## ST MARGARET'S CHURCH

For many centuries, the bells have been rung at the church, calling people to worship. There is a unique set of four pre-Reformation bells, varying in diameter from 30" to 37 1/2" and in weight from 5 1/2 to 10 1/2 cwts. These bear Latin inscriptions. In date order they are: 1392-1418 "A" - "Let the name of the Lord be blessed". This could possibly be the oldest bell in Essex. 1418-1440 "Tenor G" - "For many years let John's bell resound" 1506-1522 "B" which carries a foundry shield which identifies it as made in Houndsditch. "St Margaret pray for us".

1523-1558 Treble "C" - "St John pray for us".

At the 1931 restoration, and for the first time in 400 years, the bells were taken down, tuned and provided with entirely new fittings: rehung a storey lower, making them safer and giving room for a fifth bell.

In 1996 the Essex Association of Change Ringers made a generous grant towards the cost in memory of one of its former member, George Eve. This was supplemented by a memorial fund which has been raised in memory of Leslie Catterwell. He was a former church warden and Tower Captain and was responsible for re-starting bell ringing after a lengthy period of inactivity. The fifth bell was cast at the Whitechapel Foundry. We are very fortunate to have a small but dedicated team of ringers who ring for morning services. They will also ring for weddings if

They will also ring for weddings i requested and booked ahead. If anyone is interested in ringing, I am sure you will be warmly welcomed.

'Mai Tel/ Lavender Bank: Still awaiting further quotations for the supply and installation of railway sleepers.

War memorial site: We accepted the cheapest quotation for pruning the war memorial's two trees. Pruning to be completed this month.

<u>Village Pond</u>: The plants have been cut back and the treatment to inhibit growth of the invasive pond weed will take place later this month.

<u>Village Trees</u>: The Jubilee Oak will be planted on the Maldon Road Green.

### PARISH COUNCIL OFFICE

We did not receive a grant from the V Festival. There was a misreading of our application and the village hall's application resulting in the authorisation of one cheque only. Agreed to seek funding advice from the RCCE and the Public Works Loan Board.

## ALLOTMENTS & PLAY AREA

Two new water troughs are to be installed in the allotments. The hedge between the allotments and the recreation field will be cut back later in the year. Concerns were expressed about the Leylandii trees touching the overhead electricity wires in the playing field. We agreed to remind Chelmer Housing Partnership that these particular trees are their responsibility. There has been no reported incidents in the recreation field or play area since the last meeting. The need for the young people to help fund raise for a skate board ramp was discussed. It was suggested the young people may like to put something in the newsletter asking for support and fund raising ideas.

## FLOOD ALLEVIATION SCHEME

Chelmsford City Council's Planning Committee has given planning permission for the scheme subject to a number of conditions. The Environment Agency is to keep the local community informed of progress as the scheme develops. **See below**.

Parish councillors who attended the planning meeting on 26 February reported on the outcome of the meeting. They said due to the poor quality of the PA system the officer presenting the report could not be heard clearly and it was equally difficult to hear comments and questions posed by the committee.

### 2013 BEST KEPT VILLAGE

We agreed to enter Margaretting in this year's competition.

### CITY COUNCIL'S HIT SQUAD

We have asked for the grass and weeds growing over the footpaths in Main Road to be cut back.

#### ACCOUNTS

The end of year accounts predicted a final expenditure figure of £21,854 for the financial year 2012/2013.

The expenditure agreed this month was £474 (Clerk's salary and expenses).

# CHELMSFORD FLOOD ALLEVIATION SCHEME STAGE A WORKS: MARGARETTING FLOOD STORAGE AREA

The following are extracts from the latest fact sheet published by the Environment Agency.

What Progress has been made? On 26 February 2013 planning permission for the construction of the flood storage area was granted, subject to the approval of a number of conditions. These conditions cover issues such as traffic management, landscaping, the methods adopted to manage archaeology and the removal of a redundant section of a war time pipeline.

What is happening now? We have been working closely with Margaretting Parish Council to develop a traffic management plan for Swan Lane. We are also discussing the possibility of replacing the walk boards at Whites Bridge. At Galleywood we have been discussing with the parish council a footpath to link the Common, the Stables Nursery and

the Heritage Centre to the village.

To help manage archaeology we need to carry out a geophysical survey. Archaeology geophysical survey uses non-intrusive and non-destructive techniques to determine the presence or absence of anomalies likely to be caused by archaeological features, structures or deposits, as far as reasonably possible, within a specified area or site on land, in the inter-tidal zone or underwater. Geophysical survey determines the presence of anomalies of archaeological potential through measurement of one or more physical properties of the subsurface. The archaeological geophysical survey starts on 18 March and should last for one week.

How can you get involved or get in touch? To ensure that you know how the project is progressing we will produce further fact sheets, keep the website www.chelmsford.gov.uk/fas up-to-date and keep your parish council informed. We will also hold a public exhibition in May to further explain our proposals and provide you with an opportunity to meet the key people who will be working on the construction stage of the project.

## DOG FOULING

When walking a dog you should be aware it is illegal to leave your dog's mess lying around in a public area. This includes all publicly accessible land. If a dog is in your care for any length of time, it is your responsibility to clean up its mess. Being unaware of the defecation or not having a device for or other suitable means of removing the faeces, is not a reasonable excuse for failing to remove the faeces. There are no excuses! Always take dog bags with you and if used deposit them in the red bins or take the bags home and place them in your black bin. Do not throw your dog bags at the side of the road or in the trees. Please remember apart from the legal consequences of dog fouling there are health implications and the danger of people being injured by slipping on dog faeces.
