

MARGARETTING PARISH COUNCIL - JULY MEETING

DEMOCRATIC TIME

Two members of the public present.

VILLAGE SITES

War Memorial: We agreed to remind Moody Homes Ltd that we have yet to hear from their insurers regarding the damage caused to the posts by one of Moody Homes vans on 2nd May.

Bus Shelters: We have not received any response to our request published in the newsletter for bus shelter cleaning help. See below.

Village Sign: Three sign makers have been approached. Quotations depend on which materials we choose - cast aluminium or cast polyurethane. We agreed to explore all possibilities and look at signs in neighbouring villages before making a decision.

Lavender Bank: Land registry checks are currently being made by Essex County Highways to confirm whether or council included pedestrian refuge isnot this bank is privately or publicly owned.

MAIN ROAD

We agreed to report to the neighbourhood police team complaints received that cars for sale are being parked on the scheme was not considered. Reasons public highway and on the hatched lines outside the school.

We agreed also to contact Highways about the outstanding improvement works scheduled for the path on Peacocks side of the road.

MALDON ROAD

Reports were received that the Jubilee oak on the green is in need of attention. We agreed to see if one of the neighbours would keep a watchful eye on this oak. We agreed also to report to Highways complaints received that some of the double yellow lines have faded and cars are now being parked along the 'no waiting stretch' in this road.

PARSONAGE LANE

We agreed to remind Highways of the need to sort out the ditch flooding probem reported in February.

ALLOTMENTS & PLAY AREA

We received RoSPA's annual inspection report. The state of the youth shelter seats was mentioned - these will nity Initiative Fund; Essex Environbe regalvanised as soon as practicable. The report also included a comment that a bird had left its droppings on the children's slide.

There have been no reported incidents since the last meeting.

ECC HIGHWAYS

We received a notice from Highways enquiring whether we had three priority schemes for consideration for fund-

We agreed there is a clear need for the introduction of traffic calming measures in Main Road but any proposals put forward should avoid further 'urbanizing' the village.

Past schemes submitted by the parish lands for Main Road; a shared space scheme for the crossroads (Maldon Road, Main Road and Wantz Road) and a mini roundabout at the cross roads. The concept of a shared use given were "Against Policy. On Priority Network - not appropriate. Not sufficient pedestrian flows to make a shared space scheme operate safely." We were also advised that the existing 40mph speed limit and road layout at the crossroads prevents the installation of a mini roundabout.

A request will therefore be submitted for a reduction in the speed limit for our village roads.

VILLAGE ROAD SPEED RESTRICTIONS/TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES

In 1998 the Margaretting Community Appraisal Report based on the results of a questionnaire (delivered to all households in the village in November 1997) included a paragraph on the advantages and disadvantages of living in Margaretting. It stated 'high on the list of disadvantages was the noise from the A12 and the railway, together with speeding traffic and inconsiderate parking. The Parish Council have been pursuing the problems of speeding and appropriate traffic calming measures with the Borough Council for some years and it is to be hoped that measures to reduce the speed limit in the village to 30mph with additional warning signs will be introduced in the near future.'

Over the sixteen years since the 1997 questionnaire was conducted there have been reports, campaigns and petitions requesting various measures to curb speeding traffic and inconsiderate parking in the village. The result of which has been the introduction of a number of initiatives: no waiting areas in Maldon Road (2005); two vehicle activation signs (2009/10); and two pedestrian refuge islands (2010/12) in Main Road. Some of these initiatives have not been welcomed by everyone in the community.

For example, in 2004 a number of residents in Maldon Road voiced their concerns about the parish council's request for the introduction of no waiting areas in Maldon Road and Main Road. They circulated a flier entitled 'Are you fed up with having Maldon Road used as a rat run?' Alternative suggestions put forward in the flier included the installation of traffic lights, speed bumps and the widening of Maldon Road by reducing the grassed areas.

In 2005 the Over 60s Club sent a petition to the Highways Cabinet Member (Rodney Bass) asking for his support in getting the speed limit reduced in Main Road. A similar request for his support was made by the parish council in 2005 and again in 2006. It was around this time also that residents in Writtle Road were involved in their long and unsuccessful campaign to have the speed limit reduced in Writtle Road.

In 2010 Highways carried out a county wide review of the speed limits for all A & B roads. The official result of which is still awaited. However, an e-mail recently received from Highways states 'The speed limit on this road (Main Road)

would have been checked during the recent Speed Limit Review, as were all A and B roads. I believe that the speed limit was deemed appropriate for the road.'

If this is correct this is disappointing news especially considering central government's view that 'Fear of traffic can affect people's quality of life in villages and it is self-evident that villages should have comparable speed limits to similar roads in urban areas. It is therefore government policy that a 30 mph speed limit should be the norm in villages.'

The parish council would welcome your comments as to whether or not you support the parish council's proposal to Highways that a reduction in the speed limit in the village to 30mph should be considered as a priority scheme for Margaretting. It should be noted that the Village Design Statement adopted in 2007 states 'The Highway Authority when proposing any traffic control measures at the crossroads should aim to avoid urbanizing influences such as traffic lights, pedestrian islands and bollards.'
