unique code. It is waterproof, sticks to machinery and is very hard to remove. Police can easily find the solution, obtain the code and check the database for the true owner at the roadside.

The kit can also be used to prevent theft. Each kit contains window stickers and signs to warn thieves that the item is marked.

The team used £5000 seized from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act to buy 200 kits. Each kit can mark up to 50 items.

We are now working to identify repeat victims of theft as well as those likely to be targeted in the future and get kits to them.

RET were quick to swing into action after an archaeological dig in Uttlesford was disturbed by anti-social behaviour.

Serving United States Airforce personnel have been excavating a crashed WW2 American bomber in a field, searching for human remains from the crew who were sadly killed in the crash.

Some items had been stolen from the dig, tents knocked over and a vehicle driven in the field. RET attended the site several times and spoke to the land owner to prevent repeat issues.

The group learnt about the various roles and departments within Essex Police.



RET were invited to talk about our role tackling rural crime.

HARE COURSING

Sadly, with harvest in progress the hare coursing season has started again.

We have responded to a number of calls across the county.

The team are out every day patrolling our rural areas and disrupting coursers. We use intelligence and reports to target our patrols.

In Roxwell, Chelsmford, RET seized a car used for coursing which was abandoned in a farmers field.



If you see hare coursing in progress, call 999. Local officers with support from RET will attend if suspects are still on scene.
