

#### Mount Bures Parish News September - November

Following the resignation of Councillor Martin Baird, the Council advertised the vacant positon of Councillor, including on the Mount Bures What's App Group and subsequently co-opted Michaela Harris and Fiona Willett to the Parish Council.

In October the Parish Council Chair attended a meeting for local Parish Councillors at Wormingford Gliding Club. This was an opportunity to relay some of the concerns that have been expressed by local residents about occasional noise from powered tow aircraft and gliders using the airfield to the Gliding Club. The Chair of the Gliding Club has agreed to come and talk to the Parish Council and local residents about the activities of the Gliding Club and their future plans. The Parish Council will let residents know the precise date once agreed.

Following repeated efforts by the Parish Council for something to be done to tidy up the increasingly dilapidated and semi-derelict Crossing Cottage by the level crossing, the Borough Council threatened the lease holder with enforcement action and work has now been done to clear the overgrown garden. Unfortunately lots of rubbish has been left behind the locked gates and nothing has been done to the Cottage itself. The Parish Council is concerned that if the garden is not maintained it will soon be overgrown again and that the building will continue to deteriorate and is therefore looking at ways to get the leaseholder or owner to carry out regular maintenance.

The Parish Council has also continued to work for action to reduce the risks to pedestrians and bus users crossing the road at the junction between Brook House Lane and the Colchester Road. This is a dangerous junction approached on a blind bend when travelling from Bures towards Colchester and there have been a number of accidents there, most recently a car demolishing the wall of the house opposite and another vehicle knocking down all the road signs on the small island. The Parish Council together with Bures Hamlet Parish Council have previously submitted an application to the Local Highways Panel for speed reduction measures at this junction. However, this was rejected. Following the most recent accidents, Braintree District Councillors and our County Councillor have agreed to support a further application.

The Parish Council would very much welcome letters of support from any local residents who are concerned about the dangers at this junction whether as pedestrians, bus users or car drivers. The more support there is for action the more likely something will be done before someone is killed or seriously injured. Letters can be sent to the Parish Clerk at mountburespc@gmail.com.

Mount Bures Parish Council are working with Chappel Parish Council to consider buying a VAS (Vehicle Activated Sign) for the village to help reduce speeding vehicles coming through the village. A meeting to discuss this further will be arranged in the near future.

With the Queen's Platinum Anniversary falling in 2022, the Council is now looking at ways in which this might be celebrated within the Parish. Local communities generally are being encouraged to arrange a Big Jubilee Lunch over the weekend of the 2<sup>nd</sup> to the 5<sup>th</sup> of June and the Council is looking at whether this might be feasible. *If you would be interested in helping to organise an event or have ideas about activities, events or permanent memorials of the occasion then please do let one of the Councillors know.* 

Finally, the Parish Council now has a new website at <a href="mountburespc.co.uk">mountburespc.co.uk</a>. The Council plans to use this to allow easy public access to information about the Council's work and events within Mount Bures. #### **Biodiversity and Protecting our Environment**

In previous articles I have written about how Colchester Borough Council is implementing action following the declaration of a climate emergency. I touched on our Climate Emergency Action Plan containing 5 themes, the first of which is tackling the task of decarbonising the organisation. I now want to tell you a little about on-going work around a second theme, biodiversity and protecting the environment. Although led by the Council and its staff, it is hoped this will involve communities across the whole Borough.

Initially launched by the Council in 20199the Woodland and Biodiversity Project aimed to plant 200\$\, 000\$ trees in the Borough by 20249although this is now accepted as being over optimistic. Not only would this be in part to off-set carbon emissions in the future9but also to increase wildlife and biodiversity generally. In addition it is hoped to provide more green open spaces for people to enjoy9to exercise and with general benefits to health. The Project has many facets9and already many people have been involved in tree-planting. By 20219some 28\$\, 000\$ have been planted9although the droughty spring in 2020 slowed progress9an expanded planting programme will take place this winter. Areas of Council and community land are being targeted with planning and planting carried out with the help of local people. In addition to land in urban areas9Parish Councils9including Chappel have been given trees to plant in the villages. The long-running 'Trees For Years' scheme giving out plants to residents continues with a further event this autumn. This will not be delivered at a single location as previously9but will be through a 'click and collect ' service from sites across the Borough.

Changes are being made in the way the Council carries out routine maintenance of some green spaces in the urban areas, with reduced cuts to encourage biodiversity. A trial scheme is being run in conjunction with Wivenhoe Town Council. Less cutting has led to some residents complaining that their areas are less tidy, highlighting the need for better explanation. Alternatives to the Council team's use of Glyphosphate, a general weedkiller are being developed.

A programme of wetland restoration and biodiversity recovery has been started along the Colne on the western approaches to Colchester and moving down stream, beginning with Hilly Fields and Cymbeline Meadows. The latter, a 182 acre area of tenanted farmland owned by the Council with existing public access has potential to become an example of re-wilding, working in conjunction with the agreement of our tenant.

Space allows me to only touch on some of the work, but I would be happy to enlarge further if anyone wishes to get in touch with me.

## **News from Sergeants Orchard**

The year draws to a successful close

The programme of winter work is well underway as we write this. The two lockdowns mean that there is an element of catching up alongside the routine seasonal activities. Bramble, in particular, has re-established quite a hold in the old orchard. A certain amount provides good cover for wildlife, (as well as delicious crumbles for all of us). Too much, however, can harm the old fruit trees. Over the next months, we shall remove a lot from the centre of the old orchard but retain that on the perimeter.



We've had a good crop of apples this summer but few pears. The plums, especially greengages and damsons, have fruited well. As those who have them in their gardens know, neither of these are reliable annual croppers but very welcome when they appear.

In the last article, we mentioned the orchids. It was indeed a good year. A group of us counted the flowering spikes. There were about 1600 common spotted orchids and 45 pyramidal in the new orchard. There are a few common spotted elsewhere on the reserve as well. We also had grass vetchling, St John's wort, red bartsia, various vetches, bird's foot trefoil and fleabane flowering across the site. There were wood anemones earlier in the spring.

Amongst the birds we see, buzzards are common visitors and kestrels are making a comeback. We think a pair nested on the reserve. Green and greater spotted woodpecker have been seen and heard along with the smaller songbirds – tits, robin, chiffchaff, blackcap, whitethroat and wren. These all seem to nest here. We have also seen and heard bullfinches.

Butterflies had a better year and red admirals are still about. In early November, we saw a female brimstone, which was in good condition and getting ready to hibernate no doubt.

We mentioned before the work being done to encourage turtle doves. The bare soil plot has been harrowed again and we are hoping to have another plot nearer the old orchard. We have also cut some blackthorn scrub back in the hope of getting it to re-grow more densely. We didn't see any turtle doves this year but we did hear them on two occasions, once for some time hiding in the old orchard.

We end the year on an optimistic note. With our fellow volunteers and much help from Nicky of the Wildlife Trust, we feel we have achieved good progress, which hopefully we can maintain over the coming months. The paths are in good order, so enjoy a visit.

# Lovely Lurcher Pet Advice



The COP26 climate change conference in Glasgow has made us all more aware than ever of our need to protect the environment and to create a more sustainable future.

Unfortunately, pet ownership has quite a negative impact on the environment. The biggest environmental impact associated with our animal companions comes from producing meat-based pet food, which uses land, water and energy resources, and is a significant source of greenhouse gas emissions.

Whilst dogs are omnivores and can survive on a plant-based diet (although I don't recommend this), cats are obligate carnivores and need a meat-based diet to survive. Pets such as rabbits and rodents who have a predominantly plant/grain based diet have a much smaller impact.

According to one estimate, owning a medium-size dog can have a similar carbon 'pawprint' to owning a large SUV! As well as food, pets need toys, bedding, grooming products and various other accessories (yes Clive they really do!), which also comes at an environmental cost. Driving our dogs to different places for walks, training classes, breed/agility shows also has an impact. Even the veterinary care that pets receive when they are unwell contributes to carbon emissions.

While the carbon pawprint of pet ownership can be considerable, I would argue that it has to be balanced against the many benefits that companion animals can bring. Pets can be important in preventing or helping people better manage mental and physical illness. Pets provide emotional support and companionship, distracting people from upsetting thoughts and experiences and contributing to an overall feeling of improved well-being. They also give people the incentive to get outside and to keep active. Pets also teach responsibility and if you are responsibly looking after a pet then maybe that makes you more caring generally, to society and to the environment.

So what can we do to limit the impact our pets have on the environment?

- Buy only as much food as your pet needs and avoid food wastage.
- Don't over-feed your pet. Overweight pets have a greater carbon pawprint.
- Consider pet foods which use less resource-intensive proteins, e.g. poultry, rabbit, sustainably-sourced fish, or animal by-products. There are even new pet foods made of insect protein!
- Buy pet foods with recyclable or reusable packaging.
- Make your own pet treats (from lower-impact protein sources, or vegetarian) and store in reusable containers.
- Use local breeders or local rescue kennels to source your pet and have your pet neutered to reduce the chance of unwanted litters and overpopulation in rescue kennels.
- Buy pet products made from natural or recycled materials, e.g. cat litter made from recycled paper, food bowls made from bamboo, rope toys made from hemp, dog coats made from recycled plastic bottles.

Try making your own toys! Our dogs love an old sock stuffed with more old socks and simply tied at the top. Or tie a couple of knots into an old tea-towel and use it as a tug toy. Toilet roll tubes and old cardboard boxes can make great games for cats, rabbits and rodents.

use non-toxic grooming and cleaning products.

I hope this has given you a few ideas! By working on reducing our carbon pawprint we can reduce the negative impact on the environment while preserving the many benefits that pet ownership can bring.

#### Twelve tips for Christmas and after

With Christmas rapidly approaching here are a few seasonal tips to help keep you safe at home, shopping, visiting, and after Christmas too:

- 1. If you need to store Christmas food and drink, presents and other goodies within garages and outbuildings, ensure what you are storing is out of sight and that the building is securely locked with good quality well fitted locks. Treat your shed to a shed alarm.
- 2. Avoid tempting window shopping burglars; don't leave presents and valuables on full view in front of a window. Make suitable secure delivery arrangements for parcels to reduce the risk of theft.
- 3. When leaving the house always ensure your windows and doors are closed and locked (remember your face covering). Don't attract burglars to your home by leaving it in darkness; leave lights on timers, perhaps treat yourself to a TV simulator too.
- 4. Lock gates to keep unwanted visitors from getting to the rear of your home.
- 5. When you go to leave the house and find that your car is all iced up, don't leave it unattended with the engine running to de-ice it. It only takes a second to steal your car and it would invalidate any insurance claim.
- 6. Park safely; look for a Parkmark accredited car park www.parkmark.co.uk/car-park-finder Check that your car is locked before you leave it and don't leave valuables and gifts on display in your car.
- 7. Whether an evening out or Christmas shopping keep your bags, handbags, wallets and mobile safe. Busy places make it easier for the sneak thief, so be alert at all times.
- 8. A Christmas get together make sure that you have considered how you are getting home in advance and avoid using unlicensed taxis. Ensure you drink responsibly, social distance and are aware of your surroundings, whilst keeping your drink and belongings safe.

- 9. Watch what you put on social media; check your settings to ensure that you are not broadcasting when you are not at home and the lovely gifts you may have received.

#### Wildlife Friendly Gardens: Ella's Top Tips on Beautiful Boundaries

Hedges have as many uses as they do styles and autumn is the ideal planting time.

Hedges are environmentally friendly absorbing carbon as they grow to provide wildlife habitats, nesting sites and providing shelter for insects and smaller mammals. Ideally they should have nectar rich flowers and berries for pollinators and birds to feast on.

Hedges are also beneficial as they help to reduce noise pollution and trap air pollutants. Using Cotoneaster "franchetii" captures 20% more emissions than other varieties (RHS study).

If you're thinking of security, Pyracantha, Hawthorn, Blackthorn and Berberis make a prickly form of defence. (be sure to clean up thoroughly after trimming them!)

Do not despair if ivy and bramble mingle with your hedge, as long as you don't allow them to take over completely, they are very beneficial for wildlife.

Best time for planting is now till middle of December as you can take advantage of using bare-rooted plants.

#### The following are highly commendable hedge plants for eco conscious gardeners:

- Guelder rose (Viburnum Opulus), deciduous, bright red berries, loved by birds
- Spindle berry (Euonymus Europaeus) orange-pink fruit resembling "cardinals'hats"
- Rose: Rosa Rugosa, Rosa Canina (dog rose), Rosa Rubiginosa, flowers and hips
- Flowering Quince (Chaenomeles) Flowers early spring are a hit of nectar for early bees
- Ornamental Currant (Ribes) attractive autumn colours
- *Hornbeam* (Carpinus betulus) Deciduous and fast growing. A great shelter for non-migratory songbirds in the Winter whilst providing a space for insects and the source of food for nesting birds.
- Beech (copper and green): holds on to its leaves throughout winter. The caramel/brown leaves are replaced with green or red leaves in the spring.

#### Evergreen hedges:

- Eleagnus has tiny, perfumed flowers
- Thuja and Cypress evergreen conifers not to be confused with Leylandii
- Cherry laurel (Prunus laurocerasus 'Rotundifolia') advisable to cut by hand to avoid ragged foliage. CAUTION Laurel leaves, when crushed or cut, leak hydrogen cyanide which can be deadly when consumed. After cutting your hedge never store the green waste with the laurel in your vehicle overnight or for a prolonged period as the toxin levels in the air can be fatal.
- Portuguese laurel (Prunus lusitianica) Flowers and berries attract birds, bees and butterflies. Its dense structure is a safe haven for small animals during Winter.
- Wild Privet (Ligustrum Vulgare) semi-evergreen

It is important to look after ourselves, each other, the landscape and the wildlife that calls the AONB home.






Stick to designated footpaths and keep your dogs with you. When near livestock or nesting birds, put dogs on a short lead.

### Less Plastic, More Planet: a Touch of Glass milk in returnable glass bottles
