# **DEMOCRATIC TIME**

Two members of the public present. water leaks at the top of this lane and lack of action by the Water Company were noted and discussed.

### THREE MILE HILL

Occupation of the hut: This matter has now been deemed a planning issue. It has been referred to Chelmsford City Council's Planning Team for action.

### **SWAN LANE**

Local residents' concerns about the increase of traffic since the lane has been designated a 'quiet lane' were noted as were the complaints about the damage to the road caused by the heavy vehicles using this lane.

# WANTZ ROAD

It was agreed not to install a dog waste (red) bin at the cross roads with Main Road and Wantz Road. Advice from Chelmsford City Council confirmed it is acceptable for dog walkers to place their dog waste bags in the existing waste bins at the cross roads. These bins are emptied regularly by the City Council's refuse collection team. A notice to this effect will be placed by these bins. Dog walkers are to be reminded not to place dog waste bags in the rubbish bins in the playing fields as these are not emptied by the City Council's refuse team.

# MALDON ROAD PLAYING FIELD

No reported incidents. Reports of a tent being pitched at the far end of the allotments have been thoroughly investigated. The table and chairs together with a piece of sheeting used for a make do tent have been removed.

### VILLAGE HALL

Income from the hire of the hall is proving to be higher than anticipated. The Christmas Fayre 2018 was a success even though numbers attending were down.

# **DEFIBRILLATOR**

It was agreed to go ahead and place an order (£1,000) for a defibrillator. P&P Motors and the Black Bull have confirmed they would have no objections to a defibrillator being housed on their premises. To date BT has not responded to the parish council as to whether a defibrillator could be installed in the red telephone box by the pond.

# PARSONAGE LANE

A request made by a local resident that Parsonage Lane: Complaints about the Highway rights be removed from part of COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH this lane was received for comments from Essex Highways.

> It was noted concerns have already arisen regarding this request due to the lack of pedestrian refuge.

# **OVER 60S CLUB**

A request for a grant towards the running costs of the club was discussed. It was noted the club provides a much needed and appreciated social activity for the older members of the community £50 - Playing field rent and that the club is pursuing all practicable help to prevent it from closing. After discussion it was unanimously agreed the parish council would help towards the cost of the hire of the meeting room for the club for the forthcoming year.

# DOORSTEP SELLING

The parish council is to contact Trading Standards to see what evidence is required to obtain a cold calling free area status for the village.

# VILLAGE POND

Ideas put forward by the residents who attended the village pond meeting were noted. These included:

- Draw up an annual maintenance programme
- Employ a Conservation Pond Group to clear the debris from the pond
- Decrease the size of the pond
- Remove the pond dipping platform
- Dredge the pond (last done in 2004)
- Construct a path round the pond to allow ease of access to keep it clear of debris.
- Cut back the tall trees surrounding the pond to allow more light.

It was agreed to contact Chelmsford City Council's Parks Department to see what advice and help they are able to offer.

# MARGARETTING RELIEF IN NEED **TRUST**

The parish council unanimously agreed to nominate Patrick Wreathall as a Trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Tony Smith.

# 2019/2020 PRECEPT

18/01976/FUL - Canford House, Wantz Road: Demolition of part existing dwelling, construction of single/double storey extensions, internal reconfiguration, new roof with loft conversion and dormers, replacement window, material change to elevations, new garage, alterations to front drive and new entrance gates.

18/01643/FUL - River Mead, Private Road: Retrospective application to retain hardstanding.

# Anthony ('Tony') Richard Smith

The following is a transcript of the Address given by Canon John Brown on the occasion of the Service of Thanksgiving for Tony Smith at St. Margaret's Church, Margaretting, on Thursday 13 December, 2018. Tony's body had lain in St. John the Evangelist and St. Erconwald Roman Catholic Church, Ingatestone overnight on Wednesday 12 December. On the Thursday morning a short service was held in the church for the immediate family followed by interment in Margaretting churchyard.

# Reading: Mark 4 verses 1-9. The Parable of the Sower.

'Who'd be a sower? Who'd be a farmer? - vulnerable to the uncertainties of the elements and the markets, able to irrigate but unable to protect against the intensity and duration of the heat of the sun, pleading for rain but unable to control amounts or timings, subject to policies of this and other governments; as a livestock farmer totally committed to the welfare of the animals, working all hours during lambing and calving, every animal a vital investment. And of course the work of the farmer is very public - all can see whether the furrows are straight, whether the sowing has been consistent across the fields, the effect on the crops of winds and storms, and the long hours spent alone in the combines during harvest time. Who'd be a farmer? Thank God Tony and others have heard the call – yes, I think of it as a vocation! Without the service and commitment of farmers none of us would have our daily bread - we are so dependent on their labours! Thank God for Tony! Thank God there are others willing to pick up the torch he has laid down and to carry on!

But I want to direct your attention to another reference to seeds in the Scriptures. In his gospel St. John records that on one occasion some Greeks, so predominantly focussed on the identity of the human physique and intellect, approached one of Jesus's disciples with the request: "We want to see Jesus." Jesus must have overheard for he replied: "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains a single grain: but if it dies, it brings forth much fruit." In its original context the reference of course is to the interpretation of Jesus's own impending death as paradoxically giving life to all. I suggest however that we can quite legitimately take Jesus's words to highlight the paradox which engulfs all of us: while we are alive the totality of who and what we are, our identity, is enclosed within our physical bodies. It is only when we die, when

the essential you and the essential me is released from our physical frames that we are free to offer to others all that has contributed to our uniqueness. Whether of course they choose to avail themselves of what we have and always will have to offer, is up to them, but at least we have realised our calling: in death as much as in life, to offer our lives to others. The uniqueness of Tony is now free from the physical frame which enclosed him: he offers his uniqueness to us.

I just want to take this message a tiny bit further. Last Saturday I spent half an hour or so with my older son and his wife as they sat either side of the bed on which my daughter-in-law's mother June lay dying. She had been dying for a few weeks, and no one could tell for how much longer the process would go on. As she lay there seemingly sleeping but sometimes wincing - the painkillers weren't always totally effective - I thought: 'just over 80 years ago June had not been conceived and therefore not been born; 80 or so years later her physical existence was about to come to an end. In those intervening 80 years she had been present to who knows how many people – as a child, a teenager, a lover, a wife, a parent, a grandparent, a friend, a neighbour, a hairdresser, for that was her profession.' People ask the question: 'Why am I here?' I suggest that is the wrong question! We should be asking: 'For whom am I here?' as throughout our physical existence intentionally, unintentionally, we make an impact on others.

Tony spent 50 years on Margaretting's Parish Council; he contributed to the Village Hall Committee, to endless sporting organisations and other activities in this village; he rubbed shoulders with many of you individually and collectively which is why you are here today. In part like all of us he lived for himself; but in part, and regrettably not always expressed by all of us, he lived for others. 'For whom are **you** here?'

Tony, thank you! May you rest in peace and rise in glory!
