

Mount Bures Parish Council News

A wreath laying ceremony was held on the Village Green on Sunday 13th November following a remembrance service at St John's church. The Parish Council is most grateful to St John's Church for supporting this ceremony, to Stephen Barr for playing the bagpipes so evocatively, and to all of those who attended.

Following discussion about possible uses for the old telephone kiosk on the Village Green the Parish Council has arranged for shelves to be erected in the kiosk so that it can be used as a book exchange. A large number of books have already been donated and residents are most welcome to take any of these to read and to fill any gaps with any books they may wish to pass on. Please do not leave books if they cannot be placed on the shelves. The Parish Council is also looking to place a notice board in the kiosk for local information. If any resident has any further ideas for uses for the telephone kiosk please contact any of the Parish Cllrs or the Parish Clerk.

The Council has also commented on two significant planning applications relating to commercial activities affecting the Parish. The first of these is at Hushwing's Farm in Wakes Colne (but immediately adjacent to Mount Bures) where permission has been sought for additional buildings to support an equestrian business, including the provision of staff accommodation and a 'rural workers' home for the owners. The Council was generally supportive of the development of the business, but raised some concerns over the proposed location of new facilities which might impact on neighbouring properties and the size of the proposed new house. The second application at Fairfields Farm, Fordham Road, Wormingford covers the construction or conversion of lagoons or reservoirs for digestate storage on Wormingford airfield. (The digestate can then be used as a fertiliser on the fields.) Although most of this application relates to Wormingford, one of the existing reservoirs proposed for conversion lies just within the Parish of Mount Bures, at the top of the old road from Wellhouse Farm to the airfield, and immediately adjacent to two public footpaths. The Council has commented to the planning authority that it believes that given the risks of odours and leakage of digestate from this reservoir affecting those using the footpaths it would be better if all storage of digestate were concentrated with the other proposed lagoons closer to Fairfields farm.

A separate earlier planning application for a composting facility on the concrete hardstanding next to this reservoir, which the Council opposed on the grounds that it represented unacceptable industrialisation of a very rural site and would adversely affect people using the footpaths, remains under consideration by Essex County Council. *Ian Woodman*

A Christmas Message

Over the centuries, many traditions have built up around Christmas, to the point, where many of us share the same traditions, be it singing Christmas carols, hanging stockings out for Father Christmas, decorating our houses, giving and receiving presents, pulling crackers with jokes told and eyes rolled, and



eating too many festive foods, from turkeys to mince pies, all washed down with the ubiquitous tin of Quality Street or Roses (you get the idea, other sweet options are available!)

But there might also be those Christmas traditions that we always do as families, that others may not. For example, the first Christmas my husband spent with my family, he was completely bemused, when the Christmas pudding appeared, flames lapping, and everyone launched into singing, 'Good King Wenceslas'. It was something we always did, but until that moment in time, it had never occurred to me that it wasn't being repeated in every other home across the land. Whatever the traditions we have, there is something very comforting and familiar about Christmas. It is something that many people look forward to with great excitement, and of course the story of Christmas, as it gets retold time and time again, never gets old. School nativity plays recreate the drama of Mary and Joseph travelling to Bethlehem and giving birth in a stable, the Baby Jesus, the King of kings, wrapped in swaddling cloths, and laid in a manger.

For years, one thing many people across the country have tuned into on Christmas day, at 3pm is the Queen's Christmas Message, a message which has often touched on her deep Christian faith. This year, things will be different, as for the first time for many of us, it will be the King's Christmas Message we will hear. Whilst it may be different, the over-all message of Christmas remains the same, and it is a message of Joy and Hope, as the angels announce to shepherds on the hillside, 'Do not be afraid, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.'

So as we enjoy all the traditions of Christmas, old and new, may we never lose sight of the Hope and Joy the Christ child brings us.









The Christmas season is upon us once more, and like most people I am already looking forward to tucking into some of my favourite festive foods. However, please think twice before letting your pets join in the fun! I have written many times about the dangers to our pets of many of our festive food items (dried fruit, chocolate, macadamia nuts to name a few), but more generally, obesity is becoming a major issue in our pets. In my line of work, I see even a slight increase in weight make a huge difference (in a negative way) to a pet's mobility. Recent estimates have suggested that 51% of dogs and 44% of cats are overweight or obese. However, only 14% of dog owners and 18% of cat owners consider their pet to be overweight. So are we all in denial or are we so used to seeing overweight pets that we think this is normal?

It is important to understand that being overweight is a serious disorder, in fact obesity is now recognised as an actual disease in veterinary medicine. Staying in control of your pet's bodyweight is a lifelong commitment to their health and wellbeing. Overweight pets will be much more prone to mobility problems as well as other serious health conditions and will also have a shortened lifespan.



Being able to recognise if your pet is overweight is key. 8 nd early intervention will result in a quicker return to normal. It is therefore important to understand what an ideal weight looks like. The three areas of the body to look at are:

1. Ribs - if your pet is an ideal weight you will be able to feel the steps between the ribs when you run your fingers along their chest wall.



- 2. Waist if your pet is an ideal weight, you will see an 'hour glass' figure when you look at your pet from above.
- 3. Tummy tuck if your pet is an ideal weight, you will see an upward slope of their tummy when you look at your pet from the side.

Most vet practices offer free 'weight clinics' where a veterinary nurse will weigh your pet and use the above assessment to give your pet a body condition score on a

scale of 1-9. A score of 4-5 is ideal. If your pet scores 6 or above, they fall into the overweight or obese category and the nurse will advise you on how best to manage your pet's weight.

As always, prevention is better than cure and limiting festive treats and leftovers will go a long way in helping to keep your pet fit and healthy.

Darker nights: make your home look like you are in

With many of us now working from home it is easy to forget about our home security, what would have been routinely thought of before we left for work can easily be forgotten. Autumn brings darker nights, whether working from home, going out to work or just popping out for "a moment" later in the afternoon ensure that either lights in the house are left on or are operated by a timer to come on when it gets dark. A home in darkness looks unoccupied and becomes an attraction to the burglar. After dark have energy efficient lights on in rooms that replicate what your home looks like when you are in.

As well as making sure your home and garden are secure when you leave don't forget outside lighting (activated by a "dusk till dawn sensor" is best to the front of the house) may deter thieves. There are also TV simulators such as "Fake TV" that produces lighting that resembles a television switched on within a room. Other products available to make it appear that you are home are a movement sensor that activates an appliance plugged into a plug socket and doorbells that you can answer remotely after viewing the caller; an internet search will find these and other security products.

Scam warning from Which?, The Comsumers' Association

The latest Post Office text scam tells you that your parcel has been "redirected to your local branch due to an unpaid shipping fee.'

It links to a legitimate-looking website, where it asks you to pay for the redelivery of your parcel. Never click on this kind of link or provide any personal data.

Parcels are only delivered by Royal Mail. The Post Office is a physical shop where you take your parcels to be sent off. If you need to arrange redelivery for a parcel (for example, if a card is put through your door while you're out), you can do so for free at www.royalmail.com/receiving-mail/redelivery.

If you receive a text like the above, don't click on any links – these will take you to unsecure websites, where you'll be prompted to share personal information. Instead, report the text by forwarding it to 7726 and block the number.

Winter is coming to Sergeants Orchard

"Would you like some more?" "Yes, please".



This was the response to our first delivery of eating apples to the Colchester Food Bank. We mainly sent Worcester Pearmains, of which we had a good crop and they are a lovely looking and tasting apple as many will know. Picking the fruit is always a challenge with the height of most of the trees.

We were pleased they were well received. I'm hopeful we can do the same next summer. It was also nice to see local people helping themselves to some of the fruit. The "pound pears" seem popular for crumbles and tarts, even if they are "fallers".

We are now in full swing with our winter work; the cooler temperatures making it easier to get on with more energetic tasks. The pond and its adjoining ditches have no water following the dry summer. This has allowed us to clear vegetation and let more light into the pond. This has proved a major task and is still not complete at the time of writing.

We are also making a "dam" at the pond's outfall, using an existing fallen tree trunk and some other logs. Hopefully, this will help retain water in the pond for longer each year.

Two other major tasks for the winter are to dig out a pond in the large field and to complete laying the hedge alongside Balls Chase. The former is part of the continuing project to help turtle doves but will benefit other species as well. It should also help to make one of the paths round the field less flooded in the winter.

The laying of the first length alongside the bridleway appears to have been successful. We shall make a start on clearing vegetation for the next length soon, with the hedge laying itself being done in late winter.

It was pleasant to welcome the Mount Bures walking group for a tour of the reserve. For most it was a first visit. The reserve is open for all and we try and keep the paths as clear as possible. Of course, more visitors help to keep the paths clear! Dogs are welcome but please clear up after them.

There haven't been many wildlife sightings recently. The occasional late butterfly (usually a red admiral enjoying the rotting fruit) has been seen. A raucous Jay shatters the peace but birdsong is less noticeable now.

Thanks to all who have helped us in any way at the reserve this year, especially Nicky of the Wildlife Trust and all our wonderful fellow volunteers.


